MOBILE THREATENS TO SECEDE FROM ALABAMA

REDWAY HERE TO DELIVER LECTURE

Prominent Geographer Was Cub Reporter in Portland 30 Years Ago.

Jacques W. Redway, F. R. G. S., geographer of Mount Vernon, New York, who was a newspaper reporter in Portland 30 years ago, arrived at the Hotel Portland this morning. Beginning next Monday Mr. Redway will deliver a series of lectures before the teachers' institute. Mr. Redway is one of the best known geographers in the country, and has written several books on the subject. One of them, and perhaps the best known, is "A New Basis of Geography." The sale of this publication averages 1,000,000 copies every year. After his career of more than a year as a cub reporter in Portland, Mr. Redway went to California, where he became instructor of chemistry in the University of California. Afterward he traveled extensively in South America, Europe and Asia and other countries for the purpose of geographical study. When the civil war broke out two of Mr. Redway's brothers enlisted in the confederacy and were killed. He lived in Tennessee at that time. During the war he went to Chicago as a refugee, and then drifted west and landed in Portland. First he worked at mining, but didn't do very well. Later he entered the services of Ben Holliday's overland company. For some time he acted as a special messenger carrying dispatches out of Portland to the south. Mr. Redway was covering the legislature for the Oregonian at Salem at the time of the encounter between W. H. Watkins, warden of the penitentiary, and Sylvester Penney, who afterward became governor of Oregon. Mr. Redway will remain in Portland and vicinity several weeks devoting most of his time to lecturing.

MOUNT TABOR TO BE TAKEN OFF MORRISON

East Side Cars, as Formerly, Will Swing Around Yamhill Loop. Beginning Sunday next all the Morrison bridge cars will loop around from the west end of the bridge to Third and up Third and out over the Yamhill street line as used to be the case. This will put the Sunnyside and Mount Tabor cars back on their old run and take them off the Morrison street line where they are now operated. The car swing about the Union depot loop, come up Third street to Morrison and go out that street to Nineteenth and then up Thurman to Willamette heights. The Twenty-third street line will find its terminus at the twenty-seventh and Thurman streets, the old place established during the Lewis and Clark exposition. The only change in the service over that which was in effect during the exposition will be the routing of the Morrison street line to Willamette heights. The change at this time has been caused in large part by the delays experienced by the Sunnyside and Mount Tabor cars on the Morrison street bridge. Because of the delays the service was discontinued and a large share of the Morrison street traffic was switched to Washington street, already congested. It is expected by the officials of the city that the return of the old routings will work for the general improvement of the service.
