Over 100 per cent gain in attendance was registered at the opening of the fall term of night school last night at the high school building, Fourteenth and Alder streets. The total enrollment of the building was 126 pupils, 50 of whom belonged to last year's classes. The indications are that the attendance will be doubled by the end of the week. Upon the payment of \$1 entrance fee, the school board furnishes free text books. Professor G. W. Vandeville, director of the school, assisted by the following teachers: J. A. Brimhall, bookkeeping, history, reading, Miss Comstock, primer and first reader for foreigners; Mrs. W. C. Anderson, second class in reading and civil government for foreigners; Miss Conway, grammar, geography and spelling. Two additional teachers are to be engaged immediately.

Report on the progress being made toward ascertaining the cost and practicability of the city ownership and operation of a rock crusher and street improving plant will be heard this evening at the regular meeting of the United States Hotel Sargent, Hawthorne and Grand avenues. A committee was appointed some time ago to investigate the question. Also the question of building the new Hawthorne bridge for which the bonds were voted last June to replace the Madison structure will be discussed. It is proposed, if practicable, to build the bridge high enough so that many of the small boats will be enabled to pass under the structure without necessitating the opening of the draw and hindering traffic on the bridge.

A reception to Rev. Benjamin Young, the new pastor of the Taylor Street church, will be held in the church parlors by the congregation this evening. William E. Fenton will deliver the address of welcome. Rev. Hiram Williams Foukes, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, will welcome Rev. Young in behalf of the other denominations and the city in general. Music will be furnished by a chorus of voices under the direction of Professor Boyer of Willamette university. The arrangements for the entertainment are in

charge of a committee made up of R. J. Patterson, A. M. Smith, Professor M. C. Thorne and Mrs. J. E. Bennett.

A. D. Charlton, assistant general passenger agent of the Northern Pacific, has applied to the Portland chamber of commerce for a large quantity of the chamber's recently published book entitled "Oregon, Land of Opportunity." The book will be placed in the hands of every passenger agent and immigration worker along the lines of the Northern Pacific in the states east of the mountains, and will be used as a means of inducing homeseekers to come to Oregon. The book is a very small, well secured a large quantity of the booklets, and these were distributed some time ago through eastern territory.

The ways and means committee of the city council voted \$40 at its yesterday's meeting for the purchase of a sample election booth plans for which were gotten up by County Clerk Fields and submitted to the committee by City Auditor Barber. The booth is composed of canvas stretched over a collapsible frame and can be set up in the streets. All the furniture can be folded and stored in a very small space. The booth contains nine election boxes where voters can make out their tickets. If the sample proves satisfactory the booths will be ordered jointly by the city and county.

The Sellwood board of trade will hold its first regular meeting tomorrow evening at Campbell's hall on Umatilla avenue. The sewer question and proposal to build a local gas plant will be two of the more important matters that will come up for discussion. Meetings of the Sellwood board of trade will be held hereafter each Wednesday evening. Considerable work is to be accomplished during the winter and attendance of all who are interested in the improvement of Sellwood is desired. A description of officers will take place tomorrow evening, which is an additional matter of importance.

Imagining that he was the big chief of an Indian reservation and a lot of other things, and carrying a loaded revolver and a blackjack, Jesse B. Soward, who is believed to be a desperado, was taken into custody last night by Detective Sergeant Jones and Acting Detective Tichnor and P. Maloney. The man is now being held at the city jail.
