BISHOP OBJECTS TO CHURCH FAIR

Tells New York Episcopalians They Are Opposed to True Christianity.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal) Utics, N. Y., Dec. 11 .- Bishop Charles r. P. Olmsted of the Episcopal diocese of central New York today expressed in unmistakable terms his opposition to lotteries, raffles and card parties as means for the support of the Episcopal

church. He directs his statement particularly to Episcopal churchgoers in his diocese, and after remarking that fairs, raffles and suppers are a descent from the highest plane of Christian living, con-

tinues: "As to card parties, dancing and the-atricals, there is at least one reason why it might be best to avoid them all, and that is that a good many Christian people consider them wrong in them-selves. We may not agree with such people, and may make use of those practices for our own personal amuse-ment so long as we do it in moderation, but it is a question whether it is wise but it is a question whether it is wise or charitable to use them for the sup-port of the church." 
