WOOLGROWERS AT THE DALLES

Convention Open, With Good Attendance—River Excursion Tomorrow.

The Dalles, Or., Nov. 12.—The Dalles is filling up with woolgrowers from all sections of the state who have come to the city to be in attendance at the annual meeting of the Oregon State Woolgrowers' association that convened here at 10 o'clock this morning. The rooms of the Commercial club were filled with members of the association and friends who are interested in the work when President Burgess, who was in charge of today's program, formally opened the convention.

For tomorrow morning an excursion to Celilo, the upper end of the Celilo canal, has been planned, and all of the delegates have signified their intention of participating in the pleasurable trip. The plan is to go part of the way by boat and then board the steamer Relier, which piles on the upper river, for the remainder of the trip.

Sessions will be held morning, afternoon and evening tomorrow. Among other questions discussed at this morning's meeting was that of eliminating the pestiferous coyote, which causes such heavy losses yearly by its depredations among the younger lambs. It was suggested by some of the members of the association that the most expeditious and cheapest manner of exterminating the pests would be to form some systematic scheme of poisoning the animals. The plan has been tried in several of the stockraising states and found to be a good one, according to the testimony of the woolgrowers. The advisability of petitioning the several sheepraising counties of the state for the purpose of placing a bounty on coyotes was also mentioned.

Coming to the fact that it is considered by sheepmen that there are methods of dividing the range in the national reserves more equitably than under the present method, various plans were discussed by the convention. A reception committee, consisting of President John Gavin of The Dalles Commercial and Athletic club, Judge A. E. Lake, M. A. Moody, N. Wheeland and J. T. Peters, welcomed the visitors. The officers of the Oregon Woolgrowers' association are as follows: President, J. N. Burgess of Pilot Rock; H. C. Rooper of Antelope, vice-president; Dan P. Smyth of Pendleton, secretary and treasurer.

PENDLETON PARTIES INVEST AT PAYETTE

Pendleton, Or., Nov. 12.—J. H. Gwinn of this city, who has returned from Payette, Idaho, believes that within a short time oil and gas will be on the market in eastern Oregon and southern Idaho. The gas well at Payette is now down 785 feet.

Mr. Gwinn's visit was in the interest of the Pendleton Investment company, and for it he invested heavily in a Payette oil project.

UPS AND DOWNS OF ELEVATOR BUSINESS LEAD TO HIS ARREST

As the direct result of a dispute between Lot Q. Swetland, owner of the Swetland building, Fifth and Washington streets, and Norman B. Taylor, northwest representative of the Van Emon Elevator company, over the efficiency of an elevator installed in the Washington street structure, Taylor was arrested yesterday afternoon upon complaint of Swetland on a charge of larceny. Taylor deposited \$500 to guarantee his appearance in the police court, and the case was continued this morning until Thursday.

According to Swetland's allegation the Van Emon Elevator company was

given the contract to install two "lifts" in his building, and one of the elevators after installation would not work satisfactorily. An employee of the elevator company was sent to remedy the difficulty, but was unsuccessful in fixing the machinery. The owner of the building refused to pay the bill, and says the contractors thereupon removed the magnets, crippling the elevator service. It is for the theft of this portion of the machinery that Swetland caused Taylor's arrest.

It is understood that Taylor admits removing the magnets, but claims that the company which he represents took this action to secure something to guarantee the payment of the bill.

FIGHT PETITION IN BANKRUPTCY

Counsel for Trust Company Files Demurrer to Action Brought Last Week.

Counsel for the Title Guarantee & Trust company filed a demurrer to the United States district court this morning against the petition in bankruptcy which was filed November 7 by Matthias Foeller, A. L. Gianelli and B. C. Ely, on the ground that the concern is not a corporation and therefore not subject to be adjudged a bankrupt under provisions of the act.

The attorneys for the banking institution, in their demurrer, contend that the court has no jurisdiction to entertain the procedure as taken by the plaintiffs or to judge the Title Guarantee & Trust company a bankrupt. It is further alleged that the petitioners, according to their own petition, are not entitled to the relief for which the proceedings were brought.

Dissatisfaction on the part of many of the depositors in the bank against the appointment of G. H. Hill as the receiver brought about the filing of the involuntary bankruptcy petition with the hope that the ruling would be set aside, allowing another receiver to be appointed.

HEARING TOMORROW.

Bank Officers Will Be Taken Before Municipal Court.

The preliminary hearing of J. Thorburn Ross, T. T. Burkhardt and George H. Hill, officers of the defunct Title Guarantee & Trust company, who have been charged with having received deposits after they knew of their institution's insolvency, will be held in the municipal court at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning. It was intended to have the hearing this morning, but the matter was put over a day to secure additional witnesses.

It is not expected the hearing will be carried through as it is the general belief the attorneys for the defense will waive the preliminary examination and take their case to the circuit court direct. This will be done, so it is understood, because the attorneys think it will save time to raise the technical questions concerning the effectiveness of the new banking law in the circuit court and thus save the time and trouble of a second hearing.

FRISCO WANTS SHIP SUBSIDY

Chamber of Commerce Tenders Banquet to Congressional Delegation.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 12.—That a ship subsidy act should be passed immediately by congress to restore the American merchant marine to its former estate was the point chiefly insisted on in the speeches at the banquet given by the San Francisco chamber of commerce to the California congressional delegation at the Fairmont hotel last evening. Other subjects were discussed, inland waterway development, harbor improvement, agriculture, forestry, irrigation, but ship subsidies received the most attention.

It was significant, perhaps, of the wider horizon upon which the Pacific coast has begun to look out, a horizon bounded only by the far reaches of the ocean.

Businesslike simplicity was the keynote of the banquet arrangements. The only decoration of the dining-room was supplied by two American flags behind the guests' table and the plain gilt letters "C. of C." between them. Those who attended numbered 110.

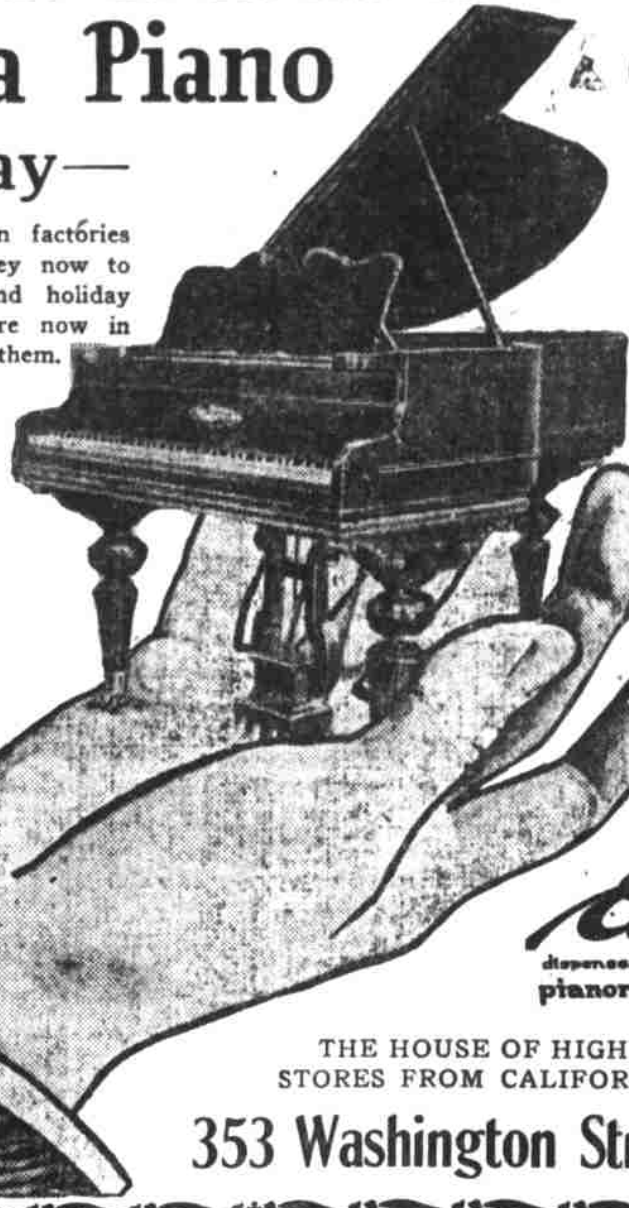

OREGON TIMBER FOR BUILDINGS

Eastern Contractors Learn That Pine From Coast Is Good Material.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)

Washington, D. C., Nov. 12.—Eastern builders have hitherto regarded the long leaf yellow pine as the standard construction timber, and they have been chary about accepting the western varieties such as Oregon pine, fir, spruce and hemlock, for structural uses. The experiments by the forest service largely in obliterating the prejudice, and the truth is being forced home to the eastern builders that the western timbers are valuable for such uses.

With the shortening supply of the long leaf, western varieties naturally come under severe questioning as to their value. The forest service guards the western Douglas fir as second in value to the long leaf sort, and the fir is stamped with the government's approval for structural use.

Experiments have been made at several places in the west, the University of Oregon at Eugene, the University of Washington at Seattle, at several points in California, and the result is to establish more firmly in the good opinion of eastern builders the western kinds. As a matter of fact, the problem for the west is not so much the upbuilding of a market for its timber, as to devise means whereby the supply may be conserved for the use of future generations. The recent investigations of Forester Pinchot in the country at large, and especially in the Pacific coast states, reveals a condition which is alarming—the supply of the nation can not last more than a quarter of a century unless means be taken to conserve the stand on the mountains.

However, the enhancement of the market value of the timber which is being cut from year to year brings

LOCKED CONDUCTOR IN HANDCAR HOUSE

Italians Resist Intrusion of Rude, Ungentlemanly Freight Train and Rout the Crew.

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 12.—Because they were awakened from their peaceful slumbers by being rolled out of bed, a band of Italians on a work train near Whitefish, Montana, chased the crew of the freight several miles.

This evidently made them sore, for they ran onto the sidetrack so fast that when their train struck the work cars nearly every foreigner was rolled from his bed and some were slightly injured.
