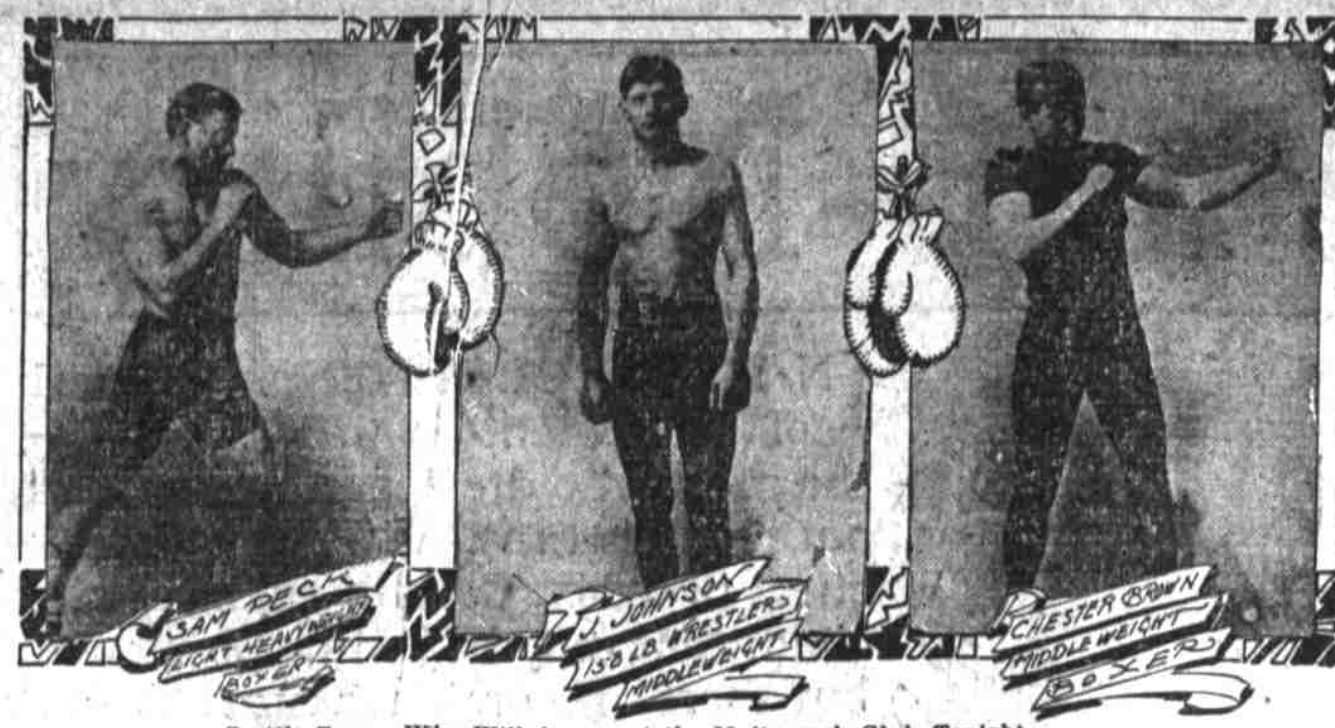




Seattle Boxer, Who Will Appear at the Multnomah Club Tonight.

FIGHT FOR LEAD IN PASSION PLAY

Troops Called to Oberammergau to Subdue Quarrelling Priest and Actor.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Oberammergau, Bavaria, Nov. 8.—War is raging over the selection of the actor to play the part of the "Prince of Peace" in the passion play in 1910. Politics is at the bottom of the dispute, a priest leading one party and an actor the other. Troops have been summoned from Munich to aid the local authorities to preserve order. Several fights have occurred and the play may not be produced.

CENTRALIA JURY CONVICTS STABBER

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Centralia, Wash., Nov. 8.—William Blanton was found guilty of assault and battery in stabbing Geneva Carmen at Centralia July 3. The jury came in at 9 o'clock last night, after being out 11 hours. Blanton stabbed Geneva Carmen in the Centralia resort during a drunken row. The woman was badly cut, and for a time her condition was critical. During the row two other people were also stabbed by Blanton. His defense was that he was protecting himself from an alleged attack.

MRS. JANIE BROWN DIES AT CORVALLIS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Corvallis, Or., Nov. 8.—The funeral of Mrs. Janie Newton Brown of Oakesdale, Wash., who died at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. G. Newton, near this city, took place at 11 o'clock from Plymouth church. The services were conducted by Rev. D. H. Leach of Corvallis. Interment was in the Mount Union cemetery. Mrs. Brown was formerly Miss Janie Newton of Benton county. She was married to Robert Brown of Oakesdale, Washington, three years ago. E. J. Newton, county recorder, is her brother.

PRESIDENT IS AFTER WALKER'S MURDERERS

C., Nov. 8.—The president has sent the following message to Attorney-General Bonaparte and Secretary of the Interior Garfield: "My attention has been called to the murder of Secretary of the Interior Garfield while investigating land frauds in Colorado. I trust that every effort will be made to prosecute every violation of the land laws which Walker was investigating."

ROYLSTON IS HELD FOR ASSAULTING WIFE

Colfax, Wash., Nov. 8.—James Roylston, a resident of Elberton, charged with assaulting his wife, is being held by Sheriff Kuttell on that charge until the grand jury can be convened. His 18-year-old daughter, Florence, makes the additional charge. Elberton people are threatening to visit the Colfax jail and lynch Roylston, who is 45 years old.

PRESIDENT WILL SEE FLEET SAIL FOR WEST

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Nov. 8.—President Roosevelt will personally start Rear Admiral Evan's battleship fleet on its voyage around the horn. Announcement was made today that the president is planning to go to Hampton Roads on December 15 to review the ships before they start. He will tender a reception to the captains on the Mayflower and give them advice.

KESSLER AND COMPANY GO INTO BANKRUPTCY

New York, Nov. 8.—An involuntary petition in bankruptcy against Kessler & Co. Wall street brokers, who recently failed for \$5,000,000 was filed in the United States district court today. The petitioner was the Fidelity Central railroad of Maine which claims \$100,000 in deposits.

FORGERS MAKE BOGUS MONEY

San Francisco Clearing House Certificates Being Counterfeited.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 8.—The clearing house committee today began putting the \$2 certificates into circulation.

The first issue of certificates is being retired as fast as the certificates come into the banks and a new issue is being put out, the latter being much more elaborate. This is an extra precaution against counterfeiting, which is still further guarded against by the fact that the clearing house has cornered the market in the paper of which the certificate is printed. Clever forgers are reaping a rich harvest out of the clearing house certificates, and many tradesmen realized this today when they made a closer examination of the worthless papers in their hands.

Money handlers at the Emeryville race track are disturbed and are making preparations to carefully look at all certificates passing through their hands. It is expected that the bogus money men will be at the races tomorrow with a big war.

ADAM RADIR OF BENTON BURIED

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Corvallis, Or., Nov. 8.—The funeral of Adam Radir, for 31 years a well-known resident of the vicinity of Corvallis, occurred here today at 2 p. m. The services at the Episcopal church were conducted by Rev. J. W. Armstrong, and interment was in Crystal Lake cemetery. Deceased was born in Grossiberau, Germany, July 29, 1830. He was a successful master mechanic. He came to the United States in 1852, settling at Pittsburg. He married Mary Lison in 1876, and together they came to Oregon, purchasing a home near Corvallis. The cause of Mr. Radir's death was Bright's disease. Mrs. Radir died last January. The surviving children are Mrs. Richard Graham of Corvallis, Mrs. Millie Smith of Linn county and Mrs. Stephen Whitmore of Pennsylvania.

CERTIFICATES NOT GOOD FOR WHARFAGE

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 8.—Acting under the state law which requires that all its payments to the state treasury must be made in gold coin, the state board of harbor commissioners has determined to accept no clearing house certificates in settlement of harbor and wharfage tolls on the ships.

The rule that gold coin or its equivalent in gold certificates, must be used in the payment of tolls may have a decided effect on the shipping in the harbor.

Delinquency in the payment of tolls will subject any vessel to litigation, and it is probable that some arrangement will be made whereby regular shippers and shipowners may be allowed to carry an account until they can secure gold.

Lewiston, Ida., Nov. 8.—Announcement is made that the Lewiston broom factory, which has been closed for several weeks owing to the inability of the proprietor to secure skilled labor of the grade desired, will reopen within a few days. A large shipment of choice broom corn has been received, and Harry Harford, the owner, says that the factory will be in operation shortly.

Porter Accused of Theft.

Lewiston, Ida., Nov. 8.—George Cosgrove is under arrest, charged with the larceny of small articles from guests at the Bollinger hotel, while acting in the capacity of porter. It is said his thefts amount to a considerable sum. Many of the missing articles were found in his room. His predecessor is awaiting trial for the larceny of ivory billiard balls and clothing.

WAR AGAINST SALOONS STARTED IN SPOKANE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Spokane, Wash., Nov. 8.—Wholesale warrants have been issued by Justice J. D. Hinkle for the arrest of saloonkeepers who are alleged to have violated the Sunday closing ordinance last Sunday, November 3. In all 187 warrants were issued and have been turned over to the police to serve.

The move to enforce the city ordinance for the closing of saloons on Sunday was backed by the law enforcement league, a quasi secret organization composed of 16 members whose identity is withheld.

NO MORE SURVEYING IN THE CASCADES

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., Nov. 8.—The Harriman surveyors, 60 or 60 in number, who have been at Oregon on a geological survey in the Cascade mountains east of Eugene, have all been laid off, ordered to leave the country by Engineer C. R. Rankin, who was in charge of the several crews, to cease work. The men have begun to arrive in Eugene and the last crew will be down inside of a week.

MANNING INVESTIGATES.

Are the officers and directors of the Title Guarantee & Trust company criminally liable for mismanagement and dissipation of the funds of the defunct institution? This is a question which is now engaging the mind of District Attorney Manning, who is making an investigation into the affairs of the bank to determine whether or not a criminal action will lie against the officials.

Because of the peculiar conditions surrounding the condition of the Trust company, its small available funds and immense deposit list, Mr. Manning has taken the matter under consideration and will conduct a rigid investigation of its affairs. The liability of the directors and officials will be looked into and the facts surrounding the business transactions of the bank will be probed.
