Portland Committee Sees Great Future for Country Now Developing.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Klamath Falls, Or., Oct. 28.—The Klamath excursion party returned from a trip down the valley yesterday, having been the guests of J. Frank Adams of Merrill. They left this city Monday afternoon, driving to Merrill, where they spent the night, then on to Bonanza, looking over the upper project. On their return they held a meeting and drew up a set of resolutions thanking the people of Klamath county for their hospitable treatment, and among other things said:

"Resolved, That it is the unanimous opinion of our party that the opportunities and advantages of Klamath county are unlimited, and that it is our firm belief that in the near future this section will become one of the very richest portions of Oregon. We firmly believe that it offers a most excellent field for investment at the present time, and it is our desire to call the attention of the people of this state to this fertile, productive and in every way desirable district in order that they may be induced to make a personal examination of this region and see for themselves, as we have seen, the many splendid opportunities thereof."

CASHED DRAFT WHEN PANIC WAS IN FORCE

Dunphy, a miner and a stockholder in the First National bank, Sumpter, Ore., said last night: "During the spectacular scenes of last Thursday in New York, when President Thomas of the stock exchange was wildly rushing an appeal to Sullivan and Morgan to save the exchange from destruction, I walked into the Hanover National bank with a letter of credit on my bank for \$2,000 and it was honored without hesitation. Dunphy spent two months looking into conditions in the east and made important mining deals. Especially gratifying to him was the confidence entertained by New York bankers in the stability of western banks."

LANDSLIDE CRASHES INTO PASSENGER CARS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Spokane, Wash., Oct. 28.—The O. R. & N. passenger No. 4 narrowly missed being wrecked Saturday between Grange City and Wallula, on the Snake river. The train was running at good speed when a landslide started down a steep hill toward the river. Rocks weighing 20 pounds went through the windows and scared but did not injure any of the passengers. The damage done to the cars amounts to only a few dollars.

ASTORIA WANTS BIG NAVY YARD

Chamber of Commerce Takes Action in Matter Through Manager Whyte.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Astoria, Or., Oct. 28.—The matter of the government establishing a naval station in the Columbia river near its mouth is being taken up actively by Manager Whyte of the chamber of commerce and in furthering that end the following letter was today mailed by him to the secretary of the navy: "The chamber of commerce of this city has directed me to write to you suggesting the strategic importance of the Columbia river harbor as a place for a naval station. The importance of this harbor for such a station as compared with Puget sound, lies in this: that on one side of Puget sound, the British government controls, and therefore, in case of war, a naval station on the sound would, in no wise, be as secure as such a station on the Columbia river. The successful deepening of the water over the bar at the mouth of the Columbia river through the aid of the jetty which is being rapidly pushed to completion, will afford a depth of water sufficient to accommodate the largest ships in the American navy. We wish also to call your attention to the fact that Astoria is soon to become one of the most important railroad centers in the northwest, and as the Columbia river drains one sixth of the total area of the United States, all of the products of the northwest must naturally come to the seacoast through the mouth of this river. We would be glad to cooperate with you in any way you may command should you at any time make an investigation of the conditions which would be involved in the construction of a naval station. A copy of this letter is being sent to our representatives in congress with the request that they talk this matter over with you."

INDIANS TO WORK ON NEW RAILWAY

Tribesmen from Klamath Reservation Hired by Railway.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Klamath Falls, Or., Oct. 28.—Construction work on the California Northwestern railway is being prosecuted with vigor. There are about 60 men now at work and this force is expected to be increased very shortly with Indians from the reservation and their teams.

At Dorris no grading is being done as yet, but there is every evidence of a thriving town. Two large mercantile stores are doing business; the building for the Bank of Dorris is about completed, and is a credit to a small city; a large hotel is nearing completion; foundations are ready for the buildings to be moved over from the old town of Picard, three miles away; there is a jewelry store nearly ready for business, a furniture store open, a paint shop, meat market and several saloons. Lots in Dorris have been ready sellers and several first purchasers have resold at a good profit.

Twenty miles across a level sagebrush plain is Mount Hebron, and here the grading is nearly completed for the track, yards and station grounds. The Weed Lumber company has a lumber shed already constructed and will put up a good hotel, lumber for which is now on the ground. Between Mount Hebron and the present end of the track construction camps are every few miles, and good work is being done.

Bray presents quite the appearance of a railroad center. A two-story depot is in course of construction, the offices of Construction Engineer Hoy are located there and a regular train runs from Weed, bringing passengers and freight. There is steel at Bray to lay track to Dorris.

The track from Grass Lake to Bray is in fine condition and the roadbed has no equal in the country. A first-class road is being built, which will be the main line for all through traffic to Portland from San Francisco.

BOY IS FINED FOR WHIPPING TEACHER.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Echo, Or., Oct. 28.—Willie Hoskins of this place, was fined \$40 Saturday evening by Justice of the Peace Gillette on the charge of having beaten the principal of the Echo school, L. W. Keeler, about two weeks ago. The trial lasted nearly all day Saturday.

Hoskins is a lad of about 17 years of age. The district attorney, G. W. Phelps, of Tillamook county, was for the prosecution.
