

CONVICTS ROB FRIENDS

George Montgomery's Hotel in San Francisco Attacked by Masked Men—Owner Is Head of Prison Reform League.

San Francisco, Nov. 25.—Masked highwaymen a few minutes after midnight this morning entered the Brooklyn hotel, 363 First street, owned by Charles Montgomery, president of the Prison Reform league, and with a pistol held up Montgomery's son, George Montgomery, and Daniel Devaney, the night clerk, bound their hands and robbed their cash drawer.

Young Montgomery and Devaney were sitting behind the counter and were working over the books. The first intimation they had that anything was wrong was when they were startled by a command to throw up their hands. Glancing up quickly and seeing two men with revolvers, they complied.

The larger of the two men directed the smaller one, who was armed with a revolver, to open the cash drawer. The man with the revolver opened the cash drawer, but as neither Montgomery nor Montgomery knew the combination of the safe it was left untouched.

After removing the contents of the cash drawer, amounting to but \$120, the footpads compelled their victims to stand with their faces to the wall and then ran away.

Charles Montgomery has been notable for his kindness to ex-convicts. About eight years ago his hotel in Bush street was entered by masked men who kidnapped Montgomery and demanded ransom for his release.

AGENT CAN CROWD LAND SALE THROUGH

Olympia, Nov. 25.—The authority of a real estate agent to bind a property owner to a contract to sell land is upheld by the supreme court in reversing the superior court of King county in the case of George B. Littlefield, appellant, vs. Thomas Dawson and wife, respondents. A \$17,000 real estate deal on the Rainier boulevard, Seattle, must be carried out on the strength of the decision. The supreme court holds that the trial judge had misconstrued a former decision in which the facts were different, and that in this case the agent had full authority to bind his principal to sell the land under the terms agreed, the real estate agent not being limited merely to finding a purchaser.

A New Source of Heat.

Virginia City, Nev., Nov. 25.—Some engineers of Virginia City, reflecting on the severity of the winter in that rigorous climate, have hit upon an odd idea for mitigating the temperature and warming the buildings of that town. One of them has undertaken to struggle with the difficulty by utilizing the superfluous heat of the adjacent mines, which he proposes to tap with iron tubes, and so ventilate the mines while heating the houses.

SMALL COLLAPSES

BPaby Meets Death in Avalanche That Buries House Near Linnton.

Buried in the dead of night under an avalanche of stone which converted his modest little dwelling into an indescribable mass of ruins and crushed out the life of his five-months-old daughter, was the terrible experience of W. D. Booth, an employe of the Clark & Wilson Lumber company and his family at Linnton early yesterday morning.

The only cause for the disaster from the accident is regarded as a miracle in view of the circumstances. Booth and his eldest daughter, Cecil, 12 years of age, escaped without injury, but Mrs. Booth sustained a severe injury to her right leg. Coroner Finley made an investigation of the catastrophe, but has decided that an inquest will not be necessary.

Booth's demolished residence, in which the infant was killed and three others narrowly escaped death, was constructed by the millman last summer and abutted the outer wall of the dust flue of the abandoned Portland Smelting and Refining company's works. When the plant ceased operations the flue, which is about 200 feet in length, 10 feet high and three feet in thickness, was not torn down, owing to the desire of property owners to use it as a retaining wall for residence sites on the elevation overlooking the hamlet.

Saturday Louis, Shiek, who is building a home on the bluff just back of the destroyed Booth home, noticed several fissures in the old dust flue and decided to investigate Sunday to ascertain if the masonry was safe.

The Booth family retired early Saturday night without a thought of impending danger. At 2 a. m. with an artillery-like crash, a section of the ponderous wall came tumbling down. The mass of rock, cement and earth fell on the Booth house and demolished it like a house of cards.

The bed occupied by Booth and his wife was forced through one of the walls of the dwelling and the couple covered with the debris. Quickly ascertaining that his wife was not injured, Booth started to search for his children. The baby was found under several large pieces of stone and an examination showed that she had been instantly killed.

The other girl was alive but so buried by a section of the wall that it was necessary for the distracted father to secure assistance to extricate her.

It is thought that the recent heavy rains so flooded the old dust flue that the weight of water and wet earth was too great a strain for the masonry and the collapse followed.

DIRECT PRIMARY ACT NULLIFIED BY JOKER

Use of An Antonym, Just One Little Word, Kills Very Important Washington Statute.

Olympia Wash., Nov. 25.—The "Joker" has at last been discovered in the direct primary law enacted by the last legislature. It is in section 30, relating to the filing of sworn itemized statements of expenses by candidates for nomination at primary elections, and reads as follows:

"Sec. 30. Every candidate for nomination under the terms of this act, or any amendment thereto, shall, not less than 10 days after the day of holding the election, file a sworn statement in writing, duly sworn to as to its correctness, etc., providing a penalty of from \$25 to \$500 fine and imprisonment in the county jail of from 10 days to 30 days, for violation of the requirements of section 30."

Under section 30, as plainly worded, it seems there is no way of compelling any candidate for nomination under the primary law, to file any expense account at all. He is plainly prohibited from doing so within 10 days after the primary election, and the law makes no requirement for him to do so at any later date.

Lawyers at the state capital agree that the statute admits of but one construction, and that is to follow the plain reading of it. There can be no question, of course, that what was intended was to have these sworn expense accounts filed not less than 10 days after the primary election, instead of not "less" than 10 days thereafter.

It happened that in the course of its examination the bill passed under an uncommonly close official scrutiny in addition to that to which it was included in the universal interest of the measure. Hence it seems almost inconceivable that the bill could have been enacted with its most vital part directly contrary to the expressed purpose for which it was originally proposed.

SPEED RECORD MADE BY LOGGING COMPANY

Astoria, Or., Nov. 24.—The C. C. Masten Logging company at St. Helens has seven miles of its road completed and is putting in about 80,000 feet every day with one 37-ton shay and one yarder. On Saturday, October 19, Manager Masten received an order from the Eastern & Western Lumber company of Portland for some special length sticks, which was filled with record dispatch.

The logs were bucked up on Saturday, taken to the water Sunday morning and towed to Portland the same day. On Monday they were manufactured into timbers and were en route to Astoria by steamer at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon. Four of the logs were 60 feet long, and four of them were 70 feet in length, and were manufactured into timbers 16x16 and 20x20. Two sticks were included in the order each of which was over 100 feet in length.

FIGHT BEGINS IN MICROBE WARD

New Health Ordinance Provides Drastic Measures to Prevent Disease.

Portland's new health ordinance will be sent to the council Wednesday afternoon for passage, after having been in course of preparation for several months. The ordinance is considered one of the best in the country and represents the best features of similar ordinances from the larger cities throughout the United States.

One of the chief provisions provides for the inspection of milk on sale in the groceries and bakeries. Heretofore Mrs. Sarah Evans, market inspector, has been unable to force proprietors of grocery stores selling milk to give the name of their dairymen.

As there was no way to get the information the authorities could not prosecute. The new ordinance provides that all dealers of milk, cream or other dairy foods shall keep the names and addresses of the persons from whom such food is purchased. The books shall be kept at the disposal of the market inspector and health officers at all times.

Check on Tamale Venders.
Another difficulty which heretofore presented itself to the health authorities was in regard to the manufacture of hot tamales and vendors' articles of sale. Complaints against these people regarding their places of manufacture were futile because they constantly shifted from place to place upon learning that the health department was after them.

According to the new ordinance these people will be required to have their places inspected before they are granted a license.

This feature will eliminate any more cases similar to the one involving "Peanut Joe" Murray, who manufactured tamales and candy in a filthy hole on Fourth street. Murray was a sufferer from pulmonary tuberculosis and his case was desperate. He died a month after giving up his vocation.

The ordinance is replete with provisions regarding the sale of products in the open market. All smoked fish, cheese, cooked meats, figs, dates, dried fruits, olives, sauerkraut and all other prepared foods shall be covered by the ordinance. It shall be unlawful to keep meat, game, fish, vegetables, fruit or other prepared foodstuffs in open receptacles less than two feet above the floor.

Provides for Slaughter-Houses.
Slaughter-houses and other places where fowls are killed and prepared for sale shall be constructed with cement flooring with properly trapped sewer connections, and these are to be connected with sewers or cesspools.

In regard to hotels, restaurants, boarding-houses or other places where food is sold or served in the cooked or raw state, all persons employed in or about such places shall keep themselves and their clothing clean, sanitary and in a healthful condition. No person suffering from tuberculosis or any other communicable disease shall be employed in, around or about such places in any manner where they will come in contact with the food served, cooked or otherwise.

The ordinance is expected to pass the council with the provision that it go into effect within 30 days after its passage. There is no doubt as to the passage of the ordinance, which has been in the banking holidays which are still in force. The council will probably withhold action until the city attorneys advise as to a proper course of action.

Mr. Sanders has spent the past few months here thoroughly familiarizing himself with conditions.

As to whether the Clear lake dam would be started next year, Mr. Sanders stated that he could not say at this time, but as to the plans as a whole, he would give satisfaction to the people in both the upper and lower projects.

It will probably be several weeks before the decision of the board of engineers is made public.

SMELTER FOR RICH COPPER PROPERTIES

UNKNOWN MAN FOULY MURDERED

Boy Finds Mutilated Body in Bush Near Redding, California.

Redding, Cal., Nov. 25.—As fiendish a murder as ever committed in Shasta county was discovered yesterday evening, when Carroll Glaser, a boy hunting in the outskirts of Redding, found the brush the body of a man, who had been beaten upon the head with a club until his skull was crushed, and then a handkerchief had been twisted about his neck with a stick in the manner of a garrote. The body had been left by the campfire built on the spot and the hair on the head of the murdered man was burned from the scalp. Young Glaser ran to town, half a mile, and found a policeman. The body was found in a secluded nook 300 yards from the railroad and a mile north of the depot.

The coroner could find nothing about the person that would lead to identification. The man was dressed in a new suit of clothes. He was about 45 years old, slightly bald, and wore a heavy brown mustache. The hands are not calloused, indicating that he was not a workman.

Hawaiian Girls Happy.

ACCUSED OF WRITING OBSCENE LETTERS

G. D. Salvane of Prineville Arrested on State Charge But May Be Tried by Uncle Sam.

Prineville, Or., Nov. 25.—G. D. Salvane, better known as Bert Salvane, of this place, is held by the authorities on a charge of writing obscene matter and sending it through the mails. Salvane was arrested on complaint of young girls who had received letters.

Some of the letters were signed with a fictitious name, prefixing Mrs. and using initials, but always giving the number of the postoffice box for answer.

The arrest was made on a state charge, the penalty for which is \$1,500 and a term in the state penitentiary, either or both, at the discretion of the court.

The postoffice department has been notified, and it is probable the defendant will arise on a federal charge first, as the offense is an even greater one in the eyes of the federal authorities, the penalty being not more than \$5,000 fine and imprisonment for not more than five years, either or both, at the discretion of the court. The postoffice department will take the case up at once. Several of the letters are in the hands of the prosecuting attorney here and will be used as evidence in the coming prosecution.
