LID TIGHTENED WITH \$15 NAIL

Franz Felder Pays Costs of Opening Saloon on Sunday.

Franz Felder, a saloonkeeper at Fourth and Taylor streets, was fined \$15 by Judge Cameron today for dispensing liquor on Sunday. The injunction occupied the hour, Felder and his son Joe flatly contradicting Policeman Kay, who swore he saw a customer in the saloon. Kay observed three men holding a bottle over a bottle and smashed the door. Felder resisted, and his son testified the old man took a drink of whiskey. The third man escaped and they declared the policemen were victims of optical illusion. Police charged Kay with "swiping" the glasses introduced as evidence from behind the bar, and when the quart bottle, adorned with a famous label, was offered as Exhibit A, Felder exclaimed: "Why, the bottle was full!" Police confirmed the fact and suspicious glances were exchanged by court and officers.

SHOOT DEER IN DUCK PRESERVE

Three-Year-Old Buck Killed While Swimming on Sauvies Island.

A three-year-old two-point buck was killed yesterday on a duck preserve on Sauvies Island, 15 miles below Portland in the Columbia sloughs. The deer was shot by Charles W. Henry, son of Charles K. Henry, real estate dealer, and Dr. Jean Cline. The two hunters shot simultaneously as the animal was stamping the water from its coat after emerging from the water. The deer was swimming across the water when first discovered by the party of duck hunters, and was at first taken for a lone duck. As it drew near its slim horns took form and the head of the young buck was easily discovered over the water. Taking a position about 125 feet from where the buck evidently had decided to land they waited until he came from the water. Each having given the other ample time to shoot, pulled the triggers of their respective shotguns and the deer dropped in his tracks with a bird-shot wound in his neck and another just behind the shoulder.

DEAD BANK CLERK WAS SHORT IN ACCOUNTS

Fred Boron's Suicide Is Explained by Missing Twenty-five Thousand.

Akron, O., Oct. 28.—It was discovered today that Fred A. Boron, cashier and treasurer of the Dollar Savings bank, who committed suicide Sunday was short \$25,000. A complete investigation of his books will be made after his funeral.

CRIME ON INCREASE

Crime is on the increase in the city and as few of the offenders have been caught the thugs seem to feel at liberty to hold up people. The north end is said to be infested with vicious looking characters who have recently drifted into town from outside cities. One report is that many criminals from southern and central California have made their way to the northwest and think they have a lucrative field for practice here. The same complaint has been received concerning criminals from Seattle and Tacoma. The police here are anxious to bring some of the offenders to justice.

ONE LEGGED NEGRO MURDERER'S VICTIM

Willows, Calif., Oct. 28.—George Coleman murdered a one-legged negro about four miles north of Butte City, last night. Coleman is a high colored man. No particulars have been received. Officers and a coroner's jury left for the scene this morning.

WILSON DIES FROM INJURIES AT SEATTLE

Seattle, Oct. 28.—James F. Wilson, who was injured in the automobile accident in which State Senator Vandevanter lost his life on the last day of the racing meet at The Meadows, has succumbed to his injuries. Wilson took an active part in state politics.
