

ENDLETON BANK OPEN THE MONEY CIRCULATES

Deposits Received and No Withdrawals—Had Been Observing Legal Holidays but Found Business Confidence Restored.

Second Issue of Clearing House Certificates Paid Out by Bank—Old Issue Recalled—Notes Impossible to Counterfeit.

Pendleton, Or., Nov. 25.—The Pendleton Savings bank, after observing legal holidays for the past two weeks, opened this morning and is doing business as usual. No withdrawals have been made and deposits are being received. It is estimated that two thirds of the checks issued in Pendleton pass through this bank. It is one of the strongest private banks in the northwest and carries deposits amounting to almost \$1,500,000.

Owing to the enormous wheat crop of Umatilla county the Pendleton Savings bank paid out over a third of a million dollars to farmers in 30 days to harvest the crop. When the eastern banks quit sending money west and the big exporting companies quit buying wheat, the savings bank observed the holiday season, to protect depositors, and was closed for several days, until wheat could be marketed and until the large sums due it from eastern banks could be received. The bank is perfectly solvent and its stockholders are a number of the solid business men in eastern Oregon.

J. N. Teal, R. T. Cox, Mrs. Clementine Lewis and the E. P. Thompson estate are among the largest stockholders in the bank.

Up to almost the closing hour this afternoon the bank had received over \$100,000. The people have shown complete faith in the bank. It will be open from now on.

STEVE ADAMS MUST UNDERGO THIRD TRIAL

Jury Takes Five Ballots in 21 Hours and Is Then Discharged—Eight for Acquittal.

Rathdrum, Ida., Nov. 25.—The jury in the case of Steve Adams, charged with the murder of Fred Tyler, was discharged at 1:45 last evening by reason of apparently hopeless disagreement. It had gone out at 3:30 Saturday night. There was no variation in the five ballots taken. All stood eight for acquittal, four for conviction of murder in the first degree.

Darrow made a motion for Adams' release on bail, which will be heard later. Both Darrow and Hawley are hurrying toward Boise, where the Pettibone case, set for today, was this morning called, but continued to await the arrival of chief counsel tomorrow.

SPECIAL OFFICER TURNS HIGHWAYMAN

San Francisco, Nov. 25.—John O. Webster, a special officer patrolling Buena Vista Park, was arrested Sunday and subsequently confessed to the robbery of John Jackson, a capitalist.

Jackson was asked by a woman one night about a week ago to escort her through the park to her car, as she had been accosted several times. Jackson started to do so when a man stepped from the shrubbery and held him up, robbing him of \$20.

Last Saturday Jackson saw the same man in the uniform of a special police officer and notified police headquarters. Webster was arrested and made counter serious charges against Jackson, but which the captain disapproved, whereupon Webster confessed.

ATTORNEYS WRANGLE IN POWERS TRIAL

PETTIBONE CASE CONTINUED A DAY

ALLEGED DESPOILER PROVED BENEFACTOR

Outcome of Suit of L. F. Boothe vs. Summit Coal Mining Company and Its President.

Ellensburg, Wash., Nov. 25.—Judge Kauffman of the superior court has decided the long-drawn-out and stubbornly contested suit of L. F. Boothe vs. the Summit Coal Mining company, and R. J. Linden, its president.

Boothe charged that Linden was mismanaging the affairs of the corporation; that he had fraudulently converted several thousand dollars of corporate funds to his own use, and had fraudulently taken extravagant salary without rendering service therefor. The court went into and exhaustively into all the history and affairs of the corporation and found that Linden had come out unscathed through the ordeal; that he had been compelled to advance from his own funds many thousands of dollars to finance the corporation; that he had safely carried it through the troublous period, placing it on a solid and solvent basis, with all debts paid and clearing good profits; that his conduct was due largely to Linden's wise and just management; that he had not misappropriated a dollar of the corporation funds; and that his conduct toward the plaintiff had been not only just, but in some respects generous and gracious. He ordered the case dismissed and taxed the costs to the plaintiff.

Mr. Linden is a well-known business man and capitalist of Portland, and Boothe, the disgruntled stockholder, is an ex-resident of Spokane. The plaintiff was represented by Sanderson Reed of Portland and Kerr & McCord of Seattle. The company was represented by David Goodsell of Portland and the firm of Ballinger, Ronald, Battle & Tennant of Seattle. The mines of the company are situated at Cle Elum, in Kittitas county, Washington. The head office of the company is in Portland.

COURT KILLS PROFIT ON SUNDAY BOOZE

Dispensers of Sabbath Tanglefoot Show Guilt by Forfeiting Bail.

Three arrests were made yesterday for violations of the Sunday closing law. C. E. White, proprietor of a resort at 301 First street, was taken into custody last night for serving liquor from 10 o'clock to midnight.

The officers did not secure evidence of the sale of the "booze," but White tacitly admitted his guilt this morning by forfeiting \$25 bail in police court.

Captain Bruin and Detective White arrested Oscar and Edward Walz, bartenders employed in Louis Spranger's room, Sixth and Couch streets, for selling liquor on the Sabbath. There are several pool tables in the place, and instead of dispensing of drinks, as provided by the police regulations, it is alleged that the two men were dispensing north end "tanglefoot." The defendants are out on bail, and the case will be heard next Wednesday.

HEAVY RAIN CAUSES DAMAGE TO STREETS

Downpour of Saturday and Sunday Floods Court With Complaints.

Several reports of damage to county roads by the heavy rain of Saturday and Sunday were received by the county commissioners this morning. One familiar complaint was the reported misbehavior of the water which drains down Hawthorne avenue. Near the intersection of that avenue with Pettyman avenue the street curves and narrows to 40 feet, and here the water is said to have crossed the road and flooded the basement of the Melcomb residence.

Another report told of the sinking of the south fill on the Brodie road, which became water soaked and settled, the macadam breaking with it. The commissioners are having an examination made of places where damage is reported.

FOREIGN NOBILITY VISITS PORTLAND

RIVER FRONT DOCKS ARE MAN TRAPS BY NIGHT

Two Members of the Crew of the Johan Poulsen Are Severely Injured While Attempting to Regain Their Vessel After Dark.

C. F. Norton, first assistant engineer of the steam schooner Johan Poulsen, lies unconscious at St. Vincent's hospital, and Edward Belcher, cook and steward on the same craft, suffers from a sprained back, as a result of having fallen from a narrow gangplank leading to the vessel at the foot of Pine street. Belcher fell from the walk upon the slanting slip below at 10 o'clock Saturday night and Norton followed in his footsteps three hours later. Both were perfectly sober and the accidents are blamed to the wretched lighting and condition of the wharves along the waterfront.

The Johan Poulsen arrived Saturday morning from San Francisco and had been at the wharf all day discharging its cargo in barrels. In the evening the officers and crew went up town, as is customary. Steward Belcher returned alone to the boat about 10 o'clock and forgetting the trap holes that perforate nearly all of Portland's docks, he walked into one of them.

Dazed by His Fall.
The drop of about seven feet dazed him for a few moments, but he was soon able to cry out for help. A watchman from a river steamer ahead of the Johan Poulsen heard him and rendered assistance. Belcher would have slipped into the river but for the presence of the river steamer, which formed a sort of a retaining wall against the dock.

Medico Haggles Over Pay.
The watchman on the river steamer brought a lantern and the second victim was taken aboard the steamer. Hutchinson hurried to the police station for medical assistance and an ambulance but he was told by a man pointed out to him as the city physician, so he declares, that the fee and expenses

would have to be guaranteed first before anything could be done for the man. With this information he returned to the vessel and after considerable delay succeeded finally in having his friend and companion removed to the St. Vincent's hospital. Engineer Hutchinson is of the opinion that the attitude of the city physician or his deputy—he is not certain as to the identity—was outrageous since the man was expected to be fatally injured.

The accident goes to prove the necessity for lights along the waterfront. The Pine street dock is in no worse condition than the ordinary wharf here and it is said that only good luck can be attributed to the fact that more accidents of similar character do not occur. Harbormaster Speier says he has recommended repeatedly that an ordinance compelling the installation of lights on the dock be passed, but so far without success. He hopes, however, that something will be done along that line before long.
