

GREAT RAILROAD SYNDICATE WILL RESTORE CONDITIONS

MORGAN, HILL, ROCKEFELLER AND OTHER VAST INTERESTS IN CONTROL

THE LARGEST HOLDING COMPANY IN WORLD

Bundles of Stock Bought by Combine, and Now That Plans Have Matured, Financial Aid Will Be Proffered--Harriman Plays a Minor Part--Gould Out of the Scheme

New York, Nov. 13.—The railroad banking interests' answer to the country's demand for regulation has been the formation of the greatest railroad syndicate and holding company this country or the world has ever seen.

Only piecemeal thus far have the facts leaked out regarding the great game that has been played in railroad finance.

Their control now includes the following railroads, steamship lines and large industries: Standard Oil company, Amalgamated Copper, United States Steel, Northern Pacific, Great Northern, Chicago Burlington & Quincy, Illinois Central, Erie, Chicago & Alton, New York Central, Pennsylvania Central, Baltimore & Ohio, Louisville & Nashville, Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe, Southern Railway, Union Pacific and its group, Southern Pacific and its group, Pacific Mail Steamship company, Hill's Oriental steamship line, New England Railway system, Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, Morse Steamship lines.

In fact, the only great transcontinental railway system left out of the consolidation is the Gould railroads, and these will drop into the lap of this giant combine before long, because it will squeeze the life out of Gould by making it impossible for him to get more money.

MILLIONS FOR WHEAT GROWERS

Out of Northwest Yield of 60,000,000 Bushels, 40,000,000 at 75 Cents Remain in Hands of Farmers—Demand for All of It.

"Kill Prosperity in Face of That? Impossible," Says President Wilcox of Portland Flouring Mills—The World's Markets Open.

In an address to about 100 Commercial club men at their monthly dinner last evening, T. B. Wilcox, president of the Portland Flouring Mills company, who presided as toastmaster, gave some interesting figures regarding the present stage of the Pacific northwest crop movement.

"Since my return October 1 from the east I have at no time expressed to my closest friends any view of the probable outcome. Perhaps the least said is the best. But this evening for the first time I am willing to say I believe the financial flurry is over.

Cannot Destroy Prosperity. The speaker said 1908 he went into the interior to buy wheat and conditions were quite different. The wheat had got wet, and it was not in the best condition.

Thousands of Inquiries. The keynote of the club's dinner was "Advertising Oregon" and one of the most enlightening talks was given by John H. Whyte, manager of the Commercial club, whose system is a method of classified advertising in newspapers and magazines of America.

Outside Towns Represented. Hood River was represented by A. Jayne, E. H. Shepard, publisher of "Better Fruit," B. H. Wallace, J. A. Wilson, and J. H. Hellbronn. A. P. Baltham, president of the Mosier Valley Commercial club, was among the guests.

FEAR FOR FUTURE HAS VANISHED

Local Banking Situation Rapidly Assuming Normal Tone—Depositors' Confidence in Portland Institutions Shown on All Sides.

Merchants National Will Double Present Capitalization and in All Probability Move Into Larger Quarters Within Short Time.

Banking conditions in Portland have more nearly resumed the normal today than at any time since the present financial flurry overtook the country, according to those who have been keeping in touch with the tone of business and the spirit of the people.

Business has so far swung back to the normal that the depositors' windows are more patronized than the paying tellers and the deposits are not being disturbed in any greater degree than is usual in the general transaction of business.

At the Merchants National the working force from President Watson's morning showed no excitement and but few people at the institutions. From the conversation of depositors and people generally the sentiment is shown that the crisis is past and that no further trouble will be experienced by Portland banks in meeting all demands and carrying themselves safely from this time on.

ANDERSON DANGEROUS CHARACTER

Counterfeiter Captured by Police Thought to Have Been Man Who Attacked Miss Agnes Albers—Evidence Against Him.

Government Officers Kept Tab on Him and Kuhn Who Was Helping Make Spurious \$5 Pieces—Tell-Tale Diary.

In John Anderson, counterfeiter, the United States secret service has probably captured the man who attempted an assault on Miss Agnes Albers on the first of this month when the young girl was crossing a bridge over Sullivan gulch.

Miss Albers has not been brought before Anderson for the purpose of identifying the man as her assailant as it was feared by her parents that the shock would weaken her nerves to a dangerous extent.

Work of Secret Service. Shortly after the Sullivan gulch incident the secret service men secured evidence that Anderson and an ex-convict named Fred Stuart were preparing to flood Portland with counterfeit \$5 gold pieces.

WALSH'S FRENZIED FINANCE

Prosecutor Childs Declares Banker Accepted Worthless Notes of Assistant Cashier as Collateral for Loans With Which He Built Railroad.

He will charge Walsh, through Frederick McLean, former assistant cashier of the Chicago National bank, who obtained \$2,000,000 from his three banks, with accepting McLean's notes for as much as \$150,000 in one day.

MEXICANS ARE DEPORTING REDS

KILLS WIFE BY WRECKING AUTO

Banker of Rome Stretches Wire Across Road to Trap Faithless Wife.
