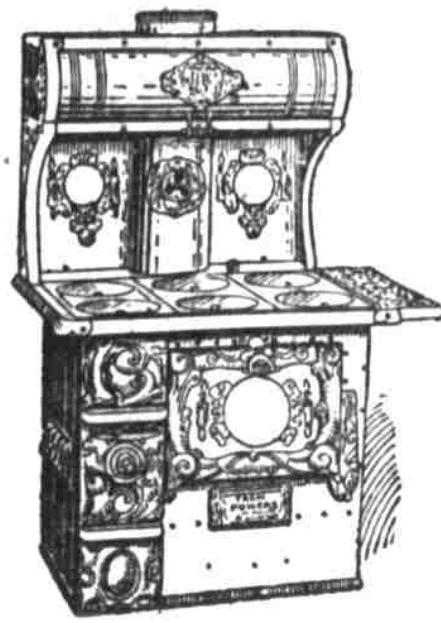

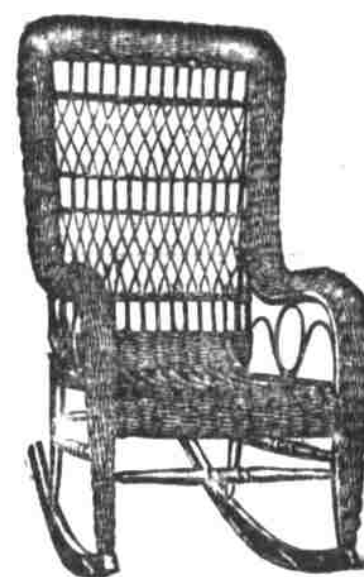

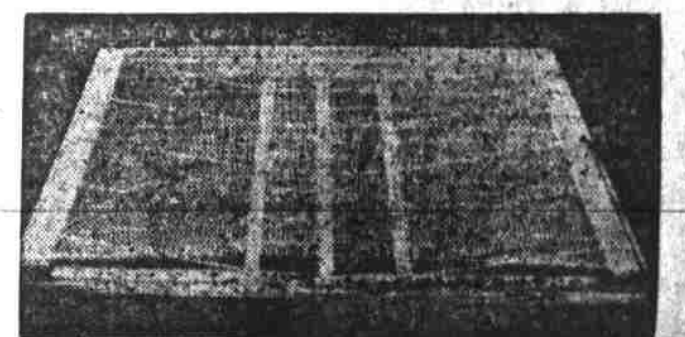

TURN-DOWN FOR SALMON KING

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Nov. 6.—The state board of fish commissioners has rejected the claim of R. D. Hume of Wedderburn, Oregon, for \$2,615.20, for maintaining

salmon hatcheries on the Rogue river. Hume claimed to have expended money operating hatcheries, as follows: In 1901, \$1,043.89; in 1902, \$1,389.47; in 1903, \$759.07; in 1904, \$2,210.67. Fish Commissioner Van Dusen reports: "Whether any such operations were carried on by him at his state-ment shows, I have no direct knowledge excepting for this past season. Early in July, 1901, I visited his lower Rogue river hatchery establishment, which was at that time on the north side of the river, but no work was being carried on; if any such work had been done there that season it was prior to my visit and the young fry were all liberated before I got there."

"I did not visit that section again until July 14, 1907, just past, when I made an inspection of the hatchery work being carried on by him and I found he had a well-equipped hatchery establishment on the south side of the river, at his Indian creek station; that he had a splendid lot of young salmon on hand that he was feeding, and that, in my estimation, he was doing very effective work."

"His Elk creek hatchery establishment, on the upper Rogue river, I visited in the spring of 1902 and found it being operated by the United States bureau of fisheries and that all the expenses of operation was being paid, as I was given to understand, by the bureau. In the spring of 1903, I again visited this Elk creek establishment and found the same conditions existing."

Since 1903 I have not visited this upper Rogue river hatchery, but from reports received from the United States bureau of fisheries I have been given to understand that its operation has been carried on every year since by the United States bureau of fisheries and that all of the expenses of operation have been paid by the bureau."

RAILROAD BONUS BACK TO THE DONORS
Klamath Development Company to Reconvey at Early Date—Company Expedited Building.
(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Klamath Falls, Or., Nov. 6.—While the Klamath Development company has made no public statement of intentions, as to the \$100,000 railroad bonus, the trustees of the subsidy fund have been instructed by the company to inform the subscribers that the land donated to the trustees in trust will be reconveyed. November 1 was the date set by the trustees to reconvey unless the matter was brought into court by the Klamath Development company in its endeavor to hold the subscribers to their subscriptions, but it is expected that in the course of a few days deeds of reconveyance will be issued to those who donated land toward the subsidy.
And thus ends the story of the \$100,000 bonus raised by Klamath county and the business houses of San Francisco, Sacramento and Portland to secure the early construction of a railroad into the Klamath basin.
The time set in the agreements for the construction of the road to this city was March 31, 1907, but a great many causes combined for delay and in the light of events tending to extend the failure of the railroad company to make good, the bonus was not claimed.
However, it is conceded that the Klamath Development company, by its efforts in securing the subsidy and its setting out later to the Southern Pacific company assured, the building of a railroad into this country much sooner than it otherwise would have been built.
