ENGLAND FACES RAILWAY STRIKE

Employees Demand Recognition of Union, Shorter Hours and More Pay.

(United Press London Wire.)

London, Oct. 25.—The crisis in the dispute between the railway employees of all England and the railway companies is expected at any moment and present indications are that the demands of the men will be denied, in which event every railway in England will be affected.

The demands of the men are: Eight-hour standard day for all concerned in the movement of vehicles. Ten-hour day for all others, except plate layers.

No man be called out for duty with less than nine hours' rest. Minimum rate and a quarter for all time worked over standard hours.

Sunday duty (i. e., midnight Saturday to midnight Sunday), minimum payment of rate and a half.

Immediate payment of 2 shillings to all grades who do not receive the eight-hour day.

All grades in London district a minimum of 2 shillings per week above country district wages.

Recognition of men's union. The chief demand is the last, as only one British railway recognizes the employees' union, the Northeastern railway. There are 55,000 railway employees, of whom only 25,000 belong to the Amalgamated society. This number includes most of the skilled workmen and signal men.

MAKING JOURNALISTS AT U. OF W. SCHOOL

Experiment Under Direction of Old Newspaper Man Is Arousing Enthusiasm.

University of Washington, Seattle, Oct. 25.—From the work of its school of journalism the University of Washington bids fair to profit in no small degree. Under the direction of Professor Merrill Thorpe, the would-be newspapermen are about to establish an amateur sort of press bureau, which will furnish free of charge to country papers news of university affairs.

When it was first announced last spring that journalism would be added to the University of Washington's curriculum practical newspapermen smiled patronizingly. But Professor Thorpe is himself practical, having held responsible positions on Washington, D. C., San Francisco and London papers, and in the Hearst service, and some of his innovations have been novel in the extreme.

He began on the 20 students who had registered for the course with lectures on methods that are used in gathering, writing and publishing news. He told them how to write heads, how to begin a "story" and all the hundred and one thousand things that a reporter has to learn. Then he made the students do these things.

Now he is organizing the class into a staff, with managing, city, news, society and sporting editors and reporters. The class will be conducted as near as possible like a newspaper office. Assignments are to be given out and the university is to be raked with fine toothed comb for "scops."

All of the stories that are suitable will be mimeographed and mailed to the state's papers.

Mace's Market, a company with a capital stock of \$15,000, was incorporated by M. C. Mace, A. Mace and A. E. Gebhardt.

FOR WHITMAN NO NEW BENEFACTIONS

Anti-Asiatics at Vancouver, B. C., Wildly Excited—Officials Deny.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 25.—In view of the state of the public mind since the recent anti-Asiatic riots, a rumor that the Chinese on board the Empress of China scuttled her causes intense excitement. This report is strenuously denied by the steamship officials, who declare the sinking was the result of gross carelessness.

The ship is steadily rising, two pumps being at work, and it is not expected the Empress will get away more than a day late. Every exertion is being made because of the heavy forfeiture if the mail contract is not fulfilled. Coming on top of all was a story last night that the Empress of Japan was on the rocks at Yokohama. D. E. Brown, superintendent of the Pacific service, said this was impossible, as the Japan, a sister ship of the China, is in port at Hongkong.

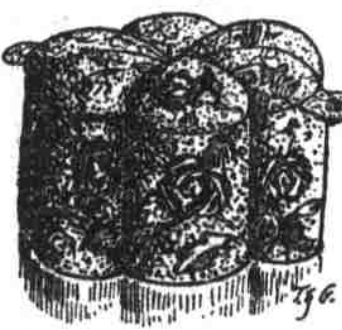
