

ALASKA IN TRUST'S GRIP

Mine Owner From Nome Says Corporations Are Gradually Gaining Control of Resources—Vast Development Under Way.

Alaska is gradually but surely coming within the clutches of the corporations; the banking business is now practically controlled by the Guggenheims; control of nearly every commodity is almost entirely in the hands of the larger companies; the transportation facilities to the northern country together with the railroads being built will all eventually be owned by the trust.

This is the Alaskan situation in a nutshell as sized up by T. T. Lane of Nome, who is at the Hotel Portland, accompanied by his wife. The two are on their way to San Francisco to spend the winter. Although no relation to the mayor of Portland, Mr. Lane has met him several times during visits to the gold mining regions. Mr. Lane is the owner of the Hurrah, the furthestmost northern quartz mine in the world.

"A great deal of development work of all kinds is now going on in Alaska," Mr. Lane said this morning, "and is going ahead and more extensively than ever before in the history of the country. Owing to this fact there have been no real strikes in gold that would cause much excitement during the last five years.

"The people of the states have no conception of the improvements being made in this northern territory. Miles and miles of railroad are being built and extended into several of the most promising districts. This naturally opens up new country and conditions are most encouraging everywhere.

"The corporations, however, are fast coming within the power of practically controlling or owning the business of the country. For instance the Guggenheims have great interests there and you might say now have the banking business in their hands. And other corporations, including particularly the corporations that own the boat lines and transportation facilities, are coming in for their share of profits and will eventually own the entire business.

"The mining corporations are not making a practice of buying a great deal of property—as a rule they freeze

out the smaller mine owner. But the gold region is so vast, however, and there are so many mine owners scattered about the country that there will always be these small mines that assist materially in the development of the gold regions.

"Nome has a smaller population at present than it has had since the height of the excitement seven years ago. Then there were 10,000 or 15,000 people there. Now there are not more than perhaps 3,000. Many of the people have simply come to the states to spend the winter."

RECKLESS MOTORIST KILLS MRS. ANNESTAY

Woman Sixty Years Old Is Knocked Down by a Los Angeles Chauffeur.

Los Angeles, Nov. 1.—Mrs. Johanna Annestay, 60 years of age, was hurled to her death by an automobile last night at Ninth and Valencia streets as she was alighting from a streetcar. Her skull was fractured and she died while being taken to the receiving hospital. The driver of the automobile, who was the chauffeur, without attempting to ascertain the extent of his victim's injuries, quickly disappeared. The police are making every effort to apprehend the driver.

COWLITZ SCHOOLS' DEBATE SCHEDULE

ROADS ENJOINED BY LUMBERMEN

Judge Hanford Signs Order Temporarily Forbidding New Rate From Coast.

Seattle, Nov. 1.—At 11:25 last night after three hours of argument and maneuvering by the railroad and lumbermen's attorneys, United States Judge C. H. Hanford signed an order temporarily restraining the Northern Pacific, Great Northern, Burlington and the Harriman railroads from collecting freight rates on lumber and shingles shipped from the state of Washington to the east and central west as provided by the new tariffs filed more than 30 days ago and which were scheduled to be effective today.

Three hundred lumber and shingle men from various parts of western Washington gathered here yesterday afternoon and last night to celebrate their victory over the railroads.

They thronged the federal court last night and during all the animated discussion among the attorneys, preceding the signing of the order and the approval of a \$250,000 bond, filed by the Pacific Coast Lumber Manufacturers' association and shingle mills bureau, the millmen hung about the courtroom, filling every seat and watching the proceedings with the most intense interest.

SHORTER HOURS IN PENDLETON SHOPS

Pendleton, Or., Nov. 1.—As a result of an official visit from O. P. Hoff, state labor commissioner, women in stores and restaurants here will have shorter hours. The state law requiring the 10-hour day has been disregarded here on Saturday and Sunday. Hoff was in Pendleton until 9 o'clock at night. Those upon whom Commissioner Hoff called stated they would arrange working hours differently for their employees. He found several places of business violating the law here.

PENDLETON MARKETS BONDS WITH BANKS

Pendleton, Or., Nov. 1.—The finance committee of the city council reported in favor of an ordinance authorizing the deposit of funds in the city treasury with the Pendleton bank making the most favorable bid, the bank designated to give Pendleton city bonds as security for the money loaned. This was decided upon at the suggestion of W. L. Thompson, cashier of the Commercial National bank, who is now open for the sale of a portion of the city bonds, and it is expected that at least \$125,000 of the proposed bond issue will be sold and the city enabled to redeem outstanding warrants.

RAILWAY INSURANCE ASSOCIATION TO MEET

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 1.—Arrangements have been completed for the session in this city of the thirty-seventh annual convention of the Railroad Conductors' Insurance association. The convention will be held on November 8, and the delegates will start from St. Louis tomorrow in a special train. The association is a benefit one entirely and is primarily for the life insurance of this class of trainmen, whose risks the ordinary insurance companies refuse to handle.
