

SENATORS TALKING POLITICS

Bourne Ardent Promoter of Third Term Boom and Declares Oregon Is for Roosevelt, While Fulton Boosts for Taft.

Each Solon Swears That the State Will Go the Way He Predicts and People in East Are Puzzled to Pick the Truth.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, D. C., Nov. 27.—Interviews which have been given out by the two United States senators from Oregon offer opinions on Republican sentiment in that state which are somewhat at variance. Senator Bourne ever since his term began last March has been industriously pushing the third term campaign, and has frequently asserted that the people of Oregon demand that the president stand for another election. He has done this under the "second elective term" propaganda which he has carried on in talks with newspapers and is now engaged in forwarding through the offering of a \$1,000 prize to the one who writes the best article showing why the president should be elected again.

Senator Fulton, who reached Washington a few days ago, was seen by several newspaper men here and declared that the Oregon people have accepted the president at his own word and rest assured the chief executive will abide by his pledge made on the night of his election in November, 1904. Senator Fulton said that, believing that that was the president's sincere intention then and now, the people of Oregon are now for the nomination of Secretary Taft, and that the Republican delegation to the 1908 national convention doubtless would be composed of Taft supporters.

Easterners Puzzled. These two views as to the status of Republican sentiment in Oregon have been handed out by the two senators as the authoritative statement of the facts, and of course have somewhat puzzled eastern politicians who are compelled to accept or reject them according to the attributes to one or the other of the senators exact knowledge of the situation in that state.

It is noticeable that this difference of opinion between members of the house and senate who are returning to Washington is almost universal. Scarcely any delegation from any state agrees as to the status of sentiment at home, and views are expressed every day on both sides of the third term question.

Perhaps the only exception to this rule was found in Idaho, as Senator Heyburn first came to Washington and stated that Idahoans according to the night statement of the president at full value and expect him to refuse to be a candidate. Then Senator Borah arrived and said practically the same thing. Senator Borah thought the state was for Taft, and Senator Heyburn that an unconstructed delegation would be sent next year from Idaho.

Senator Piles of Washington, too, was doubtful that the president would run again. Senator Flint of California opined that his state is for Taft, if the president did not again allow his name to go before the convention, otherwise California would be for Roosevelt again.

In Wyoming Senator Warren insisted that sentiment is for the president, and Senator Clarke that Senator Knox was the favorite.

Third Termers Get Pie. This difference, then, seems to characterize the views of practically every state from which the full delegation of senators has returned to Washington. It is possible that the difference of opinion may find their echoes in the coming state conventions and efforts be made by the differing senators to control the events at home according to their recent expressions. This would develop some sharp conflicts and put to the actual test the state of sentiment throughout the country.

Third termers have found some comfort in the happenings of the past few months in Tennessee, where the administration divested the Brownlow faction of the Republicans of all patronage power and gave it to the opposition. The significance of this political move, credited largely to First Assistant Postmaster-General Frank Hitchcock as the southern political worker, is that the deposed Brownlow faction had followed his leader, Congressman Brownlow, into the Taft camp and declared enthusiastically for his nomination; whereas the Evans-Sanders people had come out openly for the convention and the president, and apparently had been rewarded for their

No, this is not the Thanksgiving menu of the Portland hotel. It is the bill of fare for the federal prisoners at the Hotel Stevens, otherwise known as the county jail. Sheriff Stevens is determined that no reproaches shall be thrown upon his institution upon the national turkey day.

There are about 15 of the United States prisoners, who will enjoy the above menu. The county prisoners, who are fed by contract, will not have the fancy things ordered by the sheriff, but they will be well provided for. Chief Ebeling announces that they will have turkey with appropriate trimmings, with appetizing soup and vegetables, and fruit for dessert.

Still another bill of fare will rule at Kelly's Butte, where the sound of the hammer on the rock will be dispensed with, and the prisoners will have plenty of time to do things to their liking. Chelekins will take the place of the turkey there.

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NO STRINGS ON BRYAN

If Nominated Will Make Race Without National Committee or Funds, Political Toys and Other Significance.

Washington, Nov. 27.—William J. Bryan concluded his speech at the banquet given in his honor last night by District of Columbia Democrats at 2:15 this morning. He closed with the following words: "I do not know who will be the Democratic nominee for the presidency but if I am I prefer to make the race without a national committee or funds and on straight principles that appeal to the conscience of the voter."

Mr. Bryan's subject was "The Point of View," and his speech consisted of illustrations of the difference in the point of view from which questions arise examined. Before taking up the serious presentation of this subject, he referred to some of the remarks made by preceding speakers, and apropos of Mr. Hagan's suggestion that Tammany "Tigers" would make better playthings for children than Teddy bears, he said that party emblems, as well as political toys had their places, and he spoke a word in defense of the Democratic donkey.

"The donkey is really a better emblem than the elephant for a party. This was impressed upon my mind when I visited other countries. I found that the donkey is a resident of every country, and that everywhere he is serving the people, and that, too, the common people. He is not an aristocrat. The question of honor must be given to the faithful donkey."

"As the Democratic party is becoming a universal party and is everywhere justifying its claims to the confidence of the people by the service it is rendering them, it is entirely appropriate that it should prefer the donkey to the elephant for an emblem."

Mr. Bryan announced the following as his plans: Tariff reform, railroad regulation, income tax, restraint of government by injunction, election of senators by direct vote of the people, arbitration of labor disputes, enforcement of trust laws, anti-ship subsidy, anti-imperialism and anti-centralization. He failed to elaborate upon a remedy for financial evils.
