

DON'T NEED TO EXTEND HOLIDAYS

Governor Says That He Thinks Money Situation in This State Is Well in Hand—Prosperity on All Sides.

Has Confidence in Banks and People and Reminds All That There Is More Cash in Oregon Than Ever Before.

Governor Chamberlain returned from Salem this morning and in an interview says that every feature of the financial situation seems to be encouraging. At the present time the governor says he can see no necessity for extending the legal holidays which will end tomorrow. The allegation made by Governor Mead of Washington that he had been forced to declare a public holiday in his state because of the action of the governor of Oregon, Mr. Chamberlain declared to be in a line with the way they do things generally in the sister state.

"Things in the east are assuming a normal state," said the governor. "Everything in Oregon will adapt itself in a little while to the improved conditions there."

"I don't think now and I have never thought that there was any reason for alarm in Oregon. The only thing necessary to bring things to a normal condition is coolness and deliberate action on the part of all the people."

"The individual who feels panicky owes it to himself and the community to collect his wits and satisfy himself that he can be a factor for good or evil as he may see fit."

"The people of Oregon have always shown conservatism in every crisis and conservatism now will do more to restore confidence than anything else."

"I have confidence in the banks and in the people because I am confident that there is more money now than the state has ever before had."

In reply to a question concerning the necessity for extending the present legal holidays which he proclaimed last Monday night, the governor said:

"I don't think it will be necessary to

extend the holidays, but I will be governed by conditions as they present themselves. So far as I am concerned, no, I guess that covers the situation," concluded the governor, on second thought.

DEPOSITORS GET FEW MORE DAYS

Banking Holidays Make a Change in Receiver's Plan to Wind Up Affairs.

"Continuance of the banking holiday has afforded a needed opportunity for Oregon Trust & Savings bank depositors to come in and sign for Home Telephone bonds, as the receiver has consented to delay the contemplated change of program a few days," said President John L. Day of the Depositors' association. "We are hoping that a large number will take advantage of this chance to get back the depositors' money dollar for dollar. A large amount is yet to be subscribed, but if all would come in and sign for 75 per cent of their deposits we would still win the battle."

Receiver Devlin must within the next few days come to a final conclusion regarding the continuation of business, and the occupancy of the bank quarters. The bank's property is valued at \$75,000, and it will be his duty to sell these quarters to the highest bidder. Should no large bid be offered the bank's assets would be decreased correspondingly. It is said a number of business men are figuring on submitting bids.

If the bank's quarters are sold the reorganization plan will receive a serious blow and the chances for reorganization will probably be entirely destroyed, as the capitalists who contemplate putting new capital into the bank have promised it with the understanding that the bank would be able to continue business at the old stand. Whatever the depositors do must therefore be done quickly in order that the bank's quarters may not be put up for sale.

QUARANTINE IS "NO GOOD"

Dr. Giesy Makes Startling Statement Before City Board of Health—Children Allowed to Spread Diphtheria Germs.

Another step toward the establishment of a city laboratory and city bacteriologist and pathologist was taken, this morning by the city health board at its meeting in the city hall, when the members decided to hold a special meeting in a few days to discuss the cost and operating expenses of such equipment.

The matter was brought to the attention of the board members by Dr. Giesy, who declared the present system of quarantine is worthless. Then everybody spoke right out in open meeting, and when the smoke cleared away an outsider would have thought that the present rule for checking the spread of contagious and infectious diseases was like the missing quantity—a thing of name only.

Better System Needed.

City Health Officer Esther C. Pohl said that she was operating under an arbitrary rule established years ago in her office and would gladly welcome any assistance the board could suggest that would make a more uniform and rigid system of quarantine. She said that what is needed more than anything is a city laboratory with a city bacteriologist, where examinations could be made to ascertain whether bacilli were present in persons suspected of suffering with diphtheria or other contagious diseases. Dr. Giesy said:

"Our present system of quarantine is no good, especially in diphtheria cases. It has been the custom to fumigate where the disease has broken out, and then allow the children to walk about the city. It is a well-known fact that the germ lingers in the throat from three days to as many months after the throat is free from membrane."

Germs Spread on Street.

"There is no way to tell, in many cases, whether the germs are still present, and the children emit sputum containing germs, which in my opinion, is the direct cause of the great number of diphtheria cases we have in the school year."

"There is no way to tell whether the disease has been entirely eradicated by a pathological examination. When such has been made and the patient found free from the disease, the quarantine should be raised, but not before."

Mayor Harry Lane suggested that a special meeting be held in a few days, when a report of the council could be formulated so as to be presented to the council for the establishment of a city laboratory and city bacteriologist. From Mayor Lane's remarks it was taken that the council would be in harmony with the project. Dr. Cottel and a few other members of the council favor such a proposition, and it is believed that when the matter is presented in good order it will be passed.

dictated the terms of the "peace that passeth understanding."

That this peace has come to Wall street there is no further room for doubt. The coalition means future harmony of action between all the heretofore opposing elements, Hill, Morgan, Harriman, Kuhn, Loeb & Co., Standard Oil and its allied interests, into one powerful combination for the purpose of dominating every great interest in this country and directing the combination in a position to practically defy the administration to continue its policy.

The situation here is appalling in its magnitude. Steps are already being taken by the minor financial and industrial powers in Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago and St. Louis to conduct their business within themselves hereafter, and cut loose from New York.

That Roosevelt will fight back is regarded as almost certain. It is believed he will advance in the near future some centralization scheme of national finance that will be calculated to upset the coalition, and that the coming 12 months will witness a strenuous battle along these lines.

Foreign capitalists are looking on with pleased interest. It is said they regard the situation as most promising for them in contemplated operations in the United States. From this time forward foreign capital will be more in evidence than ever before for legitimate investment in substantial American development enterprises that possess safe revenue earning capacity.

Regarding work being suspended on the Harriman lines the following has been received from Washington, D. C., Nov. 1.—President Roosevelt refuses to discuss the stoppage of construction work on the Harriman lines but a friend of the administration said today:

"Harriman may be a bit cramped for money but there is nothing in the financial situation justifying the wholesale cessation of construction. Harriman should have no trouble in getting money from any source he wishes. Apparently he is taking this means of endeavoring to demonstrate that the president is responsible for the period of financial depression."

Outlook in Macedonia.

Notwithstanding the issue of a circular by the Porte to the Turkish ambassadors abroad, announcing the appointment of judicial inspectors in Macedonia and the creation of a law school at Salonika, Austria-Hungary and Russia are determined not to deviate from the scheme of judicial reforms now being considered by the powers nor to accept the Turkish proposals as in any way equivalent to the Austro-Russian scheme.

The improvement in the Macedonian situation is attributed in Germany, Austria to the growing unanimity among the powers, thanks to which the Porte undertook an energetic pursuit of the Greek demands and dislodged the Greek Metropolitan of Drama.

If the judicial reforms can be applied under European supervision with the unanimous backing of the powers, the Austro-Hungarian and Russian governments believe that the outlook in Macedonia will undergo a permanent improvement.

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
