

BRUIN WILL HELP FIND NORTH POLE

Trained Bears Assigned to Amundsen's Arctic Expedition of 1910.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) New York, Oct. 22.—Captain Roald Amundsen, the Arctic explorer, who arrived recently on the steamship Oscar II, said he will make an attempt to reach the North Pole in 1910. He announced that he is having four big Polar bears trained to haul sleds by an expert in Hamburg, and intends to use them in the far north.

He said also that he and his friends expect to petition President Roosevelt and the United States government to allow him to use the ship, the Gjøra, which he navigated the northwest passage in 1904, to be the first to pass through the Panama canal upon its completion. The explorer will make a lecture tour of many of the principal cities of the United States.

SMALL BUT STRICT SECT IN CONFERENCE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Albany, Or., Oct. 22.—A conference of the Mennonites of the Pacific coast opened in Albany last evening in the W. C. T. U. hall. A program has been arranged carrying the sessions until Thursday evening. The meetings constitute a conference on all branches of the church work and the leading Mennonites of the Pacific coast are expected to be in attendance. The address of welcome was made by J. H. Bontrager. The response was by E. Stahley of Nampa, Idaho. Bishop Hilty and other members from Nampa are in attendance and the California churches are represented by delegations.

There are five churches on the coast and possibly the strongest are in Oregon. The Oregon churches are at Hubbard and near Albany. Idaho has one and California two.

It is said to be the intention to establish a mission at Portland and extend the church work in the northwest and on the entire Pacific coast. The total membership is about 250 west of the Rocky mountains.

The Mennonites are the very strictest interpreters of the Scriptures and are given to the practice of washing each other's feet and offering prayer with covered heads. The rules of conduct are possibly as severe as can be found in any existing church and it is largely due to this fact that the membership is small and its spread so slow.

CASES OF GLANDERS AND TUBERCULOSIS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, Oct. 22.—State Veterinarian C. J. Korenek at a meeting of the state veterinary board yesterday reported he had found 18 cattle belonging to Stoddard Bros. near Portland to be infected with tuberculosis. The animals were ordered slaughtered and assessed at \$10 per head.

Ten horses at Grants Pass were reported to be infected with glanders and were ordered destroyed. Two of them were assessed at \$80 apiece.

Pennington Seminary President Objects to So Many Marriages.

He has taken steps to put a stop to the numerous love matches that result from the social gatherings of the students.

In two years almost a dozen marriages have followed affiliations begun at Pennington.

Mr. Moore will be assisted by the other members of the faculty, and there will be an effort to keep the young women and masculine students on terms of friendship that will not terminate in weddings at the close of the school term.

The Sunday evening social hours will be especially supervised. Some of the pairs seek the darkened corners of the nearby rooms to do their "spooning." President Moore has ordered all the connecting doors to the main parlors locked. Consequently, the lovers must do their "cooing" in the public eye and under the watchful gaze of the teachers.

Professor Moore recently sent a minister's daughter from the dining hall because her gown was cut decollete.

RIVER ASSOCIATION WANTS DEEP CHANNEL

Several hundred delegates from points in Missouri, Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin were present. President Thomas Wilkinson of Burlington called the gathering to order. The convention will remain in session wholly occupied with the discussion of ways and means to promote the permanent improvement of the upper Mississippi river, from the mouth of the Missouri river to St. Paul, by maintaining a depth of six feet in channel, at low water.
