The meeting closed with an ovation to the popular officers chosen for the ensuing year.

"Eastward Through the Storied Northwest" is the title of a new 60-page book issued by the advertising department of the Northern Pacific Railway company. It is described as a trip from California to Portland and Seattle and eastward to St. Paul. The book is profusely illustrated and contains numerous pictures of Oregon scenery, including Mount Hood. The author is Olin D. Wheeler, who wrote the Northern Pacific's Wonderful series. The book is being distributed by the passenger department. Its principal object is to stimulate tourist travel.

A display of 80 boxes of Oregon apples sent by William McMurray to the Chicago meeting of the National Livestock association caused much favorable comment, and will prove to be an effective advertisement for home-seekers in the middle west. Mr. McMurray, as general passenger agent of the Harlan lines in the Pacific northwest, embraces many opportunities to show in a practical way to the people of the east the superior products and business opportunities in this section of the country.

The Sellwood Improvement club recently passed a resolution protesting the placing of city advertisements in the Daily Abstract and yesterday sent a copy of the resolution to the city council asking that the publication of city business be in a daily journal of general circulation. The complaint against the present system is that the Abstract does not have sufficient circulation to justify the city in using it. The matter was referred to the judiciary committee.

Arrangements have been practically completed for a large excursion party of business men of the inland empire who will visit California in February. The train will leave Spokane, February 7, over the O. R. & N. lines, and come via Portland, where the entire party of excursionists will be entertained at the Portland Commercial club for a day. They have named their train the "Inland Empire Special." The party will number 130 people.

A. L. Byler has filed a petition in the circuit court requesting that the receiver of the Golden Eagle dry goods firm be required to pay to him a contract for working one year from August 4, 1907. He says he was to receive \$1,500 and 2 per cent of the profits of the store. After a little over one month the store went into the hands of a receiver, and Byler is unable to agree with the latter as to his compensation.

An annexation meeting will be held at Woodmere under the auspices of the Woodmere Improvement club this evening. Delegates will be present from every part of the big district that desires annexation, and several prominent speakers will be asked to be present and outline the benefits as well as the disadvantages of annexation.

A meeting of the Northeast Side Improvement association will be held in the Woodmen of the World hall on Russell street this evening. Besides taking up further to execution of the plans to build a high bridge across the Willamette below the steel bridge other matters, among which is included the car service, will be discussed.

A large Christmas will be given at Salvation Army, No. 1 corps, 255 Davis street, between Third and Fourth, Christmas night, December 25, at 8 o'clock, for the Sunday school and poor children. A good program will be rendered by the Sunday school, after which all the children will receive presents, fruit, candy and nuts.

Members of the city council put through ordinances and resolutions yesterday calling for about \$300,000 of street improvements. The work has been accumulating since the beginning of the bank holidays, and yesterday's meeting was called especially to attend to this business.

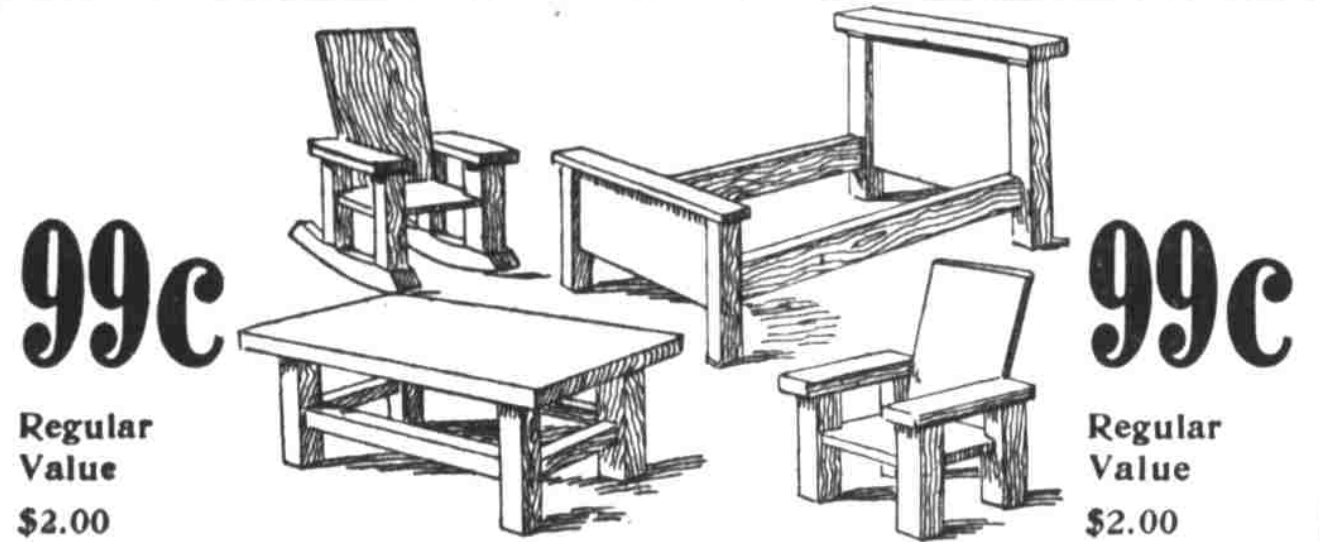
