WALLA WALLA FUEL MEN IN PRICE WAR

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Walla Walla, Wash., Dec. 19.—As a result of a lively war among local fuel dealers the price of coal has dropped \$1 to \$2 a ton and wood has slumped \$1.50 a cord. Good coal is retailing at \$9 a ton, with extra charges for long deliveries eliminated. Fuel dealers may expect prices to drop still lower. Many of the yards, in anticipation of a hard winter and high prices, are overstocked and as there is every indication of a big output in the wood camps this winter dealers expect wood to be much cheaper next spring, and they are in a hurry to unload their piled-up stocks. Many men thrown out of employment by the recent financial stringency are seeking employment in the wood camps, and the output this winter is expected to exceed last winter's by 50 per cent.
