WHITMAN COLLEGE LOSES GOOD MEN

Missionaries Played Too Hard in Preliminaries—Multnomah May Win.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Whitman College, Walla Walla, Wash., Oct. 18.—Although the Whitman football men are bending every energy toward adequate preparation for the big game with Multnomah Athletic club next week, prospects are by no means so bright or rosy as they were a week ago.

The game against Spokane High School, while it demonstrated that the missionary aggregation has some of the best material for a team it has ever had, was played with so much vim and energy for a game so early in the season when the men were not in toughened condition, that several of the star players have not been able to be out at practice since.

Philbrook Sprains Knee.
Philbrook, the best ground gainer in the Spokane game and by all odds the heaviest man on the team, after he had played through the game with credit, gave his knee a severe sprain on leaving the field, and has not been able to practice since. Whether he will be in the game Friday with Multnomah, is questionable.

Captain Dimick, another bulwark of the team, has been laid up for several weeks with a broken shoulder bone. While he is practicing again, it is probable that the coach will not allow him to play against Multnomah as it is felt he is needed too much for the intercollegiate championship games and it would not do to risk putting him out of the game for the remainder of the season by playing him against the club men.

Two of the half backs who played so brilliantly in the Spokane game are also temporarily on the retired list. Vincent Borjeske and Martin. Martin was unable to play through that game, on account of a painful injury on the knee which has kept him out since that time. Borjeske is also laid out with a bad knee and an injured shoulder.

The rest of the team are in good condition, and practicing with vim and energy. With such a bunch of holes in the ranks Whitman cannot put up her best representation against the Portland team. With the loss of Philbrook, Rader, and half back, lack of training, Roy, Feringer, and lack of star tackle and half back, several, however, is expected back in a day or two, and it is likely that he will be able to play against Multnomah and strengthen Whitman materially.

Belt, a new man from Spokane, who showed up well in the Spokane game, is probably playing with the Whitman team. Lyman is now back and he and Curly Spigle, the old pair who have played the two ends for Whitman for several years, will be in the game and ready for any sort of tricks around the ends. Either Clemens or Cooke will put in at the full back position. Morton, Harvey Graham, and possibly Feringer will fill up the balance of the line.

Bigby goes in at full.
Bigby will play his old position at full. At quarter, however, will be Whitman's star, Brubaker, who has all the talent and ability of a star. The way he handled the team in the Spokane game was a caution, and a remarkable one on every side. When Coach Kennedy returned to Spokane, he commended Brubaker's work most highly.

Although it will not be by any means Whitman's strongest lineup which will meet Multnomah on Friday, it will be a better aggregation than first represented the college in years and they believe they have a good fighting chance to wipe out the defeat they received at Multnomah last year in Portland.

Kentucky Todd made his record of 2:08 1/4 at Columbus two years ago. The youngster also took the second heat in 2:09 1/4, making the two fastest ever trotted by a horse of his age in competition. General Watts recently won the Lexington futurity for stallions, which was valued at \$22,000. In addition to that he has captured many minor stakes.

GEESSE MIGRATING TO SOUTHERN CLIME

Thousands Darken Sky Over Klamath Falls but the Hunters Unlucky.

Klamath Falls, Or., Oct. 19.—There is a great migration of geese this year from the upper country south. They have been flying in great numbers over Klamath Falls for several days past, and today the sky has been full of the large white ones, with the black tips on the wings.

In every flock there will be two or three of the dark colored ones. They fly into the grain fields south of town, adjoining the river, about 6 o'clock in the evening. Sometimes there are thousands in one flock. In the morning, about sunrise, they make for the tules, and continue southward. The hunters have not been very successful in their curing geese, for as soon as they are disturbed they fly straight for the tules, not giving another chance for a shot.

ELEVEN HUNDRED NAGS IN EMERYVILLE STALLS

S. C. in the first half. Hardy and Rader making one each and Nissen two. The first half ended in Montana's territory. In the second half Montana fought more stubbornly. Montana put up a hard fought battle but like Blair and Cheney they were plainly over-matched both in weight and skill.

Fine work was displayed by Hardy, Nissen, Rader, Miner, Cherry, Helm and "Prexie" Bryan. Helm made several long and sensational kicks from the center of the field over the goal line. Hardy cleverly caught the punt and made a startling run to the goal with two men on his back, but was pushed over the side line. Montana was scarcely able to make any yardage so ably did Bender's agile "Farmers" hold them down, but W. S. C. made gains by sheer force of weight and good runs with able interference.

Two of Montana's men were so injured as to have to leave the game. Ambrose having received a kick in the back in a scrimmage that disabled him completely and Cullen a folt that laid him out the rest of the game. The championship laurels seem more than ever to lean toward the "Farmers" though the next one of importance being with the University of Idaho at Moscow Friday, November 8.

TRUST BUSTERS ARE ASSEMBLING

Conference of National Civic Federation Will Be Held at Chicago.

Chicago, Oct. 19.—More than 500 delegates are today traveling from every section of the United States to the conference to be held in this city next week to discuss the "trust problem." The conference was called by the National Civic Federation and will begin its sessions Tuesday.

Few events in the history of Chicago have ever brought together so many representatives of so many different walks of life. Farmers and college presidents, financiers and labor leaders, merchants, statesmen and men of the church will sit elbow to elbow. Delegates have been named by the governors of nearly all the states and territories. In addition, large representations are expected from national organizations such as the American Bankers' association, American Bar association, American Federation of Labor, National Grange, Farmers' National congress, American Society of Equity, and the various wholesale trade organizations and the chambers of commerce and boards of trade of many of the large cities throughout the country.

The list of delegates contains the names of scores of men of wide prominence. Among them may be mentioned Andrew Carnegie, August Belmont, Cornelius N. Bliss, David R. Forgan, Isaac N. Seligman and other eminent representatives of capital; President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, President Charles W. Eliot of Harvard university, President Carroll Wright of the National Civic Federation, Watson Glider of New York, President Nicholas Murray Butler of Columbia university, Dr. Albert Shaw of New York, Bishop Henry C. Potter of New York, Archbishop Ireland of St. Paul, Dr. Lyman Abbott of New York, M. E. Galligan of Cincinnati, W. K. Knapp of St. Louis, Senator W. Murray Crane of Massachusetts, Judge P. S. Grosscup of Chicago, William Dudley Foulke of Richmond, Indiana, and President Harry Pratt Judson of the University of Chicago.

INTOXICATED FISH STAY OUT TOO LATE

APPEAL FILED IN HORSEMAN CASE

Alameda, Cal., Oct. 19.—Attorneys Fee and Raley have filed an appeal in the case of George Horseman, who is under sentence to 10 years in the penitentiary and to pay a \$2,000 fine. Sentence was passed by Judge Bean after he had first denied a motion for a new trial. Horseman was convicted of slaughtering in killing Clarence McBrook. The attorneys gave as their reason that they had found the law of 1907 required that a motion for a new trial should be made after passing sentence instead of before.

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
