

PUT ICE ON NEWNAME

East Side Clubs Turn Cold Shoulder on Suggestion to Change Title of Bull Run—Crematory Bugbear Is Again Discussed.

When the communication from the Portland board of trade was read last night before the United East Side club, asking them to endorse the movement to change the name of the river from which Portland receives its water supply, a broad grin settled over the features of delegates. The usual austerity of the federated clubs had been visibly disturbed.

There was a long silence. Then somebody called for H. H. Newhall, president of the East Side bank and delegate from the East Side Business Men's club.

"Well," said Mr. Newhall, "I'll make a motion to lay the communication on the table, if I say anything."

"Second the motion," suddenly came from some other member. "That's all."

The United East Side clubs is one of the strongest organizations on the east side. A number of organizations that this club represents had passed the endorsement and sent it to the board of trade and Initiative One Hundred. There evidently had been a change of front on the part of these clubs, or there were no supporters of a new name for Bull Run present.

The clubs adopted a resolution to be presented to the council at its next meeting, asking for two crematories, one on each side of the river, and suggesting that the west side crematory be built first.

Superintendent Daggett emphasized the importance of collecting garbage. He said the present system in Portland was the worst possible, that the wagons should be airtight and steam-cleaned and garbage gathered every day. No scavenger wagons, he declared, should be allowed on the street in the day time, and the city should bear the entire expense, so necessary rules and restrictions could be imposed.

The capacity of the present plant is about 25 tons, while the amount of garbage received is 50 tons. A great amount of decaying animal and vegetable matter has to be dumped daily that can never reach the furnace. Fuel costs \$30 a month, but with a modern incinerator this expense would be insignificant, because much of the refuse received and now wasted by the plant could be converted into fuel. Superintendent Daggett does not approve any method that necessitates handling garbage twice or three times. He said he would like to build a crematory on Washington street and show the people there is no offense originating from a modern plant.

EVOLUTION OF NEW POTATO IN KLAMATH

Klamath Falls, Or., Oct. 23.—Three members of the Portland excursion party served as judges in the awarding of premiums for the best agricultural products exhibited at the fair. The judges were J. D. Lee of Portland, J. A. Maddox of Sharon, Kansas, and J. H. Webber of Denver. It was impossible to award the premiums during the fair on account of the crowds and the greater part of Monday was taken up by the judges in passing upon the exhibit. There were nearly 100 exhibitors and over 600 entries.
The potato exhibit was larger than any other, and the samples shown were particularly fine. A new variety of potato was shown, grown on the ranch of Representative John Shook. Samples shown were very smooth and just the right size for family use.

BIGGY AFRAID OF PROSECUTION

San Francisco Chief of Police Does Not Dare Order Men to Disarm Carmen.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, Oct. 23.—The possibility of prosecution on charges of battery prevents Police Chief Biggy from issuing his orders to disarm the employees of the United railroads who carry concealed weapons while on duty on the cars. In Biggy's own words, he is afraid to begin indiscriminate disarmament for fear of prosecution.

"Every man who is searched by a patrolman for firearms and on whom no concealed weapon is found may hold the offender liable for damages on a charge of battery. My men cannot render themselves liable and as far as I know there is no way to take weapons from citizens unless it is definitely ascertained beforehand that they are carrying concealed weapons."

Several patrolmen in the past have searched employees of the United railroads at the instance of bystanders and on the completion of the search have discovered that there were no concealed weapons on the men.

The United railroad law department is considering the prosecution of such cases and action may be taken within a few days.

VALUABLE TRACT CHANGES HANDS

Property at Columbia and Front Purchased by Syndicate.

The sale of the quarter-block at the southwest corner of Columbia and Front streets by W. P. Hawley to Milton J. Jones and associates, which was announced some days ago, was closed yesterday. This property is across Columbia street from the proposed new business block to be erected by C. E. Hertz and associates, and was sold for \$25,000.

The purchasers announce that as soon as the leases of the present tenants expire, the old building will be torn out and a modern business house erected on the holding. A tract of 42½ acres south of Troutdale on the Sandy river was purchased yesterday by J. J. Kuntz for \$3,000. Thomas W. Martindale was the owner of this tract.

Mrs. Emma L. Fitzgerald has purchased from William Conn a house and lot on the Sandy road in York addition for \$2,500.

E. Nelson has closed a deal with Mrs. Ellen Ryan for the sale of a house and lot on Northwick street, between Fremont and Beach streets, consideration \$2,800.

J. J. Kaddery has sold to C. J. Bassett the quarter block at the southeast corner of East Tenth and East Thirtieth streets. A nominal consideration was named in the deed, but the actual value of the holding is about \$8,000.

G. F. Skieskie has purchased a 50-foot residence lot in Goldsmith's addition. The property is on Xavier between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-seventh streets and was sold for \$4,000.

KEPT A DANCE HALL BUT KEPT HIS WORD

McDonald, who died at Portland last week from quick consumption, was buried from the Catholic church yesterday afternoon under the auspices of the order of Exalts, of which he was a member. McDonald, or "Billy," as he was familiarly known, while engaged in the reprehensible occupation of a dance hall keeper, having owned and operated the well known "Palm" dancehouse, still had a host of friends, which includes many solid business men. The chief of police said that when Billy said he would keep his word, he had just built and furnished a handsome home, and it was his intention to quit his old line of business. He was 43 years old, and leaves a wife and one child.

HARTJE SCANDAL BARS SCHOOLGIRL

Sister of Mrs. Hartje Is Dropped From Seminary for Her Part in Case.

Morristown, N. J., Oct. 23.—Miss Ida Scott of Pittsburg, sister of Mrs. Augustus Hartje, has been temporarily suspended from Miss Dana's seminary for girls, where she has been enrolled as a pupil since the opening of the present school term.

It was explained at the school today that this action was taken because of the sensational allegations concerning the girl's connection with the divorce proceedings.

Miss Scott left the institution on Saturday in company with a relative from Pittsburg. It was not until the statement was made public that Miss Scott's love letters to her sweetheart in Pittsburg had been sold that the school authorities were aware that the Miss Scott referred to in the divorce proceedings was the pupil in the seminary.

The girl's father was told, it is said, that the reputation of the school was suffering by its daughter's further connection with it, and that she must be taken away for the present.

FIFTY MILLION FEET OF LUMBER A YEAR

Capacity for Which New Eastern Syndicate Will Build in North Idaho—Operate in Oregon.

Lewistown, Ida., Oct. 23.—The Northwestern Lumber company, recently organized by Pennsylvania men, has announced its intention to have in operation by July 1, 1908, a sawmill with an annual capacity of 50,000,000 feet and to build and equip 30 miles of railroad from the Northern Pacific at Pullman to the heart of the Craig mountain timber district. The company has taken up options on 16,500 acres of timber land owned by the state of the west expects to have more than 50,000 acres. The plans of the company also provide for entering the Hine mountain district of Oregon, where 1,500,000,000 feet of timber is held by option.

WATER SYSTEM AN ISSUE AT CHEHALIS

Chehalis, Wash., Oct. 23.—A resolution by the city council declares it to be the sense of that body that a gravity water system should be installed in this city. The councilmen who favor the proposition believe the subject should be acted on at the coming city election. It is understood that the city of the Newaukum river, about 12 miles east of Chehalis, is the source suggested. The water supply at present is in the hands of a private company. The general impression is that the resolution was brought up at this time to force an issue for the coming city election.

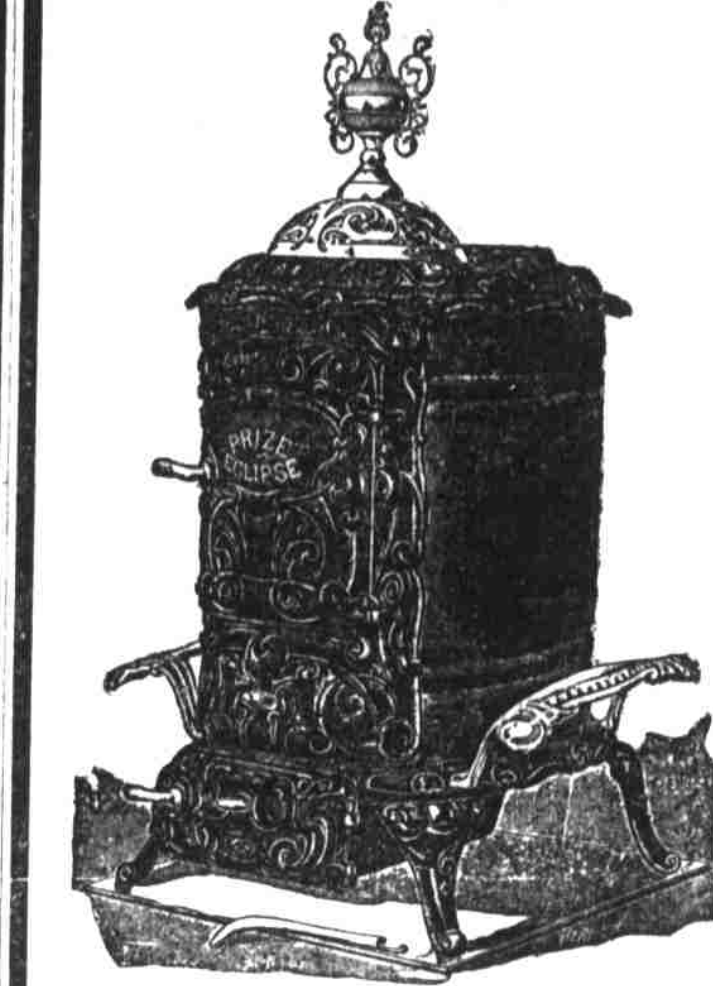

GAS WILL FURNISH ST. JOHNS WITH LIGHT

City Council Grants 25-Year Franchise to Davidor's Company.

St. Johns has a gas company. At a regular meeting of the council last night the St. Johns Gas Heating & Lighting company was granted a franchise for 25 years, with the privilege of charging its patrons \$1.45 per 1,000 feet until the population of the city has reached 4,000 inhabitants and for which privilege the company promises to pay to the city \$250 a year. All members of the council were present and the measure received no opposition.

After the population reaches 4,000 and until it reaches 5,000 the company will pay to the city \$300 and reduce the price of gas 5 cents per 1,000 feet; after the population reaches 5,000 and until it reaches 10,000 the company will pay the city an additional \$100 a year for the privilege of operating in St. Johns and lower the price of gas another 5 cents per 1,000 feet. The progression is similar until the population reaches 25,000 people, then the price of gas will be \$1.95 and the gas company will pay the city \$500 per annum.

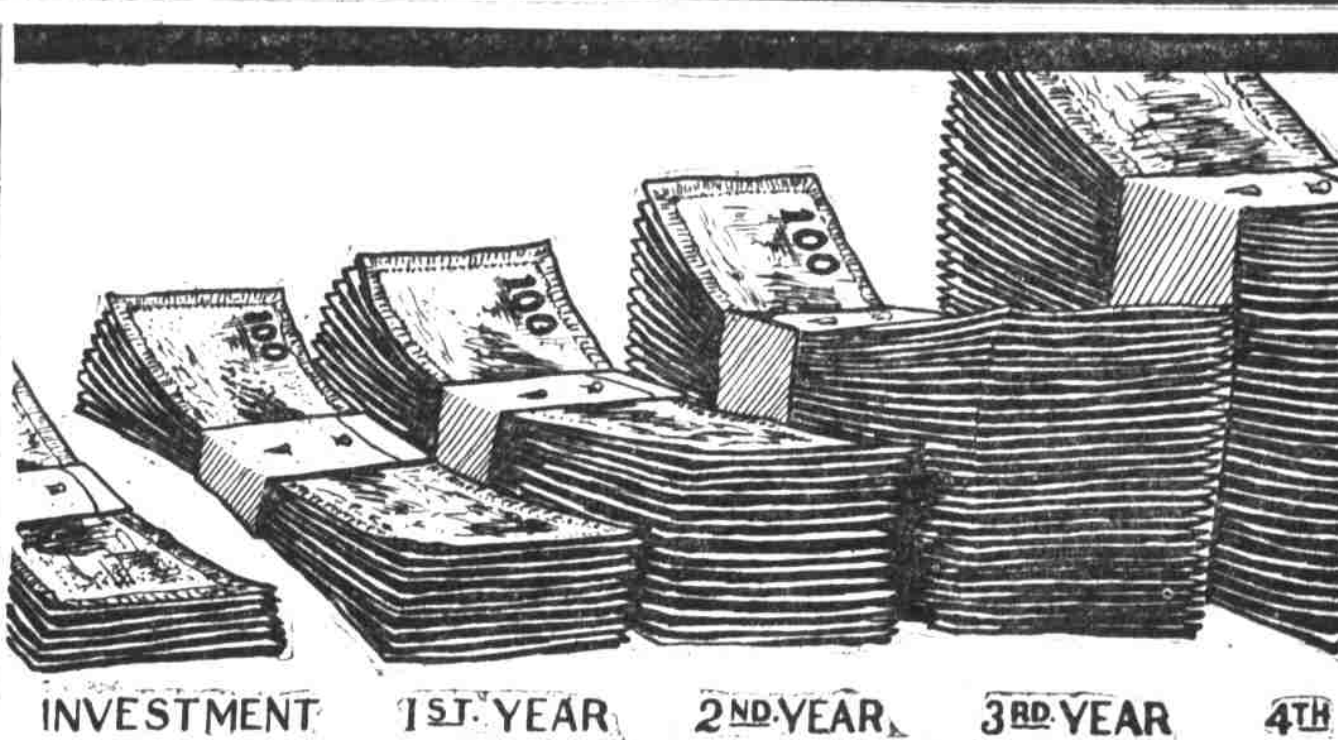
Attorney Greene, city attorney for St. Johns, has expressed himself as being satisfied with the terms of the franchise and advised the council to take the action. He believes the interests of the citizens are safeguarded and that the erection at once of such a plant will greatly aid in building up the city.

S. D. Davidor, president of the company, thanked the council for the action just taken and promised to begin operations at once. A site has already been secured. A bond of \$5,000 is required by the city to assure the enforcement of every detail of the franchise.

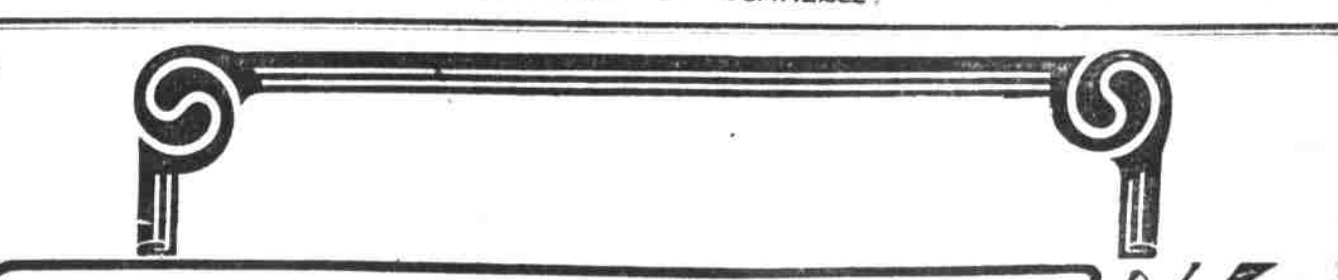
