H. H. Albee has commissioned a local architect to prepare the plans for a nine-room dwelling to be erected on his fruit ranch at Hood River. The house is to be constructed of ordinary rough stone, such as are found scattered over the ground in the vicinity of the Albee ranch. Mr. Albee intends building an ideal country home but will equip it with all the modern conveniences of urban life. It is to be heated by steam, supplied with sanitary plumbing and will be equipped with a water and sewer system, the water to be brought from a neighboring stream by means of a hydraulic ram.

The last consignment of steel for the new O. W. P. bridge to span the Clackamas river between this city and Oregon City has been delivered and work on the structure will begin at once. The main span of this bridge is a 260-foot riveted steel truss, one of the longest riveted trusses in the world. It was built in the plant of the Bowles Steel company, in this city.

The police have been asked to assist in the search for Fred Walker, a 15-year-old boy, who left his home at Forest Grove yesterday afternoon on route for this city on board a freight train. The boy's mother, Mrs. Luella Walker, communicated with police headquarters over the long-distance telephone and requested that he be taken into custody if he can be found.

The Falling estate has had plans prepared for a three-story addition to the old Union block at First and Stark streets. The building at present is three stories high and was put up in 1880 by the late Henry Falling, when the vicinity of Stark and First streets was the retail center of Portland. Upon the completion of the addition an up-to-date elevator service will be installed.

The Oak Grove Improvement association passed resolutions Thursday evening expressing sympathy in common with other east side residents, with the movement to build two high bridges across the Willamette river. Hearty support was pledged the united east side clubs in the movement to carry into effect the construction of the bridges.

A firm of architects and engineers have installed themselves in the tower of the Chamber of Commerce building, the observatory formerly occupied as the private office of Tom Richardson and now occupied by the Chamber of Commerce. The building is an ideal location for an architect's office since there is no possible danger of an adjoining skyscraper cutting off the light.

RICHARDS SHAKES

DUST OF ST. JOHNS

Saloonkeeper, Facing Out-

come of Impending In-

dictments, Locks Door.

Louis Richards, erstwhile St. Johns saloonkeeper, facing sentence of 60 days on the rockpile and a fine of \$100 for the indecent and inhuman treatment of Herman Vos, and evidently fearing the outcome of two more serious charges pending against him, has disappeared.

Yesterday afternoon Richards, who was released on \$300 bonds last Wednesday in order to appeal his case, went to his place of business, locked the doors, slipped the key in his pocket and, without the formality of bidding goodbye to his bondsmen, boarded a car for Portland.

It is believed Richards has gone to Canada. He reached the union depot in Portland yesterday afternoon before he could be apprehended and boarded a Northern Pacific train for Seattle. To his friends in St. Johns he had often mentioned the fact that when he accumulated enough money he intended to make his home in the British possessions, and it is stated he is not likely to stop until he has crossed the line and made himself safe from pursuit.

Two indictments were pending against Richards Wednesday yesterday. He was summoned before District Attorney Manning, and it would have been only a few days before more serious charges than the one upon which he was convicted faced him.

Richards learned of the state's efforts toward bringing the indictments and the fear of what might ensue if he remained longer in the suburb where intense feeling against him was rife, lead him to lock his doors and flee. In his haste he neglected to pay his attorney.

The beauty of stage women is so often a theme for derision and unpleasant comment that a little fact and philosophy regarding them brings with it a tinge of spice.

Strange to say, the really pretty girl does not make up as well as the one in whom nature has left certain deficiencies. A country lassie with the bloom of health upon her cheeks and the fire of energy in her eyes will look commonplace under grease paint when placed alongside of the girl who knows the secrets of the makeup box yet lacks the natural charms she knows so well how to imitate.

In an interview with M. L. Hecker, the well-known stage director, now in charge of "The Land of Nod," he said: "Nature is very jealous of its work; once the pliancy of human charm is reached, or even approached, the artificial effort fails to surpass it."
