BASKETBALL GAMES OF SOUTHERN PART

DEEP GLOOM ON AT WASHINGTON

Evergreen University Sickened at Defeat by Sailors—Team Demoralized.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) University of Washington, Seattle, Nov. 5.—The whole university is plunged into deep gloom over the defeat in Saturday's game. That the sailors from the battleship Nebraska have a fast team was not denied but nearly everyone expected to see the 'varsity win out.

Defeat is not so much of a disgrace as it appears to be. The Nebraska team was heavier than the 'varsity and in addition had the valuable services of three former Annapolis stars, Soule, Ingram and Montgomery. Soule was out for four years on the navy team. Montgomery also was an end, while Ingram was one of the star halves of the team last year. He won the game for the navy against the army and was mentioned by some prominent authorities as the best player in the game.

Winning Prospects Slim. The prospect of winning any of the remaining games looks very slim. The first game is probably the best as any line in the northwest. Test-meister is as good a center as can be found. Bragdon and Resnering are big, powerful fellows and remarkably fast. They are giving credit to the team at end but on account of their weight, which is over 190 pounds, they have played at back all season. They are probably the fastest tackles in the northwest.

Back Woefully Weak. But that back field. At quarter there seems to be no one who can fill the bill. Bagshaw has been injured repeatedly and that in a measure explains his poor work. But even taking that into consideration, he is not good enough for a 'varsity quarter. Spalding has shown up better than any of the others, but is inclined to take things too easy.

Men Stand Around. Another explanation is that in practice when men are taken out of the game and new men put in the former are allowed to stand around and cool off and as a result they become stiff, not being able to play their usual game. The team goes east this week to Walla Walla to play Whitman college Friday. From comparative scores Whitman ought to win 18 to 0. All the students are confident that the team will take a brace and give Whitman a very hard game. The material is there and if a little team work can be drilled into the team a fairly creditable showing can be expected.

Those who will play the positions on the old college stars eleven are: Harmer, University of Missouri, center; Travis, Harvard, and Woodruff, Pennsylvania, guards; McMillan, Stanford, and Horan, Lafayette, tackles; Etarr, Notre Dame, Barrett and Fochelmer, Stanford, ends; Silkeney, Harvard, and Tuttle, Chicago, halfbacks; Alexander, Notre Dame, quarterback, and Blanchard, Amherst, fullback. Carson, Zan, Townsend, Heath and Steele will be the substitutes for the collegians.

Multnomah club will be represented by the following players: Carlson, center; Morris and Sterling, guard; Grant and Walker, tackles; Dowling and Kirby, ends; Westover, quarterback; Stott and Longman, halves, and Rader, fullback. Subs for the club team are Crosby, Mickan, Alexander, Owens, Smith and Gowan.
