

STEAMER WRECKED

Terrific Explosion of Feed Pipe on Vessel Early This Morning Tears Cabin Into Splinters and Perforates Heavy Flooring.

Watchman Narrowly Escapes Being Scalded to Death—Woodwork About Windows Shattered but Panes Remain Intact.

Explosion of a feed pipe partly wrecked the speedy steamer Charles R. Spencer last night. The entire roof of the after cabin was lifted and its supports scattered about like matches. The starboard side of the cabin was torn into splinters and the cabin floor perforated like a sieve. Not one of the windows was shattered, although the woodwork beneath and above them was torn and ground into kindling.

The explosion occurred about 7 o'clock and could be heard for several blocks. Only one person, Watchman Edward Wilson, was on board and, being in the forward part of the boat at the time, he miraculously escaped injury. Although no lights were burning in the cabin, or a destructive conflagration might have followed. Watchman Wilson can assign no other cause but crystallization of the pipe.

The Spencer was taken off her run between Portland and Hood river, several weeks ago and laid up in winter quarters at the Victoria docks a few blocks north of the east approach of the steel bridge. Steam was generated in the boiler for the purpose of keeping the hull dry during the wet weather, and the engine has been in attendance most of the time. He was not aboard last night, but the steam was kept at the ordinary pressure, so it was understood.

The exploding pipe was located directly under the after cabin and almost in the middle of the deck. The pressure expended its greatest force upwards. Instead of shattering, the window panes around the main deck explosion shattered the heavy floor of the cabin and then raised the roof. The cabin walls on the starboard side were left almost intact, but the woodwork to starboard was ground to pieces. An explanation of the remarkable escape of the cabin window panes can only be found in the supposition that they offered a harder resistance than the heavy woodwork.

The explosion was followed by a deafening roar of escaping steam, and for several minutes the watchman on the steamer Telephone, moored across from the Spencer, thought the whole boiler had blown up. He feared Watchman Wilson had been blown to the sky, but was pleasantly surprised to see him emerge from the darkness after the roar of the escaping steam had died down.

The Spencer is owned by Captain E. W. Spencer and was booked for a thorough overhauling before being placed in commission next season. In view of this fact the accident will not prove so expensive, although the damage to the cabin house will probably amount to \$1,000.

An idea of the force of the explosion might be gained from the fact that two of the life boats resting on the cabin roof were thrown high in the air and landed several feet forward of their former position.

Oregon undoubtedly has the fastest backfield in the northwest. With the exception of Freshman Taylor, the variety's right half, the backs are experienced men, having played through two seasons together.

Other games might draw good crowds but it remains for this popular contest to bring society and football lovers out in full force. Along the driveway automobiles and carriages are numerous and their fair occupants are cheering with the men in cheering favorites.

Oregon in Grandstand. Oregon supporters reserved a large portion of the grandstand and yellow chrysanthemums adorn the buttonholes of the men and the bodies or belts of the pretty co-eds. This portion of the grandstand is a veritable mass of yellow, the color of the University of Oregon.

At rooting the Oregonians have it over the clubmen. The sharp, ear-splitting yells of the co-eds shrill lots of practice, the concert of voices being unusually plain.

Whether Oregon or Multnomah wins this afternoon is the final count, the game will go down into history as the greatest struggle that has ever taken place on the field if not in the entire northwest.

STUDENT IS ACCUSER

Police Declare Admissions Made by Harry Kleinschmidt Would Convict Him of Bellows Murder Without Other Evidence.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 28.—According to information given out today at the district attorney's office, Harry Kleinschmidt, charged with the murder of Frank Bellows, is his own accuser. In his examination by Chief of Police Vollmer he made such admissions and contradictory statements that the authorities intimate they could secure conviction for the murder if they had not a single corroborated piece of evidence. So damaging are these alleged admissions of the accused student that they practically amount to a confession.

Kleinschmidt was subjected to several weeks surveillance before the police decided to take him into custody. During this time the authorities knew every move he made and when he was first taken to the town hall he was "sweated" as to his actions for the past three months.

The accused was very wary at the start, but so the prosecution claims, soon contradicted himself on several important points. Before the young man had recovered from his confusion, it is said he had himself forged the most damaging links in the chain of evidence the police were putting together.

Out of his own mouth, according to the authorities, the names of people whose identity was unknown came to the police, and who afterwards furnished the most damaging of the corroborative testimony.

Kleinschmidt, in his conversation and shifting, had unfortunately relied upon being permitted to be allowed his freedom. He was, therefore, painfully surprised to be told that he must consider himself a prisoner, and was denied all access to friends and family.

To guard against the establishment of communication between him and friends on the outside who might assist him in his emergency the police department hired a private office in the town hall and kept him under guard day and night.

Kleinschmidt told the police at first that the appointment with Bellows was made at the request of the latter. He persisted in this statement until he learned that there were two people who would testify that they heard the telephone call at the San Marco apartment house, where Bellows lived, and had taken special messages to Bellows, fixing this appointment while the latter was in his study.

Kleinschmidt followed this with the flat declaration that he had not held correspondence with Miss Kerfoot after the severing of their engagement. He said at the time apparently believed that the young woman, rather than confess to any shameful part played in her victim's death, would substantiate this statement. But the police, already aware that Miss Kerfoot would tell all she knew, especially the incidents connected with the alleged assault on her in the basement of the Kleinschmidt home, indicated to the accused that he would be confronted with this veritable evidence. It was then said by the police, that the trap closed so hard that they were confident of convictions that they are confident will convict him of the killing of Bellows.

decision, the Portland chamber of commerce transportation committee recently brought suit before the Oregon railway commission for a lowering of distributive rates from Portland to the interior.

Should the interstate commerce commission decide to enforce a lowering of the distance tariffs from Chicago to the Pacific seaboard, it is believed there will be a corresponding drop in water-carrying rates from Atlantic and gulf ports. This, with a reduction of distributive rates from Portland to the Snake river country, will further benefit interior merchants and consumers, while at the same time preserving Portland's commercial supremacy in the northwest.
