ELECT F. L. KENT FOR PRESIDENT

Oregon Dairymen's Association Now Has Large Membership.

As a direct result of the Oregon dairymen's association convention which closed its session yesterday afternoon 204 dairymen throughout the state, comprising representative men from every county in the state, banded in dues for membership in the organization for next year. The convention has been one of the most hard-working of any that has ever been held in this city. Officers for the year were elected yesterday afternoon as follows: President, Professor F. L. Kent of the State Agricultural college, vice-presidents, A. Bonney of Tygh Valley and Mrs. S. A. Youkum of Marshfield, secretary and treasurer, W. L. Crissey.

Professor Kent, who becomes the president of the association, has devoted 12 years to the upbuilding of the dairy interests of Oregon and is one of the most popular members of the faculty at the agricultural college at Corvallis. For three years he has been superintendent of the dairy department of the Oregon state fair and is recognized over the country as an authority on his subject.

Taken all in all the meeting was a most successful and important one and its good effects in increased dairy products and the exporting of Oregon's dairy products to foreign markets is sure to be felt.

At yesterday afternoon's session addresses were made by Dr. James Withycombe of Corvallis and by Professor B. D. White of Washington, D. C.

Resolutions Adopted.

Resolutions reported by the committee, composed of Dr. James Withycombe, Mrs. S. A. Youkum and W. S. Schumacher, were adopted as follows:

Whereas, the dairy industry of this state is rapidly assuming mammoth commercial proportions and is worthy of a reasonable financial support for its further promotion.

Resolved, That the support of the state is distributed over a very large area, thus necessitating long distance of travel for the dairy and food commissioner to visit each dairymen's section, and

Whereas, it is the opinion of this convention assembled that the work of inspection and instruction would be materially facilitated by additional competent assistance to the office of the dairy and food commissioner; therefore,

Resolved, That this convention earnestly advocates a large appropriation for the office so that the necessary additional assistance may be provided.

ADDITION TO RIGHTS OF SCHOOL CHILDREN

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., Dec. 14.—Holding that a child has the right to expect reasonable protection to her person while in attendance at school, the supreme court has overruled the judgment of dismissal on a general demurrer entered by the lower court and ordered it to proceed with the case.

The suit was brought by the guardian of Mamie M. Redfield, a minor, who while attending a school in Kittitas county was severely burned by having a bucket of scalding water overturned on her. The school building was kept heated with a furnace, and on one of the radiators in the room where the child was a bucket of water was left. The water became boiling hot and was tipped off the radiator upon the child, scalding her legs.

The case was dismissed in the lower court on the grounds that under the state law there was no right of action against a school district. This judgment of dismissal is overruled by the supreme court.

MILK AND FOOD MUST BE WASHED

Mayor Signs New Ordinance Compelling Cleanliness About All Markets.

Mayor Lane signed the new market inspection ordinance this morning and it will become effective at once as an emergency clause was inserted providing for the immediate enforcement of the measure.

The law is considered a model in its line, as it was adopted from ordinances of a similar nature found in all parts of the country. That it may be brought to the attention of the grocers, bakers, hotel and restaurant men, markets and other lines of business which it affects, about 1,000 copies of the ordinance will be printed and distributed among the various persons and firms.

City Market Inspector Mrs. Sarah Evans was elected this morning when Mayor Lane signed the ordinance and said she would insist on an immediate and close observance of all the provisions of the ordinance.

LIBRARY KEEPS PACE WITH GROWTH OF CITY

At the meeting of the board of directors last Wednesday evening the librarian's report showed that the library is more than keeping pace with the growth of the city. There was a total circulation from all departments last month of 30,126. Every department shows a large increase. There is also an increase of at least 20 per cent in the use of the reference books, while the periodical room has many days been so crowded that extra chairs have had to be provided.

The library will be closed entirely on Wednesday and Thursday, December 18 and 19, for the purpose of moving the services of Miss Harriet E. Hassler, who has been for the past four years children's librarian. Miss Hassler has organized the children's work of the library and has made many friends, not only in the children's room, but all through Portland and the county. Miss Jessie Millard, who has been second in command, has been appointed acting children's librarian. The children's work will proceed as usual. Miss Hassler has accepted a position in Long Island City as head of the children's work in the Queens borough library.

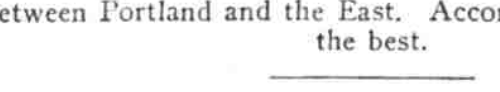
