

ARABS KILLED BY FRENCHMEN

Allied Tribesmen Assembling to Resist Attack Being Planned.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Lalla Maghania, Algeria, Nov. 30.—Reinforcements are being rushed to the French troops at Adjeroudkia, and a desperate attack will be made early tomorrow on Aghbal, where the Beni Naassen Arabs and their allied tribesmen are concentrating.
The Arabs seem not at all discouraged by two successive defeats, and a severe battle is expected before they are scattered. The French force hastened to crush the uprising before a holy war spreads all along the border. The French casualties have not been heavy, but the Arabs are estimated to have lost in the various engagements within the past few days nearly 2,000 men.

TRAIN PARTS AND KILLS BRAKEMAN

Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 30.—J. Crawford, a Tacoma-Eastern brakeman, was

run over and instantly killed tonight. The freight on which he was braking parted at the top grade near Bismarck, Crawford was thrown from the train upon the tracks, and the severed section was upon him in an instant. He was of middle age, and leaves a wife. By good fortune the train had reached the top of the grade, otherwise the broken section would have rolled back into the city, probably causing a wreck and large loss of life.

LOOTING OF BANK CAUSES A SUICIDE

New York, Nov. 30.—The looting of the Borough Bank of Brooklyn led to the suicide of George Fruitman, 32 years old, by hanging late this afternoon. Fruitman was a diamond cutter, who had lost his job two days ago. Several thousands dollars, all his savings, were deposited in the Borough bank, and all day Saturday he visited acquaintances and brokers trying to raise enough money on his bank book to pay the interest on a mortgage on his home. Failing to get a single offer, he committed suicide, while his wife and 16-month-old son were visiting relatives. When the woman returned she found his lifeless body hanging in a doorway.

LUCY HAGENOW WILL ANSWER TO COURTS

Chicago, Nov. 30.—The conviction today of "Doctor" Lucy Hagenow, an alleged criminal practitioner and the imposition of a sentence of 20 years for manslaughter marks the beginning of

a police war of extermination against questionable hospitals for women. Assistant State's Attorney Harbison, who prosecuted the woman for the death of Miss Anna Horvitch, was informed that perhaps not less than 5,000 similar crimes are committed annually in Chicago. The refusal of women who survive operations to testify and the inability of officers to procure evidence in cases of death by all such crimes to pass without punishment.

MIMIC AUTO RACE ENTIRELY TOO REAL

New York, Nov. 30.—An accident which has never been duplicated in any theatre or playhouse was averted tonight at the Hippodrome by a little margin of three feet, when one of the great 50-horsepower automobiles used in a mimic race in the show plunged along the 120 feet of stage head-on toward the audience and, with a tremendous crash, ripped up the footlights and hung suspended by its hind wheels. The car skidded just as the brake bit into the axle. The machine sped over the edge of the stage, parts of it striking Louis Van Tine, William Jennings and Rudolph Killian, the musicians. They were not badly injured, it is said, but suffered severe cuts and bruises.

BAKER WAS KILLED BY DOSE OF ARSENIC

Boston, Mass., Nov. 30.—Arsenic killed Walter F. Baker, but who administered the arsenic? Having settled by exhaustive chemical analysis the nature of the drug that caused the death of the young Harvard man in Bogota, New Jersey, a month ago, the police today resumed the criminal investigation, which has been suspended for two weeks, after little or no progress, to await some definite clue. The police of New York and New Jersey also were urged to renew their efforts to find the persons who Baker's relatives are sure sent the young man to his death on the night of October 27.

SAYS WIFE PLAYED POLITICS TOO MUCH
