

OFFICER'S LONG WALK.

Lieutenant Castner Tramped Nearly 2,000 Miles.

Francisco Francisco The feat of O'Leary in walking 1,000 miles in 1,000 hours has reminded the officers of the Fourth infantry of a Francisco feat accomplished by Capt Joseph C. Castner, who was then a lieutenant of the Fourth infantry, walked a distance of 1.375 miles in fifty-two days, an average of twenty-six miles a day. The story of the hard-ships undergone by Lieut. Castner dur-ing an exploring expedition in the years 1898-99 is one of thrilling and intense interest. On June 6, 1898, he joined an exploration expedition sent out by the government to find a pass through the Alaskan mountain range of which Mount McKinley, the highest peak in America, forms a part.

Mount McKinley, the highest peak in America, forms a part. Starting from the northwestern part of Alaska, Lieutenant Castner and two privates of the Fourteenth infantry started in a southeasterly direction across an unexplored country, finally arriving at the Yukon river near the mouth of the Tanana river on October 11, 1898, having traversed a distance of 2,000 miles.






