M. A. C. MEETS SEATTLE ELEVEN

Old Rivals Line Up on Club Field Tomorrow Afternoon.

Reinforced by "Weary" Chandler, the former great end of the University of Oregon, and Dudley Clarke, this year's All-Northwest fullback from the same college, Multnomah club will put forth its strongest football strength of the year against Seattle tomorrow afternoon. The game will be called promptly at 2 o'clock on Multnomah field and timid spectators may seek the protection of the grandstand without cost if it sprinkles.

Both Clarke and Chandler are members of the club and are in excellent condition to play. Chandler had little knowledge of the signals and style of play of his club team in the Seattle game a week ago, but he has been out every night this week and his playing tomorrow will undoubtedly be a feature of the game.

The Seattleites will arrive in Portland tonight and will take a squint at the sawdust field tomorrow morning. The team which will play here is light and fast and contains some of the best players on the coast. Nearly all of the players are old college stars and they have a splendid record for this year.

"Weary" Coyle, the crack Seattle high school player, will be one of the members of the visiting team and will line up in the backfield.

The officials of the game have been selected with considerable care. Fred Moulton, the Oregon guard, will referee the game and Mr. Harry Chase, assistant coach at Oregon, will be referee.

"Pat" McArthur will officiate as head linesman and Professor H. H. Herdman will be field judge.

JACK DEMPSEY WON BELT ON THIS DAY

Portland Prize Fighter Defeated Reagan for Middle-weight Championship.

Unless recalled to mind, how many Portlanders remember that this is the day, December 13, upon which our late Jack Dempsey won the middleweight championship of the world. Yes, this is the date and evidently Jack cared nothing for the popular superstition connected with the number 13. The great fight took place on Long Island and "Johnny" Reagan was Dempsey's opponent. Reagan was then in his prime and gave the Nonpareil one of the hardest battles of his life. It took Jack 45 rounds to put Reagan out of the going and one hour and nine minutes were consumed in doing the trick.

Besides winning the title of middleweight champion of the world, Dempsey also drew down a \$2,000 purse and a good-sized side bet.

SOUTHERN LEAGUE CLUB OWNERS DISCUSS GAME

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 12.—Pleased with the results of the past season and satisfied with the outlook for the coming year, the club owners of the Southern league are gathering here in anticipation of their annual business meeting tomorrow. Everything points to a harmonious meeting, though it promises to be far from dull. More than the usual amount of business is on the slate for consideration and action.

The sentiment expressed by the magnates already here indicates that the election of officers will be of an almost perfunctory character. President Kavanaugh is slated for reelection. A contest may come over the selection of a vice-president to succeed Lowry Arns. Baugh of Birmingham and Coleman of Memphis are both mentioned for the honor. Some of the disputes and squabbles growing out of games last year will come up before the meeting for final settlement, but no serious difficulty is expressed in clearing everything up so as to give general satisfaction.

FRANK B. COYNE DIES IN MANILA

Frank B. Coyne, formerly a well-known Multnomah club athlete, is dead in Manila, Philippine Islands, where he was employed in the federal service. Coyne was formerly a student at Notre Dame and established an enviable record in eastern athletics. He returned to Portland at the outbreak of the Spanish-American war and enlisted in company H, Second Oregon Volunteers. At the close of the war he remained in the islands and accepted a government position.

Last January the former athlete visited in Portland with his brother, George Coyne, of Woodlawn. News of his death has just been received here from Manila.

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KETCHEL WINS FROM THOMAS

Welterweights Fight Grand Battle Before San Francisco Spectators.

San Francisco, Dec. 13.—There are two men in America who are not afraid to mix things up in the prize ring. Stanley Ketchel, the Butte, Montana, welterweight last night won a 20-round decision from Joe Thomas of San Francisco. In one of the fastest fights ever seen on the coast, from start to finish the two fighters kept at each other, and both were bleeding when they left the ring. Two knockdowns were scored by each man, but Ketchel was awarded the verdict for aggressiveness, harder punching and cleaner hitting.

Seven thousand people saw the fight, which was the third between the two welterweights. Seldom has such fighting been seen in California as these mills between Ketchel and Thomas. On the previous occasion the men went at it hammer and tongs from the very start, and it is not stretching the truth when the assertion is made that the fans were given a better exhibition for their money than any of the so-called championship fights which have taken place here in recent years.

Ketchel and Thomas were in the pink of condition. Thomas entered the ring stronger than in their second fight, because of the additional five pounds allowed him by Ketchel. In the second fight he scaled 150 pounds, and was visibly weakened when he passed through the ropes.
