

WOMEN MAY WIN OVER

Japanese Editor Thinks Americans Do Not Understand Gentle Sex of His Country—Would Assimilate Races.

San Francisco, Nov. 30.—To give expression to his desire for an entente cordiale between Japan and the Pacific coast, his Imperial Majesty Mutsuhito has decorated President David Starr Jordan of Stanford university, Dr. Ernest Adolphus Sturge, Dr. Herbert R. Johnson and David Buey with the order of the Rising Sun.
Announcement of the conferring of the decorations was made today by Kwanichi Yukawa, editor of the Japanese Daily New World, and one of the leading figures in the Japanese-American association.
According to Yukawa, a new propaganda having for its object the restoration of better feeling between Americans and Japanese is engaging wide-spread attention among his compatriots on the Pacific coast, and the Tokyo cablegrams telling of the bestowal of the decorations are tantamount to imperial sanction of the movement.
"The new propaganda has many distinctive features that have formerly not been noticeable among movements of this kind," said Yukawa today. "The Japanese engaged in it are working for a complete eradication of racial prejudice, and they are agitating among other things intermarriage between Americans and Japanese."
Invite Americans.
"These Japanese believe for one thing that the charm of their women is not understood by the average American. They would like to see more Americans go to Japan every year and bring back unprejudiced reports of their women and their attractiveness as wives. The average American appears to judge all Japanese women by the standards accepted for the Geisha and Teahou girls. This is an error. Japanese would have just as much warrant to judge all American women by the standards accepted for the Geisha and Teahou girls. The Japanese here regard Japanese-American marriages as one of the surest means of bringing about enduring peace between the two nations."

MISSISSIPPI BROKE; EMPLOYEES UNPAID

Jackson, Miss., Nov. 30.—Mississippi is stone broke and there is no immediate relief in sight, for incoming collections will hardly be sufficient to meet current expenses. The treasury is empty and many employees have not been paid for two months, being forced to pawn their warrants to get living expenses. No improvement is expected before the legislative meets.

UNCLE JOE HAS NO OPPOSITION

Caucus Names Cannon for Speaker—Other House Officials.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 30.—It took the Republican members of the house just one hour tonight to organize in caucus, reelect Joseph G. Cannon of Illinois speaker, refuse admittance to their party organization to Peter A. Porter of New York, who defeated Representative Wadsworth and to elect the house officials for the sixtieth congress.
Representative Hepburn of Iowa, was reelected chairman and Representative Loudenslager, of New Jersey, reelected secretary of the caucus. Representative Boutelle nominated Cannon for speaker. The nomination was seconded and Cannon was chosen without opposition.
The speaker, forewarned of his honor, was awaiting a committee sent to escort him to the floor of the house, and there delivered himself of a short address on politics in general and the Republican party in particular.
The house officers were then chosen in a body. They are: Alex. McDowell of Pennsylvania, clerk; Henry Carson of Wisconsin, sergeant-at-arms; Frank Lyons of New York, doorkeeper; Rev. Henry N. Couden of Michigan, chaplain, and S. A. Laughum of Minnesota, postmaster. With exception of the latter, all of the officers were in the fifty-ninth congress.

The caucus adopted a resolution declaring their faith in the rules of the fifty-ninth congress and endorsing their continued use in the present congress.
"The Democratic caucus organized by electing Judge Clayton of Alabama as its chairman and William Ryan of Buffalo as secretary. John Sharp Williams was the unanimous caucus nominee for speaker, De Armond having withdrawn from the contest.
Charles A. Edwards of Texas was re-nominated for clerk, which position means that he again becomes the secretary of the minority. J. T. Ellington of North Carolina was nominated for the position of sergeant-at-arms; H. E. Graper of Tennessee, doorkeeper, and R. L. Douglas of South Carolina, postmaster. Paul Porter of Mississippi was selected as the minority pair clerk. Fenton Knight of Georgia, J. K. Simpson of Virginia, special messengers, and Robert E. Cowart of Texas, special employee of the minority side of the chamber.
The adjournment of the caucus prevented Representative Jones of Virginia from offering his resolution directing the minority leader to refuse to name the minority members of the house committees, and leaving the filling of the committees entirely with the speaker of the house.
"How about Jones' resolution?" Williams was asked, when the caucus suddenly disbanded.
"Why, we adjourned before it could be offered."
Then Mr. Williams laughed heartily. He seemed to think the matter a great joke. Many of the Democrats were angry at the sudden termination of the caucus, for there are many who believe the power of appointing the Democrats to committee places should not remain in the minority leader, who is extremely close to Speaker Cannon.

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ROBS AND THEN SHOOT VICTIM

Lyell Recognizes Highwayman Who Held Him Up Near Gresham.

Sheriff Stevens was notified last night that a holdup man shot and robbed John Lyell near the gravel pit, about one mile from Gresham, about 7:30 o'clock. Lyell recognized the man as Ole Olsen, a Swede, and the officers of several counties were notified to be on the lookout for him.
From the meagre account received, it appears that Lyell resisted the robber, who then shot him in the leg. The highwayman obtained \$37 in gold, silver and clearing house certificates and a silver watch. Lyell gave a good description of his assailant and Deputy Sheriff Emery of Gresham took up the trail as soon as notified.

SALOONS MAY GO FROM WASHINGTON

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ACTRESS STOPS PANIC WITH SONG

Mary Garden's Presence of Mind Prevents Stampede of Audience.

New York, Nov. 30.—Mary Garden, playing "Thais" to a big matinee audience at the Manhattan opera-house, did not burn her house in the second scene in the last act as has been her wont. For just as she touched the match to the dwelling there came an explosion as though the gang of Black Handers and dynamiters had similar designs against the place.
The audience started to its feet in fright. Stream in great clouds swirled out upon the stage. For a minute it looked like a panic. But the actress saved the situation. She began to sing an air that does not occur in "Thais" at all, but which answered admirably, as she did it so fervently that the startled audience thought the explosion part of the opera.
When the curtain went down at the end of the song, investigation showed that the steam pipe which furnished the smoke for Miss Garden's little exhibition of incendiaryism had become disconnected with the rubber pipe which belches it out along the side of the "burning" structure.
The unexpected blaze which followed had startled the electrician so badly that he forgot to turn on the red lights which gave the color of fire to the fake conflagration.
Miss Garden admitted afterward that she was frightened. When Mr. Hammerstein complimented her upon her rendition of the exotic aria, she asked him what it was she sung.

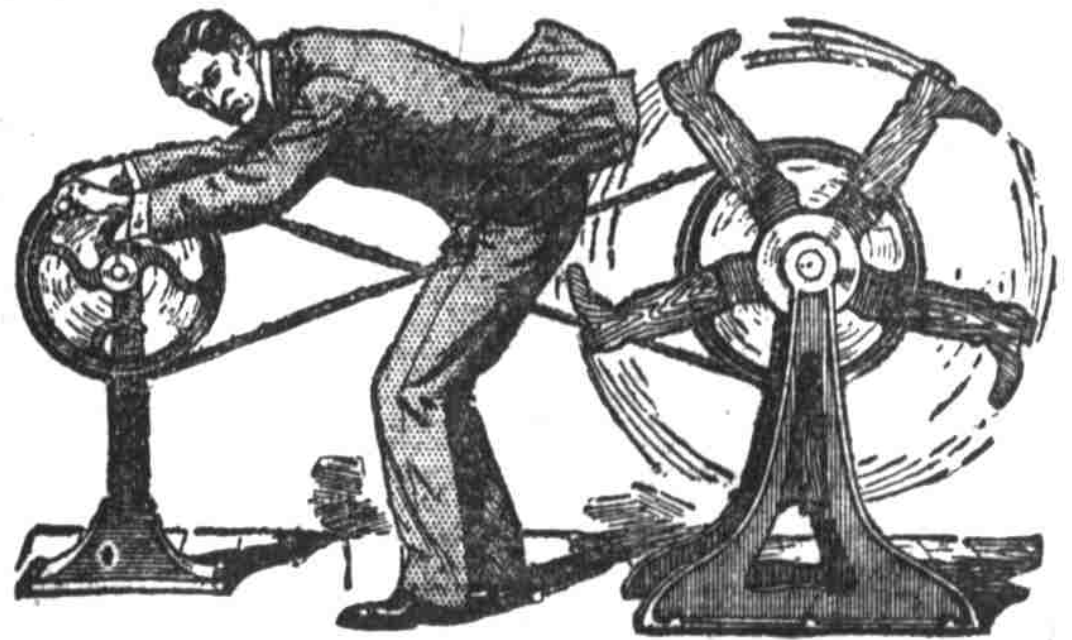
CARLOS FEARS THAT THRONE IS TOTTERING
