"Empire" Necklets.

The new "Empire" necklet is the prettiest novelty in jewelry that has been seen for some time, and the most becoming.

The particular feature of the "Empire" necklet is that it is mounted on a band of black velvet which may be either broad or narrow to suit the taste of the wearer. The jeweled portion of the necklet only extends across the front of the throat, so there is not the least stiffness or discomfort in wearing it. The ornaments are made only in the lightest and most delicate patterns, many being copied from old French designs, while others are original. Some of the velvet bands are finished in front with two little velvet ends, either crossed or of unequal length or hanging quite straight and even. Like the bands worn by a bluecoat boy. In every case they are tipped by diamond clasps from which hang a pearl or diamond tassel.

One design is in graceful sprays of foliage and tiny diamond roses, another is very pretty arrangement of trefoils. Others are made in the conventional lines and curves of fresh and drawing. Necklets without the velvet ends are finished along the lower edge by hanging chains of jewels, or an ornament somewhat in the form of a pendant. One very elaborate and beautiful pattern had four graduated festoons of diamonds, each caught up to the velvet by a large pearl-shaped tassel. The "Empire" necklet will also be seen carried out in colored enamel, and is the favorite color, made in small oval plaques, set in silver, and

having very much the appearance of turquoise. These plaques are linked together top and bottom by chains of tiny pearls.

Cream the butter and sugar, add the flour a little at a time, sifted, of course, and stir in thoroughly. Roll out to a thickness of thickness and bake in shallow, well greased pans. Cut into squares while warm, or better still, break into convenient pieces.

Home Needlework.

Some novelties in embroidered clothes are shown in the Ladies Home Journal. One of the simple and attractive things, which could easily be made by any one skillful in needlework is an embroidered folded girth. This is cut six or eight inches wide, and when the work is done the embroidery which is in the center, is laid up in a box plait and the scalloped edges are then folded over this plait. To fold it, it should be basted, and then pressed without removing the basting. The belt should then be stiffened with featherbone at the front, sides and at each end. The edges are to be embroidered in raised button-stitch.

Berlin, Nov. 8.—The Kaiser is a much sicker man than his physicians and relatives are willing to admit. Arrangements have been practically completed for him to spend the winter in southern Europe. It is dangerous for him to remain in the German climate during the cold season on account of his throat trouble. His physicians fear that if he remains in Germany, he will have a bad effect on his majesty's health, but the Kaiser has decided to go at any cost.

Only 15 Per Cent of Adult Males Ranked as Such.

Per cent of men who drink, 85.

Per cent who drink to excess, 30.

Per cent who are inebriated, 12.

Per cent who are incurable, 7.

Per cent of women who drink, 65.

The man who is responsible for these figures is Dr. W. D. Lawrence of Minneapolis.

"Fifteen per cent of the adult males in this country are teetotalers," said Dr. Lawrence to the Des Moines correspondent of the Clinton Herald. "While 65 per cent are what may be termed privilege drinkers, that is, men who claim the right to take a drink if it pleases them, but who do not drink to excess."

"Thirty per cent are diseased through the use of drink or drugs—these statistics relate to the use of drugs as well as the use of liquor. They are incurable and have acquired the habit which is beyond their control. Of these 12 per cent are submerged."

"They are dispossessed and require the attention of the public aid of benevolent societies, organizations. Seven per cent are hopeless and it is useless to expend funds on them except to isolate and detain them, humanely and at work if possible."

PORTLAND PAPER AS GOOD AS GOLD

Clearing House Certificates Look Very Good to Vancouver Merchants and Bankers.

Vancouver, Wash., Nov. 8.—A heavy shipment of gold was received this morning by the banks of Vancouver from the mint at San Francisco. This is the first shipment received from any outside point since the existing flurry came up. The money arrived by express and while the exact amount is not given out, it is known to be a considerable sum.

Banks here will gladly accept this paper either in exchange for goods or for deposit. One banker said this morning, "We would rather have the Portland clearing house money than cash.
