

# TIGHTWADS CAUSE OF DISTRESS

### Jim Hill Says Wall Street Is Not Responsible for Financial Panic—Blames Individuals Who Hoard Their Wealth.

### Railroad Magnate Declares There Is Plenty of Coin in United States and Says Only Trouble Is Lack of Circulation.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 6.—Not Wall street but individuals who are hoarding money are responsible for the present financial stress according to a statement made by James J. Hill. He says:

"There is nothing in the actual business conditions to cause or to account for the financial stress. Crops are good and until the money began to disappear prices were higher than for many years. Neither is there an insufficient volume of money in the country. The notion that Wall street absorbed it is without foundation. A year ago there was enough money for current needs. The trouble clearly comes from the hoarding of money. The impairment of public confidence is the real fault. It has already done much damage and will do more unless speedily corrected. This popular distrust as far as it leads to hoarding, is foolish and hurtful. The people should put an end to it by releasing the money whose withdrawal from circulation means business starvation. The financial interests are doing their part. The people must put away their misgivings and do their part. Then the crisis will end."

New York, Nov. 6.—Wall street sighed

with relief today when it was learned that money would be supplied "up to the limit" to support the Trust Company of America and the Lincoln Trust company, where runs have been on. The two trust companies were under consideration at Sunday's meeting of financiers.

A formal statement was issued from the Morgan mansion this morning to the effect that an examination shows that on the present basis of values the assets of the two companies are sufficient to pay depositors in full. That arrangements may be made to enable both companies to resume business, a committee has been appointed to have under its control the majority stock of each company.

## NEW ELECTRIC LINE AT WALLA WALLA

Walla Walla, Nov. 6.—With a capital stock of \$1,000,000 the Oregon Washington Traction company was incorporated in Walla Walla yesterday. The object is to construct and operate steamboats, electric and steam railroads and engage in other industrial lines. The incorporators include Max Baumster, A. H. Reynolds, Samuel Brammiller, J. L. Sharpstein, C. K. Holloway, John Smith and E. S. Isaacs, all wealthy and professional men of Walla Walla.

## FIVE MEN SUSPECTED OF ALAWAY MURDER

Chicago, Nov. 6.—Five suspects were captured in the midnight spread today for the murder of James Alaway, the Los Angeles merchant, who was shot to death in his brother's home at Austin early Tuesday morning. The police are looking for the sweetheart of one of the prisoners, as it is believed she can throw some light on the crime. The suspects give their names as John Wells, Edward Weber, Frank White, John Morgan and Edward Kirshaw.

## EIGHT MEN KILLED ABOARD SCHOOLSHIP

Kiel, Nov. 6.—Eight men are reported killed in an explosion of the boilers on the German schoolship Blucher this morning, while the vessel was near Murrwick. Twenty-two were injured.

# RAY HITCHCOCK HAS BEEN SICK

### Comedian Gives Himself Up to District Attorney and Is Released on Bail.

New York, Nov. 7.—Raymond Hitchcock, the comedian who disappeared last week following his indictment charging serious offenses against young girls, surrendered to District Attorney Jerome this morning. He claims that he had not been out of the city, but had been confined to a friend's home by illness. Hitchcock was accompanied to Jerome's office by his wife and two attorneys. He was ordered released on \$7,500 bail by Judge Whitman, and the bond was immediately furnished by Martin Engle, the former Tammany leader.

The comedian was pale and haggard and a mere shadow of his former self when he staggered into the district attorney's office. He was immediately arraigned under the indictment against him. He pleaded not guilty to one of the counts and bond was at once fixed, the court paroling him on the remaining five counts.

## Kenny Denounces McCarthy.

Francis J. Kenny, assistant district attorney, in commenting on the result of the election, said: "The victory is for all San Francisco. It was no man's fight and no man's victory. All the candidates whom the people have elected to office with the head of the ticket stood for good government. With the whole world looking on we could not fall down. San Francisco has redeemed herself in the sight of the world. The people were aroused, and when the people assert themselves they are found on the right side. As for myself, I thank the people from the bottom of my heart for the confidence they have shown in me. I am elected to the office without having made a single promise and without having spent a cent in campaigning. My sons got out a picture card, I believe, but even that wasn't my fault. I am just as free to obey my best judgment as when I first took the office.

"Only one promise was asked of me during the campaign and that was by the labor men. I told them the people would make no protection promises. I have not."

## Langdon on Result.

William Langdon said: "The victory is most gratifying to me, as it means the approval of the official course of the district attorney during the last term, and command to continue the work before the courts until those who have been guilty of crimes against the government have been brought to justice. The splendid support given my candidacy by the labor people shows that the issue was clearly understood by them and they voted for honesty and integrity in governmental affairs. San Francisco has been redeemed."

## GOVERNORS ELECTED.

### Democrats Were Highly Successful in Yesterday's Balloting.

San Francisco, Nov. 6.—Governors were elected yesterday in six states, with the following results:

- Maryland—Democrat (probable), Austin L. Crothers.
- Mississippi—Democrat, E. F. Noel.
- Rhode Island—Democrat, James H. Higgins.
- Massachusetts—Republican, C. J. Goff Jr.
- New Jersey—Democrat (probable), Frank S. Katzenbach Jr.
- Kentucky—Republican, August E. Wilson.

In New York City and county, where interest centered on the fight between the Independence league-Republican forces and Tammany, the latter won by a majority in the neighborhood of 25,000.

Tom Johnson was reelected mayor of Cleveland by a plurality of between 3,000 and 4,000. It looks like the 3-cent fare would be accepted without contest by the traction people.

The Republican gains were shown in Kentucky, where the Republican ticket was elected and Louisville elected a Republican.

In Massachusetts, Curtis Guild Jr., Republican, was reelected governor by 75,000 plurality over Henry M. Whitney, Democrat, with Thomas L. Higginson, Independence league, a close third. John B. Moran, Independence league, was reelected district attorney of Suffolk county by 20,000 plurality.

At Salt Lake City, the anti-Mormon party elected John S. Bransford for mayor.

In Pennsylvania Republicans rolled up a plurality of 175,000 for J. O. Sheats, who headed their ticket for state treasurer. In Nebraska the Republicans elected Reese to the supreme court over Loomis, Democrat, by about 25,000.

Ex-Boss Cox came back into his own in Missouri, where he was reelected by a plurality of 25,000. In Toledo, Brand Whitlock held the majority in

spite of the pulpit onslaughts made upon him.

In Rhode Island, James H. Higgins was reelected governor, with the entire Democratic ticket.

The Democrats carried Brooklyn, electing the McCarran ticket by a small plurality.

In New York state Edward T. and Willard Bartlett, joint nominees of the Democrats and Republicans, are elected and the legislature remains strongly Republican.

In New Jersey the election is close, with indications pointing strongly to the election of Katsenbach, Democrat, by a small majority.

The Maryland contest for the governorship is in doubt, owing to lateness of returns. Chairman Vandiver of the Democratic state committee claims the state by 12,000 and conservative estimates give the Democrats victory.

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 6.—Complete unofficial returns show that Johnson is reelected over Burton by a plurality of 2,113, 3,000 less than when he last ran.

Following Johnson's victory the Cleveland Electric railway which Johnson is fighting, restored the fare to the legal maximum, 11 tickets for 50 cents. During the campaign it was selling seven for 25 cents. Johnson announces that he will be a candidate again in 1909.

Jersey City, N. J., Nov. 6.—Late election returns indicate the election of Port, Republican, for governor.

New York, Nov. 6.—Though Tammany has a clear plurality of 26,000 for its sheriff and judges, it failed to bury Hearst, as it said it would do. Tammany had hoped for a 65,000 plurality, and this would have proved that Hearst is no longer a political factor in New York and that Tammany is all-powerful. The latest figures show that the Hearst vote in Greater New York is 70,000. Few Republicans blame fusion for the defeat of the Independence league Republican ticket.

Providence, R. I., Nov. 6.—Governor Higgins, in the complete returns, is reelected by a plurality of 2,408. The rest of the state officials are Republican.

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 6.—The Ohio legislature still shows a Republican majority of two, the Independent Democrats holding the balance of power in the senate and the Republicans having three to the good in the house.

Chicago, Nov. 6.—Complete returns show that five new counties have been added to "dry" territory in Illinois. They are Hardin, Union, Pope, Maasac and Williamson.

Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 6.—Complete returns give Sheets, Republican, candidate for state treasurer, a plurality of 175,000.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 7.—Anti-corporation sentiment and a split in the Democratic party enabled Governor Guild to win a reelection by one of the largest Republican pluralities ever polled in Massachusetts. His plurality as shown by revised totals is 102,000.

The First National and Commercial National are still open, as are all other banks in eastern Oregon. Money and material to build a house for the volunteer fire company at Pendleton has been subscribed and the work of erecting the building will begin at once. 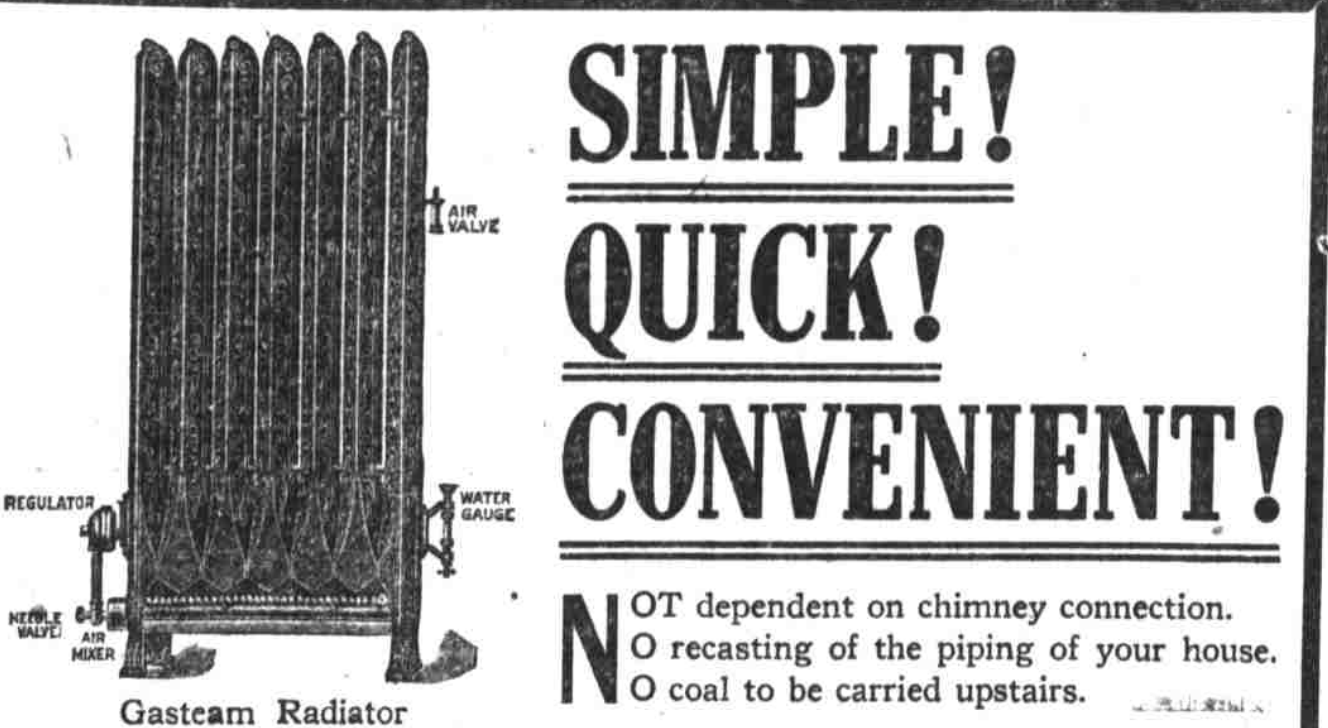

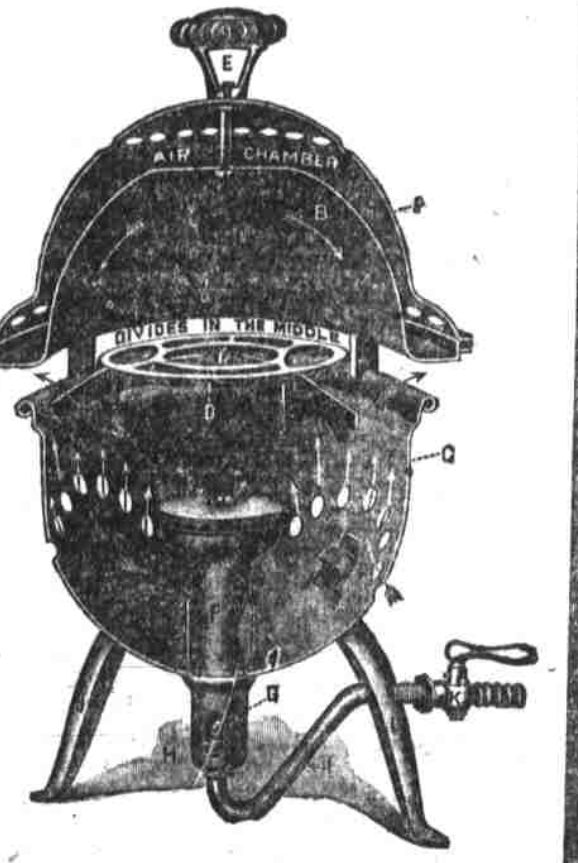
