

DEPOSITORS' HOME BANKERS

Over \$200,000 in Bonds Still Remain to Be Subscribed Before November 1, When Receiver Will Take Matter in His Own Hands.

Five days remain in which depositors of the Oregon Trust & Savings bank may come into the plan of the depositors' association to recover dollar for dollar to the depositors. Receiver Beylin has said he would hold off until November 1 to accommodate these depositors, after which date he will proceed to dispose of the bank's lease and quarters at the corner of Sixth and Washington streets, and dismiss the idea of reorganization of the bank. He will on November 1 ask for bids on the bank's quarters, and a view of the new men have already been inspecting the property with a view to getting in early bids.

For the last few days there have been enough depositors' subscriptions to the Home Telephone bonds to encourage the depositors' association workers, but there remains a wide gap between the total amount taken and the \$1,000,000 that must be subscribed before a reorganization of the bank can be seriously considered.

The Home Telephone bonds, which are now generally recognized to be the best securities of the bank, cannot legally be distributed among the depositors unless the plan of reorganization is worked out fully. Only on that basis would the receiver consider the proposed distribution.

If the depositors sign applications for \$1,000,000 of the Home Telephone bonds, the reorganization committee and the receiver will cooperate to secure for them the desired distribution, after which the bank will, it is believed, be able to get on its feet again.

The Home Telephone company, which is a creditor of the bank to the extent of \$150,000, has sufficient confidence in the bank's ability to regain its equilibrium that it has consented to accept long time certificates in lieu of its claims and take its chances on the ultimate success of the reorganization, if the depositors will do their part.

Believe They Have Choice.
"The only reason now given by those depositors who decline to take Home Telephone bonds is that they don't want them," said President John L. Day of the depositors' association. "They admit that the bonds are the best security in the bank, but they appear to believe they have a choice in the matter, and can take their cash if they prefer it."

"The weak side of this view is that their cash is gone, and is no longer where it can be recovered for them. They are in the position of the man who was playing the game of 'how you see it, and now you don't see it.' The money is not there, and will not be there, and the only way left for the depositor to get his money back is to take a good telephone bond and hold it until he gets a chance to realize the cash on it. In the meantime the bond will be paying him 6 per cent interest, which is considered by the best financiers as very good revenue from a safe long time mortgage security."

INTERIOR OREGON VAST TERRITORY OF RICHES

Railroad and Bank Officials Travel by Auto From Prineville to Burns—Great Isolated Region Presents Surprising Features of Productiveness.

"A magnificent country," "Best roads in Oregon," "Splendid fruits and vegetables; good grain."

These and other expressions were heard last night from members of a party that returned from an automobile trip through central Oregon. Embarking in the autumn Shamko last Monday, they made the trip of about 550 miles through the hills of Oregon and returned by train reaching home last night. That the roads were good is an assertion that needs no further proof. The party consisted of W. W. Cotton, general attorney for the O. R. & N. Co.; C. L. Adams, president of the Security Savings & Trust company; W. H. Ayer, president of the Eastern & Western Lumber company; W. D. Skinner, assistant general freight agent of the Harriman lines in Oregon.

"After you travel a few days through that country you conclude that there are enough government lands to supply the needs of a few states," said Mr. Adams. "I know of an all Oregon. They put our western Oregon roads to the blush."

They traveled in the auto 187 miles in one day, the route "by" from Shamko to Prineville, then to Burns, where we headed to the east and visited the valleys of the Pioneer and Blitzen rivers and saw the big French Glenn ranch. We were not troubled with dust nor unpleasant conditions of any kind. It was a splendid trip. The weather was fine, a little crisp in the mornings, but no ice anywhere. There was no bust-

ness done on the trip. It was purely a pleasure trip. One of the experiences here out a statement made by Mr. Harriman to the effect that there were coyotes in central Oregon. The party indulged in a coyote hunt and bagged four. This success so encouraged them that they ventured upon the keen excitement of a jackrabbit chase, with fair luck. Jackrabbits do not, as a rule, wait to make any special study of an automobile at close range.

Mr. Ayer characterized the trip as "quail." He said it was a splendid country, and extremely interesting at every mile of the journey. It was his first trip through central Oregon, and in spite of the many favorable things he has heard about it the trip was a revelation.

"It is a great, magnificent territory, susceptible of enormous development. Prineville is a fine town at the beginning of the trip. Over in the Harney valley the conditions are surprising. There is a better growth of wild grass there, and many good ranches that produce large crops. At Burns we saw an exhibit of Harney county products. The grain was full headed, and had a good stand of straw. The fruit were fine, and included splendid peaches. All the fruits and vegetables were fully developed. I am of the opinion that the growing season is sufficiently long to develop the principal fruits and products of Oregon. The crops are good, and the people of interior Oregon are prosperous. This trip was an extremely enjoyable one, from the start to the finish."

SYNDICATE OF CROOKS FORCED TO DISHONEST

Paris Police Tracing Down Black Gang Which Is Led by Important and Wealthy Personages of International Influence.

London, Oct. 26.—Conan Doyle never invented an imaginary crime syndicate as remarkable as the real one against which the Paris police are seeking evidence all over Europe.

Paris is the headquarters and France its main field of operations. It is always on the lookout for profitable "jobs" in other countries, however, and it is believed it can be connected with crimes in every country in Europe. While French secret service agents think they already know the head men as well as many subordinates, arrests are being delayed pending the quest for still more conclusive evidence.

Antoine Thomas, of a wealthy family at Clermont-Ferrand, through whose confession the existence of the "black gang" as it is known, was revealed, is the only prisoner thus far. He himself held a comparatively unimportant post in the organization. He gave himself up, he said to save his sweetheart, who had fallen under the influence of the police inquiry. The organization is said to be managed by a secret governing committee of men so prominent that their names will create an international sensation. District agents are in charge of operations in their provinces and abroad and under them are veritable armies of thieves and receivers of stolen goods.

The leaders know they are under surveillance but seem to rely on their influence, financial strength and skill to protect them.

FLOODS DAMAGE NORTHERN ITALY

Landslides and Avalanches of Mud Are Destroying Valuable Property.

Rome, Oct. 26.—Floods such as the country has not known in generations are sweeping northern Italy, the Neapolitan provinces and the island of Sicily.

Drownings, landslides, avalanches of mud, the collapse of buildings, train wrecks due to softened tracks, the flight of panic-stricken thousands from their homes and incalculable property loss are reported from a score of cities. The list of dead may mount into the hundreds. The financial damage will amount to millions.

The cities of Mantova, Laveno and Cambino and a dozen villages which line its shore are inundated to a depth of several feet along the banks of Lake Maggiore.

Government Mail Clerks Are Compelled to Steal Mail to Provide Medicine and Food for Families—Three Sent to Prison.

Chicago, Oct. 26.—Three postal clerks were sentenced to prison today in the federal court. Judge Heiber made the sentence light because of the stories the men told. Their statements were reinforced tonight by the declaration of the superintendent of mail clerks in the Chicago postoffice that no man with a family has any business entering the postal service as a clerk.

Each of the three men sentenced today had a family. Each had a sickness in his family. Each received \$500 a year as salary. Each testified that he stole because that was the only way to provide for his wife and children and leave any margin for medicines. Two of the men got two years each; the other got three years. They were John Semlow, two years; H. I. Mills, two years; John Shreve, three years.

Semlow has a wife and four children. His wages of \$50 a month he explained, made \$10 for each member of the family. That was approximately \$12.50 a day for each of the five. But that amount would not do for him, so he stole to buy his lunches and care for his sick family. The organization to lay school books for the children.

Recently two members of the family became sick. Semlow fell behind, owed the doctor, grocer, baker and butcher. He stole 18 letters and was detected.

Mills' story was similar. He leaves a wife and four children. Shreve, a colored man, leaves a wife, who is a chronic invalid, and four children. He got the three years because his offenses covered a longer period than the others.

Revelation of the conditions of these employees aroused a storm in Chicago, but the superintendent of mail clerks said: "I have no sympathy for these men. I wish them that if they come here they have no business to enter the service. Most of them lie to get here. Then they never try to violate their trust. After that we have to keep \$2,000 a year from all night watching \$500 a year from each of them stealing. That is a day passes by like a good reason to suggest a new man. If we were to push our investigations we would soon have a list of names in Chicago we pay the men \$500 a year. In other offices they are paid as low as \$100."

BRAIN WORTH SIX MILLIONS

Morris Rosenthal Draws a Thousand Dollars a Day From Standard.

New York, Oct. 26.—It was learned today that Morris Rosenthal, the Standard Oil's \$1,000 a day lawyer, is originator of the unique defense to be made by the \$100,000,000 corporation in the government suit to dissolve it. It was his conception of the defense that caused the Standard to employ him at the unprecedented salary which began last spring. Estimating Rosenthal's salary to represent a return of 8 per cent in property value, his friends here figure that the actual market value of his brain exceeds \$6,000,000. As it is, it is his brains for which the Standard pays his price.

"It is astounding when you think of it," said a friend today. "Consider that if he should be run over by a street car, killed in a wreck or lose his mind, a machine with a money producing power equal to \$6,000,000 would pass out of existence."

Rosenthal's friends say he is a "thinking machine." There is little in his clean cut appearance to suggest heavy mental powers. His face is unmarked by a wrinkle. Rosenthal evidently believes his body is the strong box in which the treasure is stored away. He will not talk in connection with his strength and health, but preaches fresh air incessantly.

"I stay in bed eight hours every night," he said. "Whether I am able to sleep or not, I always stay the full time. I go through physical exercises for 15 minutes when I get up and then take a cold plunge."

MISSISSIPPI SHERIFF MURDERED BY NEGRO

Mob Threatens to Lynch Black if It Is Successful in Making Capture.

Carrollton, Miss., Oct. 26.—Sheriff W. C. McDougal of Carroll county was assassinated by a negro, Bob Meyers, whom he attempted to arrest at Miskelly farm, 10 miles north of this point today. Bloodhounds are on the trail of Meyers and a lynching is expected if the black is captured.

Meyers was charged with the larceny of clothes from the Neil plantation, east of the city.

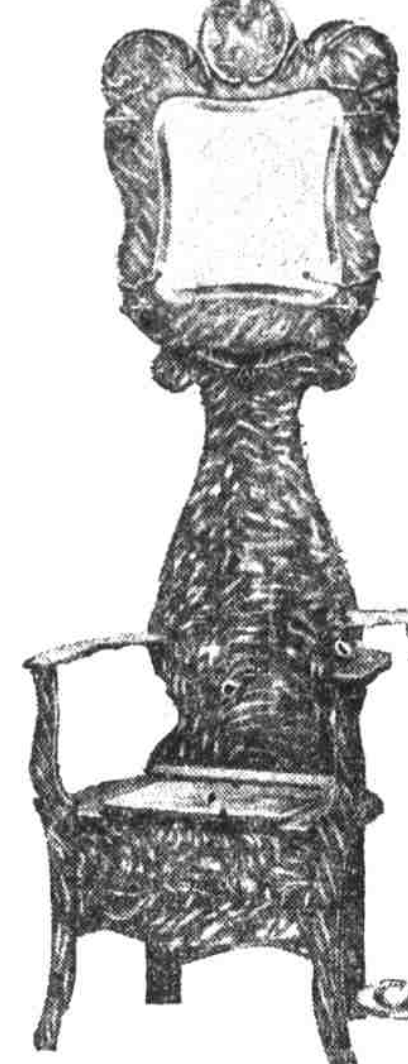
