

## WHIP CUTS THUG'S FACE

Stick-Up Man's Command to Hold Up Hands Meets With Unexpected Reception—No Use Reporting Matter to Police.

Halted at the muzzle of a gun in the hands of a lone highwayman, while driving homeward along the Taylor Ferry road, a short distance from West Portland, Oton E. Goodwin, residing on the rural free delivery route No. 1, treated the footpad's admonition to elevate his hands with silent contempt and after slashing the thug across the face with a whip, continued on his way. Convinced of the futility of reporting the matter to the police, Goodwin has written a detailed account of the holdup in a letter to The Journal, to serve as a warning to others who are compelled to travel the highway in question. Goodwin's opinion of the efficiency of the Portland police department coincides with the views of the majority of the residents of this city. The communication is as follows:

I apologized to him for my carelessness—at the same moment I remembered an engagement a little further on, and proceeded—as old Mark said, "I left that place."

## ORCHARDS FACE DREAD SCOURGE

Disease Known as Black Spot Prevalent Throughout the State.

### SMALLER BRANCHES ATTACKED FIRST

Trouble Makes Its Appearance First in Fall of Year—Young Growth Killed—Winter Bordeaux Spray Mixture Checks Progress.

Anthracnose, or black spot, is a disease very prevalent at the present time in our orchards. If left unchecked it will in a large percentage of cases destroy the orchard.

Fortunately, it can be easily controlled. Its presence, therefore, need cause no great alarm, but should demand immediate action. The disease attacks principally the smaller branches, especially upon 1 and 2-year-old wood. At times, however, it attacks the larger branches and trunks of young trees.

**Appears in the Fall.**  
It makes its first appearance in the fall after the rains begin. The first indication of the disease is the appearance of small, roundish, generally depressed brown areas on the bark. They will increase in number up to the last of December. The disease from this time until the activity of plant growth in the spring makes little visible headway, but may have made considerable growth in the new wood and bark not visible on the outside. With the advent of spring and warm weather the growth is very rapid, the spots increase in size, and the depressed areas become very pronounced.

By the middle of June several of the spots may have grown together and as a result we find spots perhaps four inches wide up to 10 inches long. Later on the bark falls, leaving a scar much in appearance like that caused by wrenches from plows, cultivators, etc. Often these spots run together to the extent that they girdle the branch or tree, killing it.

**Vitality Lowered.**  
A tree that is badly attacked will have considerable of the young growth killed and large wounds scattered over the branches. This condition means that the vitality of the tree is lowered and that even with good care it will take several years to restore it to its normal condition.

The best results have been obtained by using two sprays, the first in the winter Bordeaux mixture and should be applied as soon after the fruit is picked as possible. If done at this time it will destroy a large percentage of the spores and check the progress of the disease.

Winter Bordeaux is made by slacking six pounds of lime and dissolving six pounds of sulphate (blue vitriol) in every 20 pounds of water. Slack the lime in a pail by itself, being careful to form a fine milk of lime. This can be strained and diluted to 25 gallons. Place the copper sulphate in a sack and suspend it in water—warm water is quicker in its action. This is then diluted to 25 gallons, the two mixed together and should be applied at once. It will take from one to three gallons to a tree. The main point to be observed is to use enough of the mixture to thoroughly drench the tree.

**Lime and Sulphur.**  
After the leaves have fallen apply the lime and sulphur mixture. This consists of 20 pounds of lime and 50 pounds of sulphur to 150 gallons of water. Take a large kettle or vat, pour in a little water and after it comes to a boil add the lime and sulphur and boil briskly for at least an hour, or until the liquid becomes a blood red color with little free sulphur floating. This is then strained and applied at once. The last spraying, if well done, destroys the remaining spores and thus you have checked the spread of the disease.

Not only is lime and sulphur a fine remedy for anthracnose, but it is the best spray to kill the scale; it also de-

stroys the branch form of woolly aphis, many of the eggs of green aphis, kills the trees of moss and gives the tree more vigor. In addition to the spraying mentioned, I would suggest that if you have trees that have been badly injured by anthracnose that you cut out the diseased spots, wash with Bordeaux and paint over the wounds. If this treatment is given and the orchard receives good care the anthracnose will soon be practically eradicated.

## CLUBS HAMMER AT DRAW BRIDGES
