Rev. J. W. McDougall, the new pastor of the Mount Tabor Methodist church was given a public reception last evening by his congregation, assisted by Bishop David H. Moore of Oregon, Bishop James M. Thoburn of India, Rev. D. L. Rader, editor of the Pacific Christian Advocate, D. W. H. Hollingshead and Rev. Clarence T. Wilson. Welcoming remarks were made by the different members of the clergy and several prominent laymen. The hope was expressed that the new pastor would succeed in building a \$20,000 church during his pastorate.

By the decision of Judge Gantenbein in the circuit court, G. W. Stewart yesterday won his suit against Charles R. Hansen Jr., a local employment agent. He produced proof that after being employed to go to drain his baggage was lost on the way. He said he had no clothing to enable him to take the job offered him, and he spent 19 days looking for the baggage. In the lower court Stewart received judgment for \$120. Hansen appealed and under the decision of Judge Gantenbein he will have to pay only \$80.

Councilman Belding will introduce an ordinance at the meeting of the city council this afternoon extending the west side fire limits to include the waterfront. The ordinance will prohibit the construction of wooden wharves and is considered the first step in the improvement of the waterfront. The next move to improve this district will be an ordinance for the construction of a concrete seawall along the harbor line. This measure is being fathered by Harbormaster Spicer.

Corby, Mrs. Barker, violin; Miss Hazel Davis, piano. The public is invited.

For stealing a suit of clothes and \$2.50 in cash, James Hoodin, 69 years old and who has been familiar on the streets of Portland because of the fact that most of his time has been spent in leading blind men about town for a small remuneration, will have to spend 12 months in the county jail. He was sentenced by Judge Cameron this morning. It was proven that Hoodin took the clothes and money from a room in the Everett house.

The hearing of Joe Golden, suspected by the police of being implicated in the Frohman robbery, was postponed in the municipal court this morning until tomorrow. Golden has repeatedly been arrested by the police but stoutly maintains his innocence. He says he came here with a woman who is sick but he has refused to divulge her whereabouts. Consequently the police are searching the lodging houses for Golden's companion.

J. E. Franklin, convicted yesterday in the federal court of having sent obscene letters through the mails, was sentenced by Judge Wolverson this morning to serve six months in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$250. He will begin the service of his sentence at once. Franklin is a man apparently more than 60 years of age and is reported to be possessed of a considerable fortune.

Volunteers of America wish to call the attention of the public to the fact that an old man is soliciting money on the east side claiming to represent the volunteers. There are no solicitors for the organization in that field at present and the public is asked to investigate before giving to anyone asking in the name of the Volunteers of America or call telephone East 261.

Winslow Meade Circle No. 7, Ladies of the G. A. R., gave a basket social at Drew hall last night. The early part of the evening was passed in playing military whist, Conrad Swan and Mrs. R. L. Benner securing the first prize and S. R. Harrington and Mrs. Carl Abraham the second. Conrad Swan acted as auctioneer and disposed of the baskets.

Travis Bros. have begun suit in the circuit court against Kuntake Bros. for \$12.50 because of the alleged failure of the last named firm to deliver 250 cords of wood on or before October 1, as their contract provided. The contract price for the wood was \$2.35 per cord and the plaintiff states that a supply cannot now be purchased for less than \$4.50.

Judge Frazier in the circuit court yesterday dismissed the case of A. F. Plegel against Peter Dowling, holding that the plaintiff was not entitled to recover. Plegel sued on an alleged verbal contract to complete the delivery of a deed to two lots in Albina, Dowling's wife having refused her assent to the completion of the deed.

Having just moved to the California house in Third street because his room at his former lodging place had been robbed two days before, Jack Martin fell the victim of burglars again early this morning. He lost a gold watch and \$22. The police were called but the robbery watch and money were gone when they arrived.

Articles of incorporation have been filed by the Hellenic Orthodox community, of which the trustees are John Marandes, Gust Goodes and Tom Golemis. The community owns property worth \$2,000 and has an capital stock, being formed for social and religious purposes.

Only 18 years old and in jail charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, is the fate of James E. Melder, who was arrested by Policeman Welch last night. He is suspected of having cashed several worthless checks. W. H. B. Smith is the complainant.

Judge Cleland in the circuit court this morning declined to fine D. D. Coffey

for contempt of court for his failure to pay alimony to his divorced wife, Minnie W. Coffey. The court said he was convinced that Coffey lacks the ability to pay, and is therefore relieved from the requirement of the court order in that regard.

MIGHTY ROAR GOES UP AGAINST CREMATORY

Property Owners Protest That Incinerator Will Be Last Straw.

Property-owners living in the vicinity of the proposed site for the new crematory have risen in mighty protest and signed a petition which sets out their grievances why the incinerator should not be built in their neighborhood along the waterfront on the south side. They declare the erection of the crematory there would destroy property values and make the district undesirable for residences.

As a result of the petition it is not improbable that the members of the special committee selected to choose a crematory site will reconsider their determination and not make a report to the city council this afternoon, despite their instructions to the city auditor to prepare a report recommending the South Portland site to the council.

The report also favored the erection of a crematory in Lower Albina, where the garbage from the east side would be hauled. The west side crematory was to have been built first when conditions would show its inadequacy to handle the garbage problem and forcing the city to erect another incinerator in Lower Albina.

The councilmen are divided as to the best site for the garbage destroyer, but all favor a central location as can be secured. There are several of these within the heart of the city, but the expense of purchasing them would be great, and the councilmen doubt the wisdom of expending large sums for the site alone.
