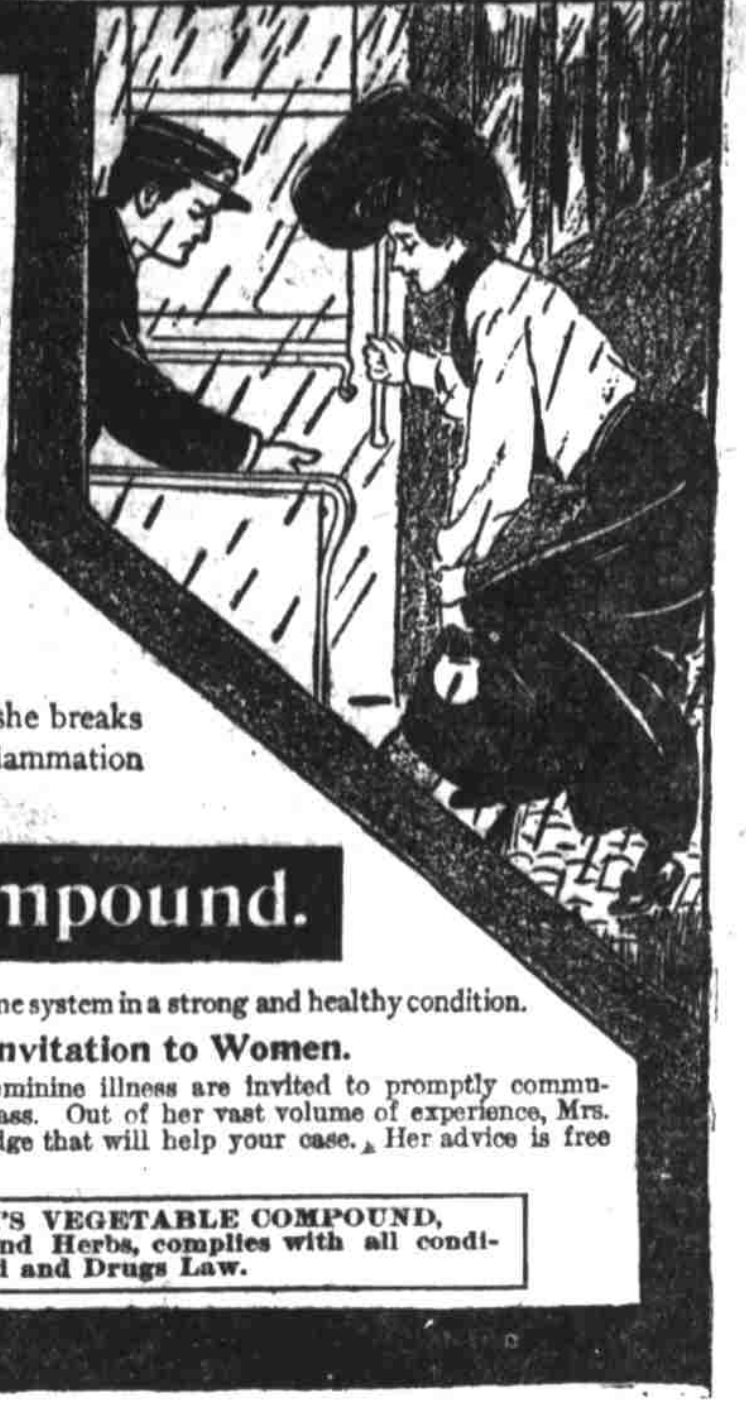

When the dramatic company with which she has been playing crashed on the rock of financial stringency, William Atchinson of Los Angeles, who had followed the attraction across the continent to lay siege to Miss Ost's heart, hastened to Chicago, where he found her escorted with her mother at the Beverly house, awaiting an "engagement."

Atchinson offered her one that would be permanent, with a command of his fortune, but despite her discouraging surroundings the young woman declined to become the wife of the millionaire.

At various playhouses throughout the country young Atchinson was a conspicuous figure, always an occupant of a box. He never missed a performance, and at each he would present Miss Ost with a huge bouquet of American

Beauty roses when she appeared on the stage. Atchinson gave up the quest today and left for the coast in disgust.

PROHIBITION BILL PASSED IN ALABAMA

TAKES EYE OUT TO SHOW COURT

Witness in Damage Suit Makes Gruesome Exhibit for Judge at Tacoma.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 20.—Twenty miners who have been employed by the Northwestern Improvement company in the Ravendale mines testified before Judge Hanford in the federal court that it is the custom of the mining corporation to keep the miners supplied with quantities of dynamite and caps which would blow all to certain destruction were it to be exploded by a falling stone or a spark from a lamp.

This testimony of a startling nature, involving a violation of state laws, was developed during the progress of the trial of the suit of John Starned against the Northwestern Improvement company for \$20,000 damages alleged to be due the plaintiff because of the loss of an eye and ear in an explosion at the Ravendale mines.

The plaintiff, when placed on the stand, removed a glass eye from an empty socket by way of illustrating the extent of his injuries. The effect of this action was startling. Several women spectators fainted, and even the attorneys in the suit turned pale.

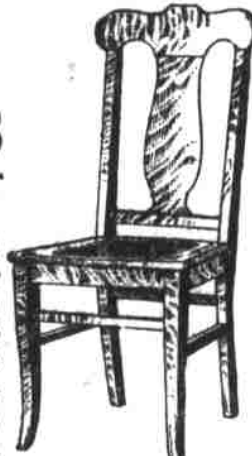
