

WILL LOAD FOR PANAMA CANAL

British Steamer Sheila Coming Here From South America.

Outward Cargo to Consist of Portion of Large Quantity of Lumber for Which an Order Was Recently Placed Here.

It was announced this morning that in a few weeks the British steamer Sheila will be here to load lumber for Panama. The cargo will be a portion of the large quantity that was booked for Panama some time ago and of which mention was made at that time in The Journal. It was also announced that the British bark Gladys is on the way to Portland from San Jose de Guatemala, consigned to Taylor, Young & Co. The Gladys will load grain or lumber.

The Sheila is now at Valparaiso or on her way north from there. She has capacity for nearly 3,000,000 feet of lumber and it is said that possibly she will take part of her first cargo from mills on Puget sound. At any rate about 2,000,000 feet will be shipped from mills in the Puget sound.

The coming of the bark Gladys from San Jose de Guatemala was commented on among shipping men this morning especially because of the fact that sailing vessels often find it difficult to get away from the coast in that part of the world, calms and cross currents holding them back sometimes for months on a small stretch of water.

Captain Sainty, master of the British bark Port Patrick which is now here in the harbor, relates an experience he had some years ago in leaving the Guatemalan port with the British bark. The bark was driven back and forth along the coast with the ebb and flood of the tide, while making 300 miles to sea. Judging from this experience there is no telling how soon the Gladys will be here although she left San Jose on the 25th of last month.

DECEMBER AT SEA.

Hydrographic Office Issues Monthly Pilot Chart.

Relative to weather and winds for the month of December the pilot chart of the north Pacific ocean issued by the hydrographic office has this to say:

"Throughout the entire stretch between San Francisco bay and the Strait of Fuca the course of the winds will be from southeast, with falling barometer, through south to southwest and west, with falling barometer. Immediately under the coast the prevailing winds will be southeast. Within the zone 125 to 150 miles west of 40 degrees north, the most frequent direction will be south, over 50 per cent of all the winds being included between south and southeast. Between 150 and 180 degrees west, as also to the southward of 40 degrees, the winds will have greater frequency. Slightly westward and southward of the entire area, the latter from south-southwest to west. "Continuing southward northwesterly winds may be expected as far as Acapulco, covering a belt extending 200 miles offshore from 15 to 19 degrees west. Northwesterly winds will prevail; likewise from 10 to 5 degrees as far west as the 105th meridian, beyond which the prevailing direction will be southeast. "The average frequency of calms between these parallels is 20 per cent (20 hours in each hundred). The present month inaugurates the dry season (December-March) on the coast of Central America, the main feature of which is the absence of thunderstorms. "Typhoons are not frequent during December and are rare during January. Their occurrence is confined to the region between Guam and Luzon and to the southern part of the China sea. One of the earliest signs of the approach of a typhoon is the apparent failure of the barometer to respond to the diurnal oscillation."

ANOTHER OIL CARRIER.

Whaleback Steamer, City of Everett, Coming to Coast.

The Standard Oil company is said to be planning to add another large oil-carrier to its fleet on the Pacific coast, this being a six large steamers and two barges in the trade between San Francisco and ports in the Pacific northwest.

The craft to be added is the whaleback steamer City of Everett, now plying between New York and Mexican ports. She is an historic old craft and has the distinction of being the first whaleback built on the Pacific coast. She was constructed at Everett, Wash., for the coal trade, but proved a failure and was sent tramping around the world. She was dispatched to Calcutta with a cargo of grain for the Standard Oil company and was converted into an oil-carrier.

TWO STEAMERS ARRIVE.

Queen Louise in Harbor and Como at Astoria.

The large British steamer Queen Louise arrived in the harbor this afternoon and went to the mills of the Eastern & Western Lumber company to line for her cargo of wheat which is to be taken to Europe. She is here from San Francisco in ballast.

The Queen Louise is a large carrier and will get away with all of 7,000 tons of wheat. She will be followed by the British steamer Como, which crossed in at Astoria last night bound for this port under charter of Kerr, Gifford & Co. to carry wheat to Europe.

The French bark Martha Roux and Versailles arrived in yesterday from European ports with general cargo and they were followed this morning by a three-masted bark and a ship, one of them in ballast. These names had not been ascertained late this afternoon.

Thirteen Clark County Potatoes Whose Combined Weight is 28 Pounds.

Thirteen potatoes from four hills, weighing 28 pounds—that is the record made by Michael Nolan, one of the old time residents and potato farmers of Clark county, Washington. The picture shows these 13 spuds just as they came from the ground, the largest one in the

middle. This giant tips the scales at four pounds and six ounces. Four of the 13 are of the Burbank variety, and the remainder are Early Rose. The three Burbanks, aside from the largest one, average two and one half pounds in weight. The average weight

for the Early Rose is about one and three quarter pounds. Mr. Nolan has about 12 acres in potatoes, and will have an average yield of 375 bushels to the acre, the best in his experience. His farm is near Phoebe Hill, and the soil on which the big crop was produced is fir land, sandy and at the top of a high hill.

FAMOUS OLD VOLUME GIVEN TO LIBRARY

Institution Has on Shelves 1755 Issue of Johnson's Dictionary.

The library is the recipient of a fine copy of Dr. Johnson's famous dictionary, the second edition, 1755, presented by Harvey W. Scott. The gift has added value because of Mr. Scott's autograph on the flyleaf as first librarian of this institution during the years 1864-1865.

The library has several exhibits worth attention at present. In the west alcove of the reference room may be found the traveling library of the National Arts and Crafts society. This is near a table where the books may be comfortably examined. In the circulating department the arts and crafts books that the library owns are placed on exhibit for shelves convenient for use. The monthly bulletin of the library contains a special list on this subject and will be mailed on request to those who are specially interested.

In the cases on the landing are exhibited at present some of the manuscripts of the Wilson collection. These are particularly interesting to those who remember Mr. Wilson because his notes upon each manuscript are included.

The statistics for the month of October show a great increase. The total circulation from all departments was 26,347. Of this number the children's room claims 3,741, the county stations 1,233, the Sellwood branch 1,211, the Albina branch 718, the East Side branch, 1,322.

MRS. THOMAS CAME TO LINN IN 1852

Albany, Or., Nov. 16.—Another of the pioneers of the early settlers passed away yesterday, when Mrs. A. Thomas, who had lived near this city since 1852, died. She was born in Iowa and came to Oregon when only 5 years of age. Surviving children are: Mrs. Clara Hand of this city; Mrs. Mary Wheeler of Blue Lake, California; and Mrs. Anna Bacon of La Grande. Her husband, Al Thomas of this city, also survives her.

RECORDS FASTER THAN THOUGHT

Military Target Keeps Account of 1,800,000 Rounds Per Hour.

Sydney A. M. Rose, an electrical engineer of Melbourne, Australia, who has invented a computing, time-sighting target for use in military practices, is in Portland on his way to the patent office to secure rights in this country. The target is invaluable for military purposes and can also be used extensively by gun clubs.

The target will accurately record hits

fired as often as 30 volleys a minute, no matter how heavy are the volleys or in what succession they are fired. The result is recorded at the firing point. The mechanism of the target will record the results of 1,800,000 rounds an hour. It is electrical and simple in principle, according to Mr. Rose.

Another invention that Mr. Rose has in progress of development is a method of transmitting photographs or facsimiles of hand-writing to any practical distance by means of a wireless system similar to the Marconi system. Mr. Rose was born in Liverpool, but has been a resident of Australia for the last 20 years. He owns and operates at Melbourne a plant for the manufacture of electrical machinery and supplies. He has invented a target similar to the one now in his possession, and has already secured patents in nearly every European nation and America. This latest invention is a great improvement over any previous target.

Held for Pointing a Gun.

Fendleton, Or., Nov. 16.—John LaCourse, who has been held in the county jail for some days, has been held to appear before the grand jury under \$200 bonds. LaCourse, it is alleged, pointed a gun at Chance Rogers while the latter, in company with another man, was riding by the LaCourse place, near Adams.

DESPERADO IS SHOT BY POSSE

Harry Stout Is Killed After Making Daring Effort to Escape Pursuers.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 16.—Tracked into his night's camp in the brush and covered with rifles by two members of a police posse which for a week had been pressing him over the snow-covered hills north of Kamloops, Harry Stout, murderer, made a last desperate effort to escape. He fired point blank at one of the policemen who had tracked him. The second officer pulled his trigger so quickly that the two desperadoes came almost together. The desperado was instantly killed. The policeman escaped unharm.

The tragedy marked the end of a man hunt that has stirred the north country as did the Tracy case in Oregon and Washington. A week ago Stout was tentatively killed Robert Williams, owner of a string of trading posts in Caribou and the Big Bend country. Stout had tried to escape from the district with two stolen horses and Williams had sought to arrest him as the thief was making ready to cross North river. Williams was shot in cold blood.

The country was aroused and Indians and white people alike joined police forces sent from Kamloops in charge of Province Constable Fernie.

BRIDGE BIDDERS CLOSE WITH FIGURES

Only \$1,800 Between Highest and Lowest Estimate on Structure.

Bids for the new bridge at Union avenue over Sullivan's gulch were opened at a meeting of the executive board yesterday with the following bidders: International Contract company, Seattle, \$7,450; Robert Wakefield, Portland, \$7,137; Minneapolis Steel Machinery company, \$7,985. All the bids were accompanied by certified checks covering 10 per cent of the amounts named.

No award was made by the board because of the banking holiday and all bids were referred to the committee on bridges. Considerable doubt arose as to whether it would be legal for the board to open the bids, but after a discussion in which City Attorney Kavanaugh gave an opinion the envelopes were opened and the bids read. Surprise was expressed at the close of the bidding by the bidders. There is only \$1,800 difference between the lowest and highest bidders which is considered remarkably close for the large sums involved.

According to Mr. Kavanaugh's opinion the board was within its rights in opening the bids for the bridge, but he stated that the city could not award bids for street improvement work because of the holiday.

LANE MAN WANDERS AWAY IN DELIRIUM

Andrew King Came to Eugene, to Brother's Funeral, and Vanished.

Eugene, Or., Nov. 16.—Andrew King, a resident of the Upper McKenzie valley, has disappeared, and his people are much worried lest he has met with some accident or has lost his mind and has wandered away. He arrived in Eugene Thursday afternoon to attend the funeral of his brother, Charles King, who was killed the day before at Marcola. He put up his team in a neighbor's barn and has not been seen since. He was complaining of being ill when he arrived and had a high fever. It is thought he might have become delirious and wandered away, or that he might have gone to a lodging house, and being unable to attend the funeral staying there, he might have failed to reveal his whereabouts. The missing man is about 45 years old.

WAGES ON KLAMATH PROJECT REDUCED

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Klamath Falls, Or., Nov. 16.—The United States reclamation service has announced that beginning with November 15, wages will be reduced to \$2.48 per day. A large force of men is employed on the Klamath project and whether the cut will take many men off remains to be seen. Two weeks ago men were scarce at \$3 for the eight hour day, but conditions have changed rapidly. The reclamation service on that part of the project that is being handled by the service direct, without the intervention of contractors, raised wages here recently to \$2 a day, much to the consternation of ranchers and others, who were thus forced to outbid the government in the business season of the year in order to get any portion of the then meager labor supply.

PASSING OF PIONEER WOMAN AT EUGENE

Eugene, Or., Nov. 16.—Mrs. Mary J. White, an Oregon pioneer of 1850, died at her home in Eugene yesterday at the age of 75 years. She was born at Springfield, Illinois, and was married to Charles White, March 18, 1845. In 1850 they came across the plains to Oregon, settling in Yamhill county. They afterward resided at various places on the coast, and came to Eugene in 1860. Mrs. White leaves four children, 12 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren. The children are: O. C. White of Olympia, Washington; F. C. White of Seattle; Mrs. C. W. Larimer of Los Gatos, California; and C. C. White of Eugene. Mrs. White was a lifelong member of the Methodist Episcopal church.

UNDERPAID MEN ARE LAID OFF FOR JAPS

Dollar and a Half a Day Is Too Much for Southern Pacific to Dig Up.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Eugene, Or., Nov. 16.—The Southern Pacific company has replaced its eight white section men on the railroad here with Japanese. The white men were laid off yesterday without any previous notice. Most of them are heads of families, and were calculating upon working all winter, having worked all spring and summer at a lower wage than they could have received for other work. The order that they must have steady jobs during the winter. All summer the whites received \$1.75 a day, but on October 1 they were reduced to \$1.50.
