

MRS. ADAMS STRENGTH IS WITNESS

Fiaince of Late Senator
Brown Is Depended Upon
by Prosecution to Convict
Mrs. Bradley of States-
man's Murder.

New York, Oct. 26.—Mrs. Annie Adams, mother of Maude Adams, and once the fiancée of former United States Senator Arthur Brown of Utah who was killed in the Raleigh hotel, Washington, passed through this city today and had a conference with Assistant District Attorney Givens. She had previously been served with a subpoena to testify at the trial of Mrs. Annie M. Bradley, now under indictment for killing Brown.

The woman who was to have been the wife of the brilliant though erratic Western lawyer, will be the witness by whom the prosecution expects to prove the motive for the murder.

Mrs. Adams was to be her rival, it was Mrs. Adams who was believed by Mrs. Bradley to have been the woman who had been the fiancée of the senator and for whom she had been cast aside after becoming the mother of his children.

The two women will meet for the first time when Mrs. Adams takes the witness stand in the courtroom in Washington during the week of November 11.

Each, it is said, had known of the existence of the other some time before the tragedy. Both had suffered some what Mrs. Adams because she had learned of the engagement that meant she must bear forever the stigma which had attached to her.

Mrs. Adams was supposed by the authorities, it was thought she was in hiding to escape the service of the subpoena. This, it is said, was the case. She is anxious, it is said, to go on the stand, not for the purpose of prosecuting the woman whose deed robbed her of the man to whom she was engaged, but to clear her name from many of the accusations that have been made against her since his death.

Mrs. Adams has been several conferences with Assistant District Attorney Givens of Washington who came to this city to meet her and find out from her many things necessary to the prosecution. In these talks Mrs. Adams gave him all the information desired.

When Mrs. Adams returned to New York several weeks ago she was met by Mr. Givens who came to this city with her. At that time he served the subpoena in the case and asked her to what she would testify. Since then she has been frequently in communication with Washington authorities.

The final act of the clearing house association today was the adoption of a resolution banking Secretary of the Treasury Cortelyou and J. P. Morgan for their services during the time of the crisis.

The regular weekly bank statement issued today showed that the surplus which the banks had at the close of last week was entirely wiped out by the panic, and that a deficit of \$1,232,300 was created instead. A surprising feature of the statement was an increase of loans of \$10,864,760.

It had been expected that the enormous liquidation in the market during the week would have resulted in a considerable decrease in this time. While the excess was clearing in Wall street, from the close of the Mechanical and Trades National bank, No. 665 Broadway, with 12 branches in Manhattan and Brooklyn in the Broadway Trust company, Broadway and Eighth street, made a descent on the two institutions and there were lively withdrawals from the two concerns.

Police Called.

In a run on the Northern Bank of New York, Broadway and Fourth street, there was so much disorder that the police had to be called.

The Broadway Trust company adopted a rule that those who were withdrawing funds should be served with a subpoena to appear in court.

General approval was given to the action of the president of the clearing house association today put into effect the rule which compels the filing of 60 days' notice of intention to withdraw funds.

Praise for Cortelyou.

The following preamble and resolution was offered by J. Edward Simmons, president of the Fourth National bank, seconded by James Stillman, president of the National City bank, and was immediately adopted by the Clearing House association this afternoon.

Thanks were also extended to J. P. Morgan for his prompt aid in a resolution.

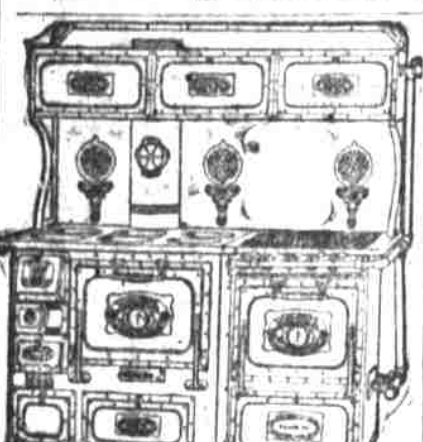
