The Pacific Lumber and Manufacturing company, formed by M. C. Banfield, L. H. Briggs and C. B. Stetson, has filed articles of incorporation. It has a capital stock of \$70,000. Mace's Market has incorporated for \$15,000, the promoters being M. C. Mace, J. E. Mace and A. E. Gebhardt. Another newly incorporated concern is the Phoenix Investment company, having a capital stock of \$5,000, subscribed by Frank E. Geiser, E. D. Geiser and Alexander Sweek. Supplementary articles have been filed by the Clarke-Clemson-Bumgar company, carrying into effect a change of name to the Clarke-Clemson company.

The annual fair of the Ladies' Aid of the Universalist Church of the Good Tidings, to be held December 4 and 5, is already under way in the preparation of the many articles suitable for Christmas use. The special committee, headed by Miss Nellie Crosby, and the home made candy committee, under the direction of Mrs. Chester De Penning, are laying plans to make the fair the most successful in the history of the church. Arrangements have been made to include supper among the list of entertainments, the management of this feature being given to Mrs. Arthur E. Davis.

Mrs. Joan S. Bickerton has made known her objection to having her face smeared with banana peelings by filling suit for divorce from Houghton C. Bickerton, whom she charges with this disgusting act in this city on October 14. She also alleges that she was called bad names and that her husband was habitually intoxicated and threatened her life and his own, she says, and kept the house charged with profanity. She and Bickerton were married in San Francisco in 1904.

Pinned down by an iron press weighing more than 400 pounds in the works of the Doernbecher Manufacturing company, Charles Lovgren of Anabel station on the Mount Scott line, had his skull fractured and the life crushed out of him yesterday afternoon. He was 47 years old, a long-time resident, and with J. P. Treferen handling veneer pulps which are used in the large presses. In some way one of the heavy presses fell on the unfortunate man and instant death resulted. He leaves a widow and five children.

Members of the city council failed to settle the question of selecting a site for the proposed new city crematorium yesterday. Instead, members listened to an ordinance filed by Councilman Belding proposing the installation of a garbage drier. Mr. Belding believes that with the drier the present garbage equipment will be adequate to handle the disposition of the city's garbage for some time to come.

After an automobile trip from Shaniko to Burns and Prineville and other interior Oregon points, on the surveyed lines of the Oregon Eastern, W. W. Cotton and W. D. Skinner will return to Portland tomorrow. It is said Mr. Cotton's business in the interior was to look after tax matters and right-of-way complications for the Harriman road which it is proposed to build through central Oregon.

J. Fontana, an Italian, who was burned together with three other workmen several days ago by an explosion of a steam pipe at the plant of the Portland Gas company, died late yesterday at St. Vincent's hospital. In addition to being badly burned, Fontana inhaled superheated steam which really caused his death. An inquest will be held by Coroner Finley.

Members of the street committee and other councilmen who desire to go will take a trolley ride tomorrow afternoon to test the new airbrakes which the Portland Railway company has installed upon its cars. The party will meet at Washington and Twenty-third streets at 2 o'clock and will have two cars at their disposal.
