District Forecaster Beals Orders Display of Storm Warnings.

SHOULD SEND SHIPS QUICKLY INTO PORT

Several Windjammers Are Due From South and Ports Across Sea-Aurelia Escapes Blow in Crippled Condition.

Storm warnings were ordered displayed this morning at all stations in thick and foggy. this district, District Forecaster Beals seeing signs of an approaching southerly gale. While the blow is expected to be severest along the coast it will also be felt in the interior, the forecast predicting fresh southerly winds here. The storm should begin to make it-

self felt about 4 or 5 o'clock this evening and there is a probability of it continuing overnight, with increasing fury as the hours pass along toward midnight. It is expected to cause rains throughout the north Pacific states and very likely it will rain here quite co-piously tonight and tomorrow.

A large number of vessels are working their way up the coast from the antipodes and South America and the southerly winds should being them along at a lively rate. For this reason it was with a feeling of satisfaction this morning that the shipping frater-nity learned of the storm warnings being displayed. Among the vessels sup-posed to be nearest at hand are the British ships St. Mirren and Claverdon with coal cargoes from Newcastle, Australia. Both have been out more than two months and are now fully due al-though not overdue. Several windjam-mers in ballast are due from west coast

BLASTING IN SNAKE,

Large Bowlders Torn Out at Palouse Rapids.

Blasting is going on in the Snake ver, and will be continued during low ater until the large bowlders and river, and will be continued during water until the large bowlders ridges are leveled off to the river's bed. Several big blasts were set off yesterday at Falouse and large chunks of rock torn loose and carried off by the current into the deep holes in the channel. Assistant United States Engineer David B. Ogden, who examined the Snake for a long distance this week, says the government crews engaged in blasting are doing good work and that the channel is gradually being straightened and made navigable at all stages of water. He said that in places the current runs iges are leveled off to the river's bed. made havigable at all stages of water. Blasting is made comparatively easy, however, because most of the ledges reach to the surface of the river. This especially makes the work of drilling holes much easier than had it to be done under water.




