

PETTBONE'S TRIAL BEGUN

Examination of Talesmen in Progress—Defense Uses Peremptory on Ninth Man—Two Found Who Read No Papers.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Boise, Ida., Nov. 27.—The examination of talesmen in the trial of George A. Pettibone, charged with complicity in the murder of ex-Governor Steuneger, began in the district court here at 10 o'clock this morning. James H. Hawley, chief counsel for the state, arrived last night, but Darrow was not present at the opening of court.

C. C. Cavanaugh, law partner of Senator Borah, was entered as associate counsel for the state. Early in the examination of talesmen it became evident that great difficulty would be experienced in obtaining a jury. Of the first four examined, E. Lamb, George W. Mitchell and F. M. Blair, all farmers, were excused because of scruples against the infliction of capital punishment, and J. S. D. Manville said he had attended the Haywood trial and had formed an unqualified opinion. He was challenged by the state and excused.

The state named William H. Gebber for cause. He is a farmer. He said he had read very little of the case. The state challenged Henry Conrad, a shoe salesman, who said he congratulated Haywood on his acquittal and had an opinion as to Pettibone. The defense resisted, but the court allowed the challenge.

Alex. Hofflinger, an inmate of the state soldiers' home, was accepted for cause by the state. He is a native of France and a civil war veteran. He had read no newspaper reports of the case and had no opinion.

Jesse Sallor was challenged by the state for bias, and the defense consented. Frank J. Garper, who was passed for cause as a juror in the Haywood trial, was peremptorily challenged by the defense. His objections to his examination in this case having been overruled by the court and the state having passed him for cause.

MINER IS KILLED AT MOMENT OF RESCUE

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FEEL THE RANGER IN TOTAL DARKNESS

Switchman's Hunch Brings Train to Standstill on Chasm's Brink.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 27.—Edward Trow, a Northern Pacific switchman, believes the lives of himself and a Northern Pacific train crew were saved last night by some occult influence which gave him a premonition of the danger. He was on the front end of a locomotive speeding out through the Northern Pacific yards to South Tacoma. When near Bailey street he suddenly felt a cold chill and a great apprehension for his life. Believing that he was in danger, he signaled engineer Syphers to stop. The locomotive came to a halt and Trow walked ahead a few yards and found 20 feet of track had been washed away by a freshet due to the heavy rain that had been falling all the afternoon. The spot where the track was gone was where the railroad crossed a swale and the engine would have plunged 12 feet to the bottom.

The Seattle-Portland train would have passed over the same stretch of track a few minutes later, and the discovery of the break probably also saved that train from being wrecked with a certain large loss of life.

SUIT FILED IN LUMBER CASES

Promised Action Taken by Attorney for Companies of Three States.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, Nov. 27.—Forty-one lumber companies of Oregon, Washington and Idaho filed complaint today with the interstate commerce commission through H. M. Stephens, an attorney of Spokane, protesting against the advance of rates from points in eastern Oregon, Washington and all of Idaho, which should be less than from coast points. As in other lumber cases the claim is made that if the rates were to advance millions of dollars would be lost to lumber companies.

PILOT ROCK LINE MAY BE EXTENDED

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., Nov. 27.—The O. R. & N. company has men engaged in taking a census of farm products, land values etc., of the country between Pilot Rock and Ridge, which is several miles beyond where the railroad from Pendleton to Pilot Rock has been run, and it is generally believed that the company is considering the extension of the line to Central Idaho miles along the farming district up Birch creek.

CALEB POWERS WILL NOT FIGHT VENIRE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Georgetown, Ky., Nov. 27.—The defense sprung a surprise in the Powers trial this morning by withdrawing its motion to set aside the second venire of 124 from Grant county. It also withdrew all the affidavits filed with the motion and offered a motion that all the names in the jury box be drawn before others are placed in it. The defense claimed that there are more Democrats than Republicans on both venires.

IMMENSE ALASKAN TREASURE TO SHIP

Seattle, Nov. 27.—One million two hundred thousand dollars' worth of gold dust is now lying at Summit, on Thompson pass, just back of Valdez, on its way from Fairbanks, Alaska, to Seattle. Several armed guards are watching the gold in its casks day and night. Of this amount \$450,000 is in dust and the rest is in bricks. It is the largest shipment ever sent out over the trail from Fairbanks to Valdez.

MILLS CHARGE ROADS WITH DISCRIMINATION

Washington, Nov. 26.—Forty-five milling companies in Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri today filed charges with the interstate commerce commission, alleging discriminatory rates in the transportation of their product eastward against the Chicago & Alton, Rock Island, Burlington, Great Western, Santa Fe, Wabash, Missouri Pacific, St. Paul and other roads.

CHICAGO CHRONICLE LOST MILLION IN YEAR

Chicago, Nov. 27.—At the Walsh trial today the government sought to show that Walsh's newspaper, the defunct Chronicle, lost \$1,000,000 in 1903 and 1904, but continued to be published. H. H. Barclay, an officer of the Chicago Association of Commerce, testified that he and Walsh bought the Evansville & Richmond railroad for \$500,000, which was borrowed.

FISHERMEN RESCUED FROM WRECKED SHIP

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Nov. 27.—Forty-two men were rescued today from the auxiliary schooner Eliza Rhoades after drifting helplessly for 24 hours and finally lodging on a sand bar off Rockaway. The men started early Tuesday morning on a fishing trip, but lost control of their boat.

Oklahoma Vs. Washburn.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Oklahoma City, Okla., Nov. 27.—Everything is in readiness for the big football game here tomorrow between the eleven of the University of Oklahoma and Washburn college of Topeka, Kansas. The game will be played at the state fair grounds and promises to attract the largest crowd that ever attended a similar contest in this section. The records for the season make Washburn the favorite, but the Oklahoma team is counted upon to put up a splendid fight for the honors.

Big Box Works at Klamath.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Klamath Falls, Or., Nov. 27.—W. O. Huson, of the Long Lake Lumber company, states on his return from a business trip to San Francisco that there will be large box factories established here within the next year or two. His company now ships out two carloads a week and is urged to increase the output. Despite the heavy hauling charges to the railroad a good profit is made. Box material is plentiful here, and conditions ideal for box factories.

The police theory is that Bellows was at that time dead, a victim of cyanide of potassium forced into his mouth while off his guard by the accused student. How this was accomplished the police refuse to say.
