

\$50,000,000 FOR RIVERS

Chamber of Commerce Receives Eastern Praise for Good Work—Portland Organization Promotes New Slogan to Aid Waterways.

"To no organization in the entire United States is the National Rivers and Harbors Congress more indebted for consistent and loyal support than to the Portland chamber of commerce. It gives me very great pleasure to bear truthful testimony to the fact," Secretary J. F. Ellison, Washington, D. C.

At a meeting of the Portland chamber of commerce committee on rivers, harbors and navigation this afternoon a plan of work was laid out in connection with the coming campaign of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress to secure from the next session of the federal congress an appropriation of \$50,000,000 for improvement of the nation's waterways.

The committee is composed of W. B. Ayer, W. D. Winchwright, W. M. Lund, T. B. Wilcox, Henry Hahn, F. Adams, L. A. Lewis, T. D. Honeyman, S. M. Stearns, A. H. Jowers, J. F. Ladd, W. H. Corbett. The chamber has rendered financial assistance to the movement since its inception and is deeply interested in its ultimate outcome. It is believed that by persistent work in the building up of public sentiment along the right lines the waterway slogan of "Fifty Millions Annually for Improvement of Rivers and Harbors" can be realized in the near future. The splendid support given by Portland is especially appreciated in the east. Secretary J. F. Ellison of the Rivers and Harbors Congress in a letter to the Portland chamber said:

M'PHERSON SOUTH BOUND

Fourth Man of Postoffice Robber Gang Believed to Be on Steamship Costa Rico, Due Tomorrow at San Francisco.

From information secured by Patrolman Dick Stuart it is believed that Frank McPherson, wanted for complicity in the robbery of Cuban Dryden's drug store and sub-postoffice station No. 2, is a passenger on the steamer Costa Rico of the San Francisco & Portland Steamship company, due to arrive in the Bay City tomorrow morning.
The San Francisco police have been notified by wire to search the steamer upon arrival and if McPherson is on board to take him into custody. Representatives from the United States marshal's office in San Francisco will also be on hand to assist in the capture, as the young crook is also wanted on a federal charge.
McPherson is regarded as a desperate criminal and a hardy man. He is known to be armed and will no doubt sell his life dearly rather than return to a life of imprisonment.

Patrolman Stuart's investigation shows that McPherson resided in a longhouse at 101st and Harrison streets. His rooming place is in the neighborhood of the police station. McPherson upon leaving said a wife was waiting for him. A young woman with whom the alleged crook had been keeping company said that he informed her that Seattle was his destination, but engaged passage to San Francisco on the Costa Rico.

BOSTON WARMS UP TO BISHOP'S TALK

Rt. Rev. Seadding Attracts Widespread Attention at Country's Hub.

Right Rev. Charles Seadding, bishop of Oregon, has been delivering illustrated lectures on Oregon and the needs of his diocese in the principal cities of the east. The Boston Transcript, in commenting upon his address, says: "The bishop's address, which was profusely illustrated with stereopticon views, was on 'The Church in America,' and he began with the celebration of the last service of holy communion at Jamestown. He carried his audience into the past, telling of the early days of the west, meantime giving a very illuminating account of what the Episcopal church has done and is doing for the numerous Indian reservations throughout the country, beginning with the Iroquois in northern New York. Pictures of the misdeeds of early days and of the primitive conditions were shown. One especially interesting picture was that of a group of Indians, a woman's auxiliary composed entirely of Sioux Indians, whose contributions to the cause of missions, often representing the only resources of the reservation, have amounted to \$2,246.
Oregon Attracts New People.
"Oregon was shown as the land of opportunity to a prospective agricultural and commercial state with vast possibilities before it. There are crowds of a high class of people coming into the state every year and the great problem of the church is how to have Christianity take root with the commercial progress. The crying need is for men to conduct the services in these new closed churches which are in excellent repair, and for funds, and the bishop appealed pathetically for help to save people to the church, for there are many moving from the east, who, not finding the ministrations of the denomination to which they were accustomed, have left away in the past."
An interviewer in another issue of the same paper says of Bishop Seadding: "Energy is probably the most salient characteristic of Bishop Seadding. He is always alert, direct, aggressive, but courteous. He is the same thing, but with a cordiality which wins the friends on every hand. He seems a natural champion for the great diocese to the care of which he was consecrated in September of last year."
Need of More Workers.
"From his home, 'Bishopcraft,' in Portland, the bishop has covered the state since the time, partly by rail, partly by stage, and partly on horseback. He has charges of 10 parishes and missions, but, unfortunately, he says, he has but 22 ministers for this great diocese. To the increase of this preaching force, the bishop is bending every effort, and there is reason to believe that his qualities of leadership will bring workers to his standard as they have done in the past."
"This fertile garden," says the bishop, "is attracting settlers—Anglo-Saxons from everywhere. They beg for the ministrations of the church. Will not you in the east, he urges, send us some young, strong, sympathetic men? This church must be a power in the state, not only in religion, but in the general welfare."

CHANGES IN COAST ARTILLERY SPECIES

Astoria, Ore., Nov. 22.—Captain Harry L. Steele of Fort Stevens, who was recently assigned to the command of the 11th company, coast artillery at Fort Duane, Florida, has gone to take up his new command. Captain Steele has been stationed at Fort Stevens since 1902, in command of the Ninety-third company. Sergeant Major Warren C. Baxley, also of Fort Stevens, has been transferred to Fort Baker, California.
The work of mounting the new 10-inch guns at the fort is progressing favorably, the guns being in the trunks now. In future the work will consist solely of assembling the gun accessories.

The Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth companies, coast artillery corps, having been designated as torpedo companies, will soon receive practical instructions in the loading and laying of submarine mines.

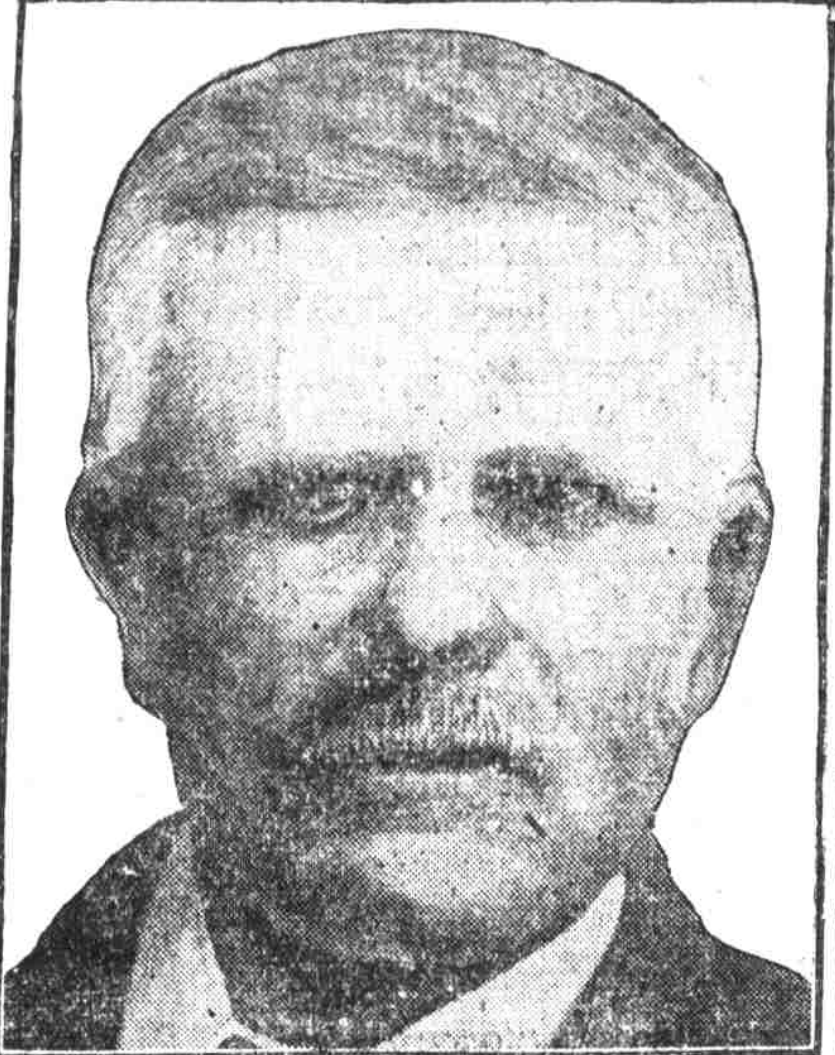

With its bewildering array of callings and hours, sailors, soldiers and brigands "The Royal Cheer" has returned to the stage for a three-day engagement. It is practically a new comedy this year and just as much fun was extracted from it last night as of yore. It is a rather cleverly written comedy in one particular at least. The author keeps you sailing in shallow waters a great part of the time, apparently making straight for some particular naughty trick that will disrupt things completely, playfully taking up and then down the sea of double entendres only to land you safe at last in a quiet and eminently respectable scene, where he says to you, "Evil be to him who evil thinks." An exhilarating sport, that.

There's an average good lot of chorus girls, some brooders and a painfully overworked lot of chorus men. We extend our sympathies to those six men. They sing better than most and they do have to work so very hard and fast and long.

As the chief, from Chicago, Heinrich Lemplauer, William J. McCarthy—how the two names snap at one another—extracted as much mirth and laughter

as the part contains. He does very well as a comedian, and has some native wit, evidently. Franklin Fox is the deep-voiced Lord Minto and Oscar Ragland, the huge fellow who played the Rajah for two seasons back, is again in the role.

There is a great deal of sparkle and go in the music of the Chief, there are half a dozen song hits in it by which it

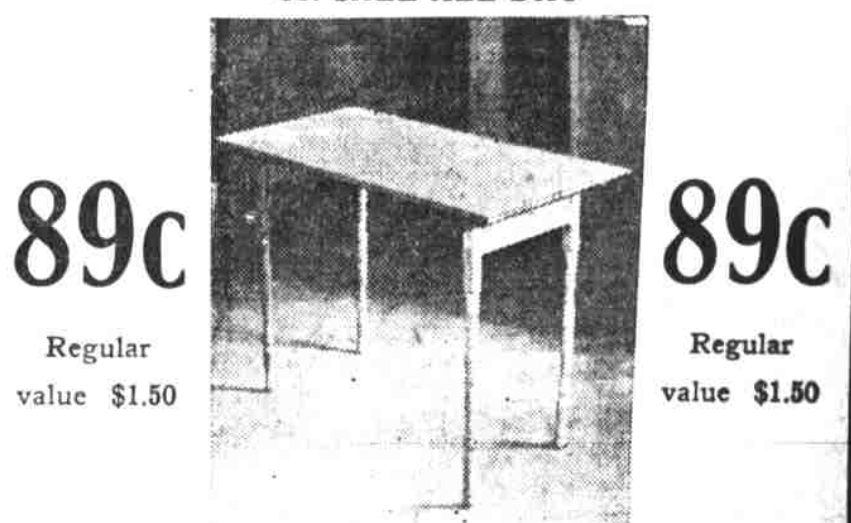
became widely known. And that these have lost none of their flavor in the passage of time was testified to by the favor with which they were received last night.
