ARTHUR CUNNINGHAM RETURNS
TO FILL ENGAGEMENT AT MARQUAM

Arthur Cunningham, admitted to be the best baritone on the comic opera stage today, will return to the Marquam next Tuesday evening when the San Francisco Opera will open its re-engagement in Frank Daniel's great success, "The Idol's Eye." Cunningham joined the San Francisco opera during the last week of the company's engagement last June and will be remembered by his splendid rendition of "My Own United States" in "When Johnny Comes Marching Home."

As a singer Mr. Cunningham is in a class by himself and as an actor there are no better. His career has been a very interesting one. He was chosen for baritone of the Holy Trinity church, Blooms Square, London. Here he was heard by Sir Charles Villiers Stanford who liked his work so well that he secured for him the title role in "Thamius O'Brien." Later Henry W. Savage secured Cunningham for the famous Castle Square opera. Following two seasons with Savage, Mr. Cunningham went to Hammerstein and sang "Farther Michael in La Poudre." Engagements with Augustin Daly, Francis Wilson and De Wolf Hopper followed and at length he was engaged to alternate in the leading role of the Highwayman (which by the way, will be done for the second week of the company's engagement here). It was while singing this piece that he was engaged by W. H. Leachy of the Tivoli San Francisco. His success was immediate and two years after his original engagement he sang Alfio in Cavalleria in the well remembered production under the baton of Mascagni. Later he sang the Toreador to Zelli de Lus-san's Carmen.

PUTS BAN
ON CHILDREN

Employment of Boys or Girls Under 14 on Local Stage Must Cease—Theatres Notified They Will Be Prosecuted.

Action that may have far-reaching effect in the theatrical business in Portland was taken yesterday afternoon by Deputy District Attorney Robert Galloway when he addressed letters to each of the theatres in the city warning them that in future the juvenile court law against the employment of children under 14 years of age will be strictly enforced.

Prosecutions will be made under the section of the law providing penalties for acts contributing to the delinquency of a minor by the violation of any law, as well as under the direct provision which forbids the appearance of children under 14 in professional theatrical entertainments. For instance, Mr. Galloway holds that the child labor law is violated in the employment of children under a prescribed age in the theatrical profession, and each case will be dealt with as the circumstances seem to demand.

The law also applies to children performers in the circus or any other form of professional entertainment. Vaudeville theatres probably will be harder hit than any other line of theatrical entertainments, but the law is enforced in the employment of children under a prescribed age in the theatrical profession, and each case will be dealt with as the circumstances seem to demand.

Playgoers will have to say farewell to real children and child parts on the stage, if the plan of the prosecuting officer is carried out. Such characters will have to be taken by those of more advanced years, or omitted altogether. But as Annie Russell contrives to play Puck in "Midsummer Night's Dream," this may not prove such a hardship after all.
