

PIGTAIL LOVES LITTLE ICEBERG

Sentimental Fever Gave Celestial Brain Chill—Asylum for Seid.

Love for an Indian maid in far-off Alaska has driven Seid Jo John to madness. John comes from the land of the pigtail, but he spent some time in Alaska before coming to America and there was smitten by the charms of the Indian maiden. Because he is inebriated and makes fierce assaults upon the furniture he is detained at the county jail and this afternoon goes to the asylum at Salem.

John speaks little English, but he has confided his love secret to his countrymen. He was found by Deputy Sheriff Jones and Hearty at a Chinese place on Second street. Last night he was so violent that he was put in a padded cell, where he succeeded in destroying two of the mattresses.

Waldemar Seidon has filed an insanity complaint against A. Linden, a Swedish youth who sought the lawyers' office to ask if there were some way to recover \$50 he had paid to Chinese doctors. The doctors had promised to refund his money if they failed to cure him of hearing voices that sang hymns as he lay in bed. Mr. Seidon escorted the young man to the courthouse, when Linden sobbed like a child as he told of the voices and the loss of his money.

Another new candidate for Salem is Joseph Pacl, who was taken in charge while throwing stones at milk wagons in the early morning hours, commanding them to halt. Still another on the insanity list is H. O. Worden, who was taken from the Portland hotel to a sanitarium. He wore a deputy sheriff's badge, carried a 44-caliber revolver and was inflamed by bad liquor.

Miss Beattie Hurley Sullivan, a music teacher of 390 Salmon street has been committed to the Salem asylum because she hears voices and thinks she is being persecuted. Samuel E. Koplin, the civil war veteran from Hood River over whom his second wife and daughters by his first wife could not agree, has been sent to Mountain View sanitarium at Mount Tabor for treatment.

WANTED: BIG DEPOSIT OF GOOD, WHITE SAND

Must Possess High Percentage of Silica for Manufacturing Glass.

An eastern firm is seeking on the Pacific coast a deposit of pure white sand, possessing a high percentage of silica. It is presumed the object is the manufacture of glass or some commercial product not now produced on this coast. The firm has written to the Portland chamber of commerce, asking for information as to the location of the raw material.

"Any one knowing of such a deposit of sand will confer a favor by notifying us," Secretary E. C. Giltner said. "With no state appropriation to support the university's scientific men in making explorations or field investigations of any kind, Oregon's resources are sadly neglected and it is almost impossible to give the east any adequate information on most subjects that are inquired about from time to time."

The fact has frequently been brought out by Professor John Fulton and other professors that Oregon needs to be better known to be appreciated, and in order to make the necessary investigations the state's scientific men should be kept in the field every summer during the vacation season.

The chamber has been notified by Senator Fulton that he will offer an amendment to the next agricultural appropriation bill for the purpose of securing money necessary to establish an additional signal station at Cape Hancock. Since the shifting of the channel at the mouth of the Columbia, resulting from extension of the jetty, the present station at North Head is too far away to enable the signal officer there to see incoming ships.

J. C. McNally, American consul at Nanking, in a communication to the Portland chamber of commerce, advises that Oregon commercial interests should be alive to the immediate prospect that China will open its doors to foreign commerce and industry. He writes: "I believe Oregon has the greatest future of any of the Pacific coast states. My opinion was formed from a recent visit and careful investigation. China is about to throw open her doors to the commerce and industry of the world. By reason of Oregon's geographical position she should command a fair portion of it."

"His excellency Tuan Fang, viceroy of the great provinces of Kiangsu, Anhui and Kiangsi, with a combined population of over 80,000,000, is also superintendent of southern trade, and besides being one of the most progressive, is the most powerful official outside of Peking."

"He resides at Nanking, and his modern ideas are being put into practical improvements. This city, as well as others, is about to welcome the creations of western civilization, and the time is opportune for establishing markets for Oregon products."
