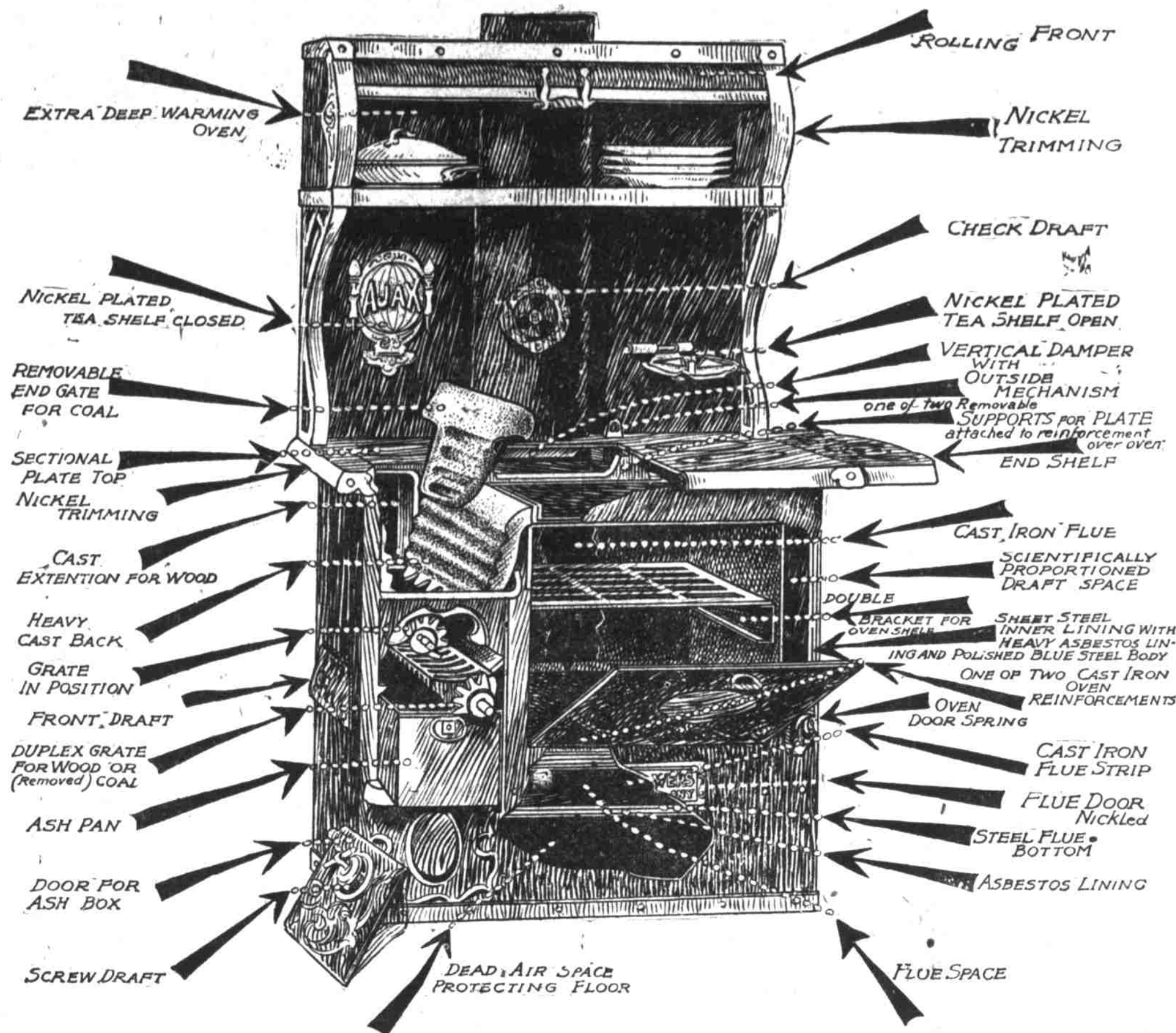

TWENTY CENTS FOR HOTEL ROOM

Mills' New York House Reported Good Thing for Wage Earners.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) New York, Oct. 29.—The New Mills hotel, at Seventh avenue and Thirty-sixth street, which was opened recently, is undoubtedly a success. There was a goodly line of men on the sidewalk waiting for the doors to open, and 82 registered in the first hour of the opening. It had been the plan to open only the lowest floor of the 14 sleeping floors on the first day, but at 4 o'clock it was found necessary to add the fifth. At 9 o'clock about 600 rooms were occupied and new arrivals were filing past the two registry offices in steady lines. There are 1,878 sleeping rooms in the hotel. The restaurant in the basement, which is open to the public, including

women, did a good first day's business. Here one may eat a la carte with 5 cents for a minimum, or he may order a table d'hôte luncheon for 25 cents and a dinner for 30 cents.

The regular dinner included a choice of two soups, choice of baked bluenose, a la creole, boiled leg of mutton with caper sauce, chicken fricasse with rice, hamburger steak with onions, fried calf's brains with tomato sauce, roast prime ribs of beef, roast venison, currant jelly, macaroni au gratin, two out of six vegetables, choice of four kinds of dessert and tea, coffee or milk, all for 30 cents.

The first man who registered was a patron of the Mills hotels from their inception in 1897, having registered in the Bleeker street No. 1 on its first day. He is employed by an insurance company, and 16 years ago was pretty well down and \$1,500 in debt. He began with a 20-cent room, gradually paid up the debt, changed to a 30-cent room, and now, even with the world and amply able to afford a hotel with greater charges, has taken a 40-cent room—the best the house affords—in the new hotel.

He is a marked illustration of the fulfillment of D. O. Mills' statement of the purpose of the hotels, made 10 years ago. ago. "The Mills hotel," the philanthropist said then, "is intended for self-respecting, self-supporting men who desire cleanliness, comfort and convenience, but want also to lay up something toward obtaining an independence."

The building is of steel construction, faced with limestone, light brick and terra cotta. It is entirely fireproof. The floors are granolithic upon concrete arches. There are free baths, free reading rooms, a barber shop, where a good shave costs 10 cents.

PRAYERS OFFERED FOR PRINCESS

Old German Custom Is Followed—Removal of Navy Yard—Berlin Notes.

Berlin, Oct. 28.—Prayers were said in all the churches of Germany yesterday for the welfare of Crown Princess Cecilia, who is expecting an interesting family event during the next few weeks. The order to pray for the crown princess was given by the minister of cult, according to old German custom, and not because the crown princess is in poor health or in any way in danger. The crown prince and crown princess already have one baby, little Prince Wilhelm, who was born on July 4, 1906, at Potsdam. Crown Prince Wilhelm some time ago left the military service and, according

to the wish of his father, the kaiser, took a position in the office of the minister of the interior, Count Frederich Moltke.

The idea is that the prince shall make himself familiar with all branches of the government services in order that he may discharge his duties intelligently when he shall become ruler of the empire. At present he occupies himself not only with clerical work, but affairs of state of minor importance are left for him to decide. He will remain in his present position for one year, and will then probably again join the army.

Evidently with the object of being able to strike a quick and powerful blow in case of war with England, the German government has resolved to transfer the headquarters of the German fleet from Kiel to Wilhelmshafen. This move has met with general approval from German naval officers. From the new naval base the German

fleet will be in a position to reach England in 18 hours.

Prince Henry of Prussia has officially denied the rumors started by the London papers that he is to cross the Atlantic as commander-in-chief of a large German fleet during the absence of the American fleet in the Pacific.

The prince declares that he wishes nothing more than to visit America again, but that it would be in excess of his bad taste to cross the ocean with a squadron at a time when the United States would not be able to parade a similar number to receive it.

The people of Munich are horrified at the discovery that a girl of 14 has committed a number of murders. The name of the young criminal is Ida Schnell. She is now under arrest and has confessed. It was her habit to accept a position as nurse, and immediately after having taken the position she would kill the baby in her charge. She says she does not remember exactly how many babies she has killed, but knows that the number was more than six. She describes in detail how she killed the children in such a manner as to escape suspicion. With a hapin she pierced the skull of the baby and injured the brain so that death followed almost instantly.

She is unable to give any special reason why she wanted to kill the children. The Russian terrorists are developing a sense of humor. Some weeks ago a pyroxyline bomb was thrown into the central police office of Dorogobuzsk. Two policemen were wounded. As the

culprits were not secured, the governor descended on the village with Cossacks and threatened to arrest the first villagers he saw if the peasants did not hand the bombsters over.

Next day five wholly innocent Muschiks were dragged off to jail. A few days later Governor Novitsky received the following letter:

"Your Excellency—Allow us to express our gratitude for your way of restoring order to Dorogobuzsk. To us who throw bombs your solution of the problem is an excellent one. Continue to arrest, seize the whole village, raid the whole neighborhood. Every one will be pleased. You will be pleased because you have hostages, the Muschiks will be pleased because they will get free food, and we will be pleased because you cannot arrest the whole police office, into which we shall throw another bomb next week. (Signed) 'The B. O. ' " "Fighting Organization."

To prove that the letter was not a hoax, the second bomb was duly thrown.
