

HENEY TELLS OF KIDNAPING

Graft Prosecutor Slips Out of Trap While on Witness Stand in Older Case.

(Pacific Coast Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, Oct. 29.—Francis J. Heney was the only witness called Monday in the case against Luther W. Brown and R. Porter Ash for the kidnaping of Fremont Older. Attorney Schlesinger tried to draw from the witness an admission that he had intended to go to Los Angeles and appear for Older there, but Heney denied that this was so, and insisted that his sole intention was to learn more of the methods of Luther Brown and Rogers, in the interests of the prosecution here.

An affidavit from Assistant District Attorney McComas of Los Angeles was produced in evidence, containing the telegram Heney sent asking that the case against Older be continued until after the Ford trial. In the telegram Heney said:

"I desire to appear for him (Older) at the preliminary examination," and also made the statement that Older was a witness for the prosecution in the Ford trial.

In explanation of the latter statement, Heney said that Older would have been a witness had Ford denied that he sent Lewis F. Hyington to ask immunity. The witness protested that he had no intention of appearing actually as Older's counsel.

"I wanted to make sure that the witnesses were not suborned again by Luther Brown, because I had heard that he and Earl Rogers were in the business of suborning jurors and witnesses, and also that they owned the justice of the peace down there, that he and Walter Parker had him put in and also the two constables who came up here and who aided in the kidnaping of Older. I also heard that he controlled the district attorney's office and that Walter Parker had appointed every deputy in it."

Hyington declared last evening that Heney's insinuation that Hyington had sought immunity at the hands of the prosecution was absolutely false.

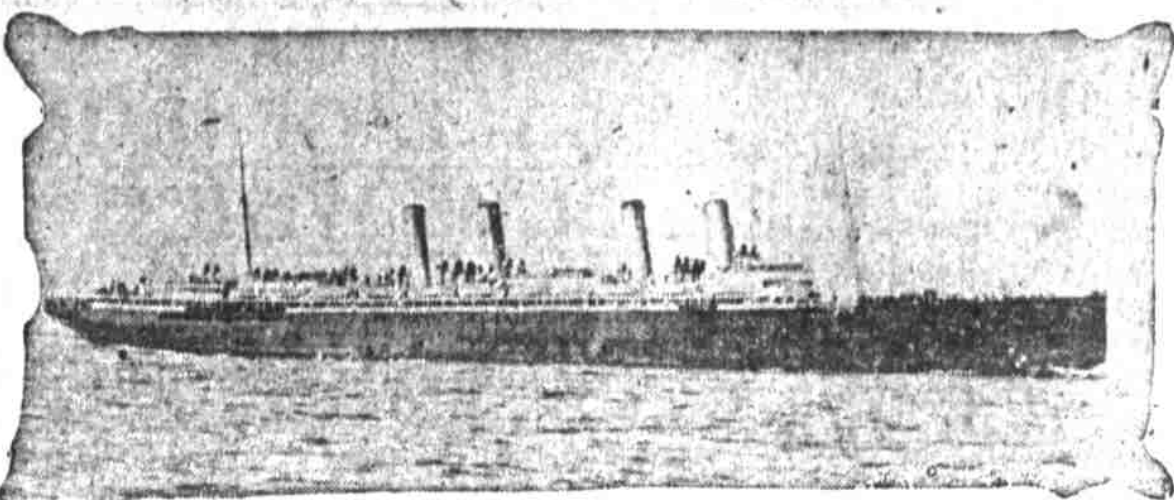

BOARD WILL GET AFTER ODOR THAT TAKES CHARM FROM GLASS OF BEER

WILL BUILD MORE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

New High for East Side—Additions to Be Built to Others.

At a meeting of the board of education last night the members decided to recommend the erection of a new high school building, as well as the addition of 40 rooms to the present school buildings, including the erection of a new eight-room school in Northwest Irvington. The cost of construction will be between \$250,000 and \$300,000, and the question of issuing bonds for \$150,000 will be submitted to the voters at the December election.

The board meeting was well attended by residents of the districts in which new buildings and additional facilities are needed and a discussion resulted regarding the proposed work. The east side was favored as the proper place for the new high school. The city owns three acres in Upper Albina known as the Patton tract, which is considered the best location for the high school building.

That the board was in earnest in its work was shown by its order to Architect Jones to prepare plans for additions to the Shaver and Arleta schools. Six rooms will be added to the Shaver school building and eight at Arleta. Eight rooms will also be added at Sellwood, four at Peninsula and four at Richmond.

Councilman Vaughn was present as a representative of the North East Side and urged the board members to build the new high school on the Patton tract. He said that such a building is badly needed in the neighborhood to relieve the rapidly growing population which is not conveniently situated to the other high schools.

Chairman Wittenberg said the board had under consideration the plan of the same for some time and that he could assure the people the question would be submitted to the taxpayers at the December election.

About two years will be required to construct the new high school building. The board, building sufficiently large to meet the requirements of the district will be erected here will be taken to have the structure large enough to meet the future population as well as the present.

RATS BITE EACH OTHER TO DEATH

Tacoma Health Officer Has Virus That Fixes the Plague Spreaders.

Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 29.—Health Officer Green has a brand new method of ridding Tacoma of rats. He has secured a rat virus which he claims has been very successfully used in the east. This is mixed with oatmeal and placed in reach of the rats, which devour it greedily. The sickness produced by the virus is something like "rat rabies" and the smitten rodents run about in their dens biting each other and thus spread the disease rapidly. Those bitten die, according to Dr. Green, in a few days, according to Dr. Green.

He says half a dozen rats that have had a feed of the oatmeal virus are sufficient to spread the disease well over the waterfront of a city, the rodents contributing to bite one another until they are all virtually killed off.

The presence of bubonic plague in Seattle has caused a scare here and some of the first preventives to be undertaken is the ridding the city of rats. Dr. Green proposes his "rat virus" as an easier and cheaper method of eliminating the rats than by offering a bounty for rat scalps, which is being considered.

WANTS MARRIAGE DECLARED VOID

Mrs. Catherine Juchem Claims Daughter's Age Was Misrepresented.

San Francisco, Oct. 29.—Mrs. Catherine Juchem has asked the superior court to annul the marriage, in Portland, Oregon, on September 6, 1906, of her daughter, Adaline Irene Richmond, to Lorenzo Segurini, claiming that the girl was only 16 years old, that her father was dead and that her mother, the plaintiff, did not give her consent to the marriage.

The records of the county clerk's office show that a marriage license was issued to Louis Segurini and Adaline I. Richmond on September 26, 1906, and that they were married the same day by Rev. Charles W. Hays at the minister's residence. Mrs. Frank B. Jones swore to the affidavit, giving Segurini's age as 23 and the bride's age as 19. Mrs. Jones was also one of the legal witnesses of the marriage ceremony, the other being her husband.

County Clerk Fields says that since he has been in office there have been at least 50 cases in which indignant parents have come to the office after licenses have been issued and declared that their sons or daughters were under age and parental consent for marriage had not been given. But so far as the office is concerned the issuance of the license in each case was regular.

"The whole difficulty comes in the witnesses who swear to the affidavit," said Mr. Fields. "They do the swearing, and we do not know that they are not telling the truth. I would be glad if there were some way to reach this matter, but the parents nearly always conclude, after they have thought it over, that the best thing to do is to cause no trouble."

Still, the word "holiday" as used by Governor Chamberlain and the lawyers, does not carry with it a vacation for the county officers and their deputies. They are relieved of a large mass of work, but in the county offices there are always some odd jobs and ends that require attention whenever there is a breathing space. In the county clerk's office, for instance, the work of recording goes on, and the clerk is far behind on the delivery of recorded papers.

After consulting with Judge Cleland this morning, the county clerk decided that he would not refuse to issue marriage licenses, but every applicant will be informed that he or she may have chances on any possible complication that may result. Evidently the closing of the banks had a deterrent effect on the prospective bride and groom.

The clerk's office will also issue hunters' licenses for those who desire to spend their holidays in pursuit of game. About one month of the hunting season is left.

The judges of the circuit court set on banc for about one minute this morning. Judge Cleland made formal announcement that there will be no court before next Monday, unless the situation is altered by another proclamation by the governor.

"Legal holiday means no judicial day," said Judge Cleland later when asked about the effect of the governor's action on the business in the courts. The cases that have been set for the next five days will have to be reset and go over until December, as the docket is full up to that time. There can be no legal filings of papers on a holiday, but I suppose there would be no objection to the issuance of marriage licenses. Ordinary business matters, outside of legal business, should not be affected.

BURGULARS ROB HOME WHILE FAMILY'S GONE

Jewels and Other Valuables Stolen From Home of Dr. S. J. Barber.

Burglars entered the residence of Dr. S. J. Barber, 505 Yamhill street, Saturday afternoon while the family was absent. Entrance to the house was gained through the front door and both a jewelry case and trunk broken open and the contents rifled.

A gold watch and long gold chain, an old-fashioned bracelet, gold neck chain and jeweled pendant, pearl and diamond coin purse, book of streetcar tickets and several other small articles were taken. The burglar was reported at police headquarters and detectives detailed. It is believed the house was burglarized by a woman while someone else outside stood guard.
