

# NEW RACE IS DISCOVERED

Dr. Gordon Finds Tribe on Koskokwim River in Alaska  
Which Had Never Before Seen White Man—  
Strong Traces of Mongolian Ancestry.

Philadelphia, Oct. 30.—Dr. George B. Gordon, curator of the University of Pennsylvania's archaeological department, who has just returned after a six months' expedition through the wildest regions of the far northwest, announces the discovery of a new race living along the Koskokwim river in Alaska.

Dr. Gordon brings back a strange tale of this new race, which had never before seen a white man, and which differs from all other tribes of Alaska.

Indians. They are called by the Eskimos "Kuskwakumits," and show strong traces of Mongolian ancestry. Crime and vice are utterly unknown among them, and their religion is pantheism.

"Though they are dying out," Dr. Gordon said, "they are strong and clean, physically, and are intelligent. They have retained the most ancient characteristics of dress and speech. They live in huts of all but are governed by patriarchy. The men are tall and the women graceful and beautiful. There are only 400 of them left."

## UNION AGENT IS SENT TO PRISON

Must Serve Year in Jail for  
Intimidating Non-Union  
Men During Strike.

New Haven, Conn., Oct. 30.—Frank McGee of Worcester, Massachusetts, New England business agent for the Iron Molders' union, has been sentenced to one year in the New Haven county jail on a charge of intimidating workmen at McGee & Co.'s manufacturing plant in this city. The sentence was imposed in the court of common pleas.

McGee had come before the court on appeal from a penalty inflicted in the police court, where he was first tried in the police court. McGee was fined \$200, and sentenced to jail for two years. The higher court cut out the money penalty and knocked off one year in jail.

## AMERICAN EDUCATORS AT BERLIN SESSION

Berlin, Oct. 30.—President Hadley of Yale today delivered the inaugural address at the University of Berlin on the subject of a German-American intellectual reciprocity scheme. Professor William Schuchman of Harvard will be heard later on the same subject. The speaker disavows the idea of Americanizing Schuchman, who is an Englishman, to represent America at this year's exchange. Professor Schuchman's delivery in not fluent English, however, has saved the Americans in Berlin a great deal of embarrassment.

## ASHLAND CONTRACTS FOR IMPROVEMENTS

Ashland, Ore., Oct. 30.—The city council has awarded to W. H. Foster, at \$4,563, the contract for the construction of a sewer in West Ashland. Known as sewer district No. 10. This was \$734.50 below the next lowest bid and over \$1,300 below the other two bids. About a mile and a half of sewer pipe is to be laid.

The contractor is having some difficulty in securing labor of the right kind, as the construction road in the neighborhood of the building in this and neighboring towns absorb all the good workmen at high wages.

## MONTANA ROBBERS SLAY PROSPECTOR

Helena, Mont., Oct. 30.—A brutal murder, evidently for the purpose of robbery, has been committed at Wolf Creek, a small town north of Helena, where the body of John H. Holmes has been found. Holmes was a prospector and possessed a considerable amount of money, which he had saved while acting as coachman for former Governor Hauser and other residents of Helena. He had been shot from behind and his body dragged into the woods.

## FIFTY POUNDS GOLD DUST IN TWO GRIPS

Tacoma, Oct. 30.—With two grips, each containing 25 pounds of gold dust, H. W. Heitman, an Alaskan, arrived here yesterday to have his treasure assayed at the Tacoma smelter. The Tacoma chamber of commerce is instituting a movement to have the government establish a branch assay office here. Since the vessels of the Alaska coast company have been making this city their southern terminus many fortune hunters have been heading for this city with their hoards.

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## SECOND BLOWOUT OF PAYETTE GAS

Oil and Water Thrown 200 Feet—Gas to Light the Town.

Payette, Ida., Oct. 30.—Another blow-out, the second to occur from the oil well being drilled here by the Oregon Oil & Gas company, has occurred, and there is now enough gas in the well to supply gas to every house in the city. It will be piped to the city as soon as the company can accomplish the work.

The blowout was similar to the first one, which occurred October 18, but was much stronger, and as the tools were out of the well it did not plug up with sand. Water and oil were thrown more than 200 feet high. Big stones were hurled into the air with great force. After about 10 minutes the force began to subside and a plug was driven into the top of the well, which now holds the roaring gas beneath it. Another well will be sunk as soon as possible with the intention of going considerably deeper than the first well, which is 725 feet deep. It is expected that a vast flow of oil will be tapped.

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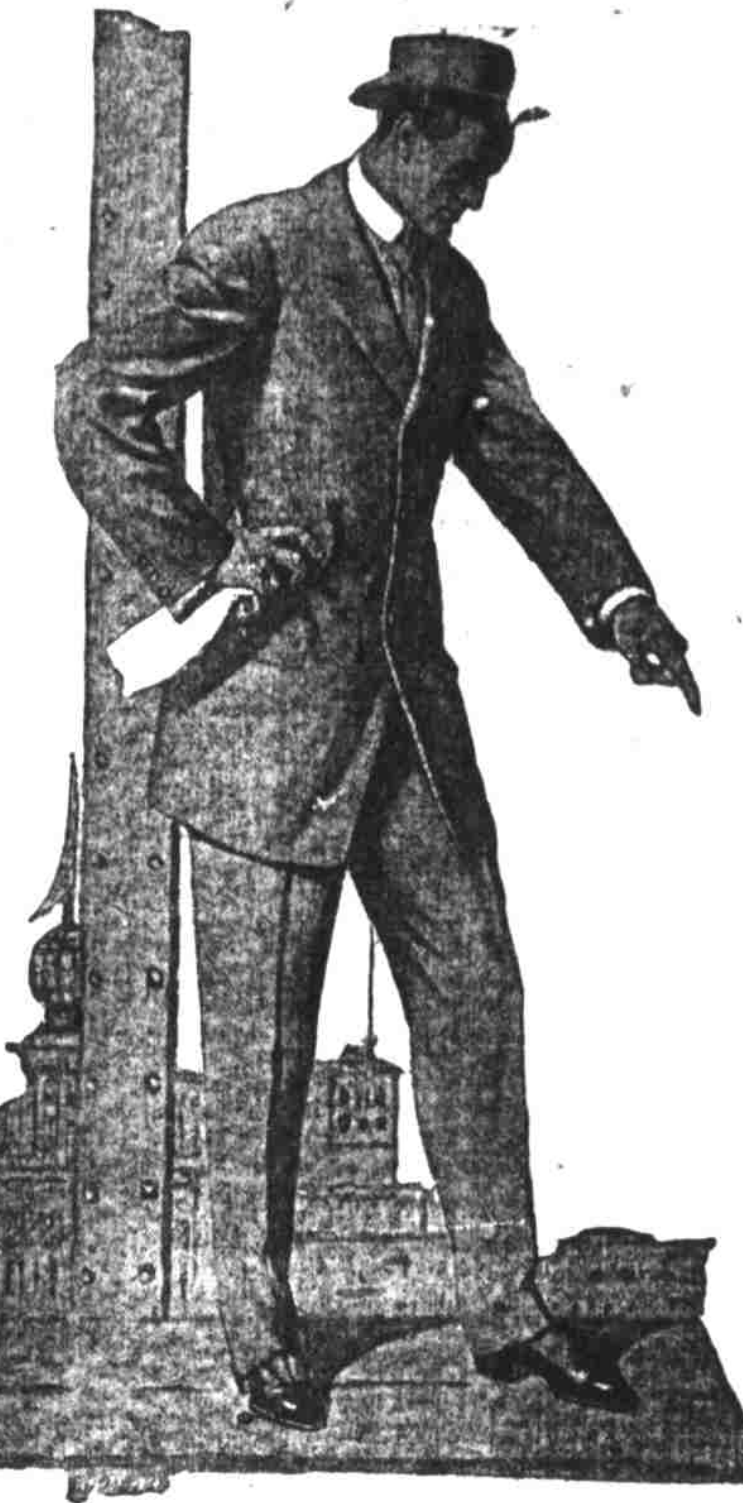
