

KILLED BY EXPOSURE NEAR CITY

Two Men Perish Within Sight of Lights of Vancouver, British Columbia—Are Dead When Companion Secures Aid.

Hunting Boat Capsizes Off Howe Sound—One Member of the Party Swims Ashore but Others Are Unable to Withstand Cold

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 21.—Within sight of the city's lights, Alexander Holden, aged 18, and Richard Hudson, aged 50, died a frightful death from exposure. They were business men who had been on a hunting trip, the third member of the party being Arthur Chapman. Monday night their boat capsized off Howe sound, less than 10 miles from Vancouver. At daylight Holden swam ashore, but the cliffs were too precipitous and the seas running too high for him to gain a footing. He managed with great difficulty to get back to the overturned sailboat. Chapman and Hudson had been left clinging to the overturned boat. When Holden reached the overturned craft on his return he was in a state of complete exhaustion. Hudson and Chapman lifted him to the keel of the capsized boat and bound him with ropes so that if he should become unconscious he would not fall into the water. Then Chapman made a swim for the shore and after a desperate effort climbed the cliffs. Yesterday Chapman gave the alarm and two tugs loaded with men quickly put out to the rescue. Late last night the tugs returned. The rescuers found the capsized craft about eight miles out, with Holden's body still bound to it. Hudson must have been benumbed and washed overboard, and drowned. There was no trace of him and he could not swim.

He is a Washington county man by birth, his father, Robert Stevenson of Forest Grove, having recently been appointed state game warden by Governor Chamberlain.

John H. Stevenson is a young man, about 30 years of age and of studious nature, and a most successful career in the legal profession is predicted for him by those who have followed his efforts to secure his admission to the bar.

In connection with the appointment of Mr. Stevenson to his position comes the story that Gus C. Moser, who for nearly four years has held the office of chief deputy under Mr. Manning, is to resign between this time and the first of the year. No statement will be made by the district attorney regarding the position now held by Mr. Manning, who will undoubtedly be a candidate for reelection, though he has not as yet made any announcement to that effect.

So far the two most frequently mentioned Republican aspirants for the district attorneyship are Moser and George J. Cameron, present municipal judge. Both of these men are sure to enter the contest, and unless some dark horse not now known comes out for the nomination the battle will be between them at the primaries.

Fire Marshal Roberts has found it necessary to caution citizens in regard to chimney fires because of the fact that 17 blazes of this nature have been reported so far this month. The trouble is due, said Mr. Roberts this morning, to the carelessness of residents in allowing their chimneys to be used without cleaning them.

As many of the chimneys are filled with soot and the accumulation of last winter, a brisk stove fire generally starts a blaze that often has serious results. Mr. Roberts attributes many of the chimney fires to the use of dry slabwood and unclean chimneys.

Another class of fires which the fire marshal has found necessary to caution citizens about are those which occur in the past week and Mr. Roberts threatens to prosecute future offenders for their carelessness.

MRS. HARTJE IS GIVEN DIVORCE

Court Refuses to Allow Millionaire to Reopen Case Which Startled Nation.

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 21.—The Hartje divorce case was today decided in the superior court in favor of Mrs. Hartje. The court refused Hartje's petition to reopen the case. The lower court had denied Hartje's petition for a divorce and the possession of the children, after the husband had been accused of the gravest improprieties. Tom Madine, Hartje's coachman and chief correspondent, was named by the plaintiff and Clifford Hooe, negro, also a coachman, was dragged into the case.

At the time the husband's plea for a divorce was refused, Mrs. Hartje's attorneys alleged that letters introduced as evidence, supposed to have been written to Mrs. Hartje by the coachman were forgeries.

JOHN BARRETT CALLS PEOPLE TO SESSION

Santiago, Chile, Nov. 21.—John Barrett, the North American director of the bureau of American republics, has sent a circular to the representatives of all the Latin-American states reminding them of the approach of the third international sanitary convention to meet in Mexico from December 2 to 7, authorized by the international commissions of Mexico in 1901 and of Rio Janeiro in 1906, and asking the states to send delegates.
