SHORT DELINQUENT
LIST IN UMATILLA

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Pendleton, Or., Nov. 14.—When taxes became delinquent on October 1, the books of the sheriff's office showed but \$11,524.24 delinquent and this amount has since been cut down to the extent of \$1,777.45. Aside from this still further payments are expected and it is the belief of the office deputy that only \$7,000 of \$8,000 will remain unpaid at the close of the year. The total amount due Umatilla county for taxes this year was \$23,212.10. The county clerk, with that amount the sum now unpaid is very small.
