

# HEARS HELPS RYAN IN FIGHT AGAINST TAYLOR

"Pin Head" McCarthy's Chances of Election Improved By Action of Newspaper Which Thinks Present Frisco Mayor Too Old for Job.

San Francisco, Oct. 25.—With the municipal election little more than a week away San Francisco is one big political talk fest, and the towns across the bay and down the peninsula are filled with the same kind of noise. The second trial of T. L. Ford for complicity in the trolley franchise bribery trial, even though everybody realizes that the acquittal of Ford would make the conviction of Patrick Calhoun, president of the United Railroads, almost impossible.

Oakland, Berkeley, Alameda, San Rafael, San Mateo, Burlingame, and even San Jose, 50 miles away, seem as keenly interested in the mayoral campaign as San Francisco itself. These towns are all for Mayor Taylor, nominee of the Democrats and the Good Government league, but none of them can give him any votes. Nevertheless, men who live across the bay and down the peninsula wear Taylor buttons, and as many of the voters in San Francisco are engaged in business here, the strength of the Taylor movement is uncertain. Sometimes a dozen Taylor men get together and after comparing notes find that they haven't more than four or five votes in the crowd. Yet the supporters of the mayor are confident, and look for his election by from 8,000 to 10,000 majority. Walter McCarthy and J. W. Sweeney, prominent labor leaders, have taken the stump in his behalf, and they are expected to influence many votes.

**McCarthy Backs Ryan.**  
A new development that makes the issue of the campaign uncertain is the growing strength of Daniel A. Ryan, the Republican nominee. A week ago the Ryan campaign was poorly attended and seldom enthusiastic. So gloomy was the outlook that Ryan's followers were despondent. Then suddenly the Examiner, owned and published by William R. Hearst, came out with a broadside against P. H. McCarthy, the labor nominee, and declared itself for Ryan for mayor. Instantly the followers of Ryan took courage and went to work with a will. Now the Ryan meetings are large and enthusiastic, and participants of the other two candidates admit that the Democrats are in a bad way. McCarthy men say that Ryan is the greatest loser. The labor forces behind McCarthy have a better organization than either the Republicans, Democrats or the Good Government league. Chairman Thomas F. Finn of the labor county committee says: "This is a pipe. The other two fellows will break pretty near even, and we'll get at least 25,000 votes." If Finn is right McCarthy will win by 10,000 or more, but most of the politicians believe that there will be a difference of several thousand in the vote of Taylor and Ryan.

**McGowan for Gratters.**  
District Attorney Langdon is giving Frank McGowan, his opponent a merry chase. Langdon has three nominations, and in addition to the bulk of the Democratic, Republican and good government vote expects to draw heavily from the labor party. Many business men are against him, but he is offsetting this defection to some extent by declaring in every address he makes that his opponent intends if elected to let the big grafters go unpunished. Langdon has publicly accused the United Railroads of opening a sack to defeat him but has not yet gone into particulars. Francis J. Heney will make one speech in Langdon's behalf next week, possibly two. Thus far he has been too busy with the graft prosecutions to take an active part in the campaign.

Detective William J. Burns, now a registered voter of San Francisco, has taken on himself the task of keeping unqualified citizens from taking part in the election. Several of his sleuths are looking up the addresses of suspects who have registered, and men who are planning to cast illegal ballots may participate in a little unpleasantness at the polls.

## KING ALFONSO IS LOSING LIFE

Spanish Ruler Is In Grip of Consumption and Physicians Are Alarmed.

Madrid, Oct. 25.—There is no longer any doubt that Alfonso XIII is suffering from tuberculosis, the hereditary scourge of his family. When the report that the king had consumption was first made, every effort was put forth to discredit it. Now the malady has made such inroads that further denial is useless. The king's face, his listless manner and his growing weakness all attest that he is in the grip of the disease.

His physicians are said to be gravely alarmed over his case. They have advised that during the visit he now contemplates making to London he consult a noted English specialist on tuberculosis. On the decision of this physician the king's fate will rest.

Following the instructions given to the king's escorts by his physicians, he will travel incognito as the Duke of Medo and every effort will be made to insure him privacy and entire quiet, both going and returning.

During his youth and early manhood the open air life led by Alfonso and the horseback riding of which he was fond served to stay the ravages of his inherited curse. His cheeks took on a more healthy tinge. He was over of slender build and appeared to enjoy fairly good health.

Since assuming the cares of his royal office, however, the tax upon Alfonso's vitality has been more marked, until the symptoms of tuberculosis became more and more distinct and the physicians finally ordered him to take a complete rest. They also prohibited him from further horseback riding and compelled him to abandon his habit of taking a cold plunge every morning.

## FIGHTING FOR LARGE REWARD

Ten Men Claim Forty Thousand for Capture of Railroad Robbers.

Spokane, Wash., Oct. 25.—The main point of interest now in connection with the alleged train robbers who held up and robbed the Great Northern express at Rondo, securing \$40,000, is the fight over the reward. Besides Thomas Riley and J. E. Howe, who came with the robbers from Bonanza Ferry, three others of that town, namely, S. E. Cummings, hotel proprietor, H. B. Walton, railroad agent, and S. E. Henry, an attorney, are after the money, and five Spokane detectives also claim a finger in the pie. The matter is now in the hands of attorneys and it may go to court. The reward is \$10,000 each, for arrest and conviction, offered by the government; \$5,000 offered by the insurance company, and \$10,000 offered by the Great Northern company.

## LOEB RETURNS FROM HUNT IN MONTANA

## NEVADA IS SAFE.
