

MOTHER SPANIEL HEARST ADMITS BURIES PUPPIES

And Spokane Man Who
Tells Story Says He Is
No Nature-Faker.

Spokane, Wash., Dec. 22.—A Cheasapeake spaniel, the property of Dr. Wilbur O. Dutton, has buried her four dead puppies in the garden of Charles C. Towell, after doing all in her power to keep them alive. Rowell says he cannot apply for membership in the Anselm club, for the story is no fake, as he saw the sad obsequies himself.

The little canines, a few weeks old, were seized almost simultaneously with a strange malady that baffled not only dumb maternal solicitude but the skill of a veterinarian. The mother dog, after they were dead, gathered them to her warm body and strove in all the poor and simple ways known to caninity to revive them. When she knew her cubs were in vain she went into the garden, selected an unfrequented spot, dug a deep hole in the soft earth, carried her babies to it one by one and laid them in their grave and covered them as tenderly as human hands could have done. Since then she guards the spot, day and night.

MAN MISSING FROM HOME AT KLAMATH

W. H. Mills, Real Estate
Dealer, Disappears While
Visiting in California.

Klamath Falls, Or., Dec. 22.—W. H. Mills of the firm of Wright & Mills, real estate dealers of this city, has been missing since November 8, and friends here are greatly concerned.

He left here in September to visit his old home in California. He left there on November 2 for San Francisco, where he expected to stay but a few days, returning immediately to Klamath Falls. His relatives at his old home or friends here have heard nothing since.

Sheriff Obenchain has a picture of an unknown man murdered near Redding late in November. Some people here see a resemblance to Mr. Mills, while others see no resemblance whatever.

No reason can be given for his disappearance, as his business affairs here, so far as known, were in good condition.

CHRISTMAS HOLIDAYS IN THE METROPOLIS

New York, Dec. 22.—Seventy-five million dollars is the estimated sum it takes to provide Christmas cheer for the 3,000,000 inhabitants of "Little Old New York." The figure may be cut a little this year on account of the financial stringency, but if such is the case there is no outward evidence of the fact. The streets are congested with shoppers, the stores are crowded and the subway, elevated and surface cars packed with bundle-laden passengers.

But with all the money spent on Christmas presents the fact remains that at least 300,000 residents of the metropolis would have no Christmas at all were it not for the charity organizations, the church societies and individual philanthropists. It is estimated that at least this number will partake of the bountiful Christmas fare provided in the hospitals and asylums, in missions and other benevolent institutions supported by private charity, and at the annual distribution of food to the needy by the Salvation Army, the Volunteers of America and other organizations.

HEARST ADMITS HE WAS WRONG

Like All Self-Respecting
Newspapermen Great Editor
Admits Mistake.

New York, Dec. 22.—All the newspapers controlled by William R. Hearst this morning contained an article offering an apology for connecting the name of William A. Chandler with occurrences at the home of Raymond Hitchcock, the actor. The article says:

"Upon due and careful investigation we have found that the inferential libel on Mr. Chandler was absolutely without the slightest foundation in fact, and the American and Mr. Hearst now frankly and unreservedly state that the publication was without any justification whatever, and the American and Mr. Hearst desire to express to William A. Chandler extreme regret that the publication was made."

Hearst's dislike for William A. Chandler was the outgrowth of politics. Chandler is a brother of Lieutenant-Governor Chandler, who was endorsed by Hearst's independence league.

REORGANIZATION OF BIG BOOK COMPANY

New York, Dec. 22.—Stockholders of the American Book company, sometimes called the "school book trust," hold a special meeting today to take steps looking to a reorganization of the company. The company was incorporated in 1890, under the laws of New Jersey, acquiring the property of the Van Antwerp, Bragg company of Cincinnati, Iverson, Blake & Co. of New York and the school book business of D. Appleton & Co., Harcourt, Brace & Co., and A. S. Barnes & Co. of New York.

As the headquarters of the company are in New York and the most of the business done here it is proposed to abandon the New Jersey charter under which it has operated since its organization and incorporate under the laws of New York. The capital stock is to be \$5,000,000, the same as under the old company and in addition \$2,500,000 in bonds will be issued. The surplus of the company last year amounted to \$2,700,000, so that this is simply converting a surplus into a bond, leaving the use of the capital, but also giving stockholders the immediate use of the accrued profits of the company. The bonds will bear 6 per cent. Of the issue of bonds, \$500,000 will be retained in the treasury of the company, but the rest will be distributed pro rata among the stockholders. This, in effect, will amount to a dividend of 40 per cent on their holdings.

CIVIC FEDERATION AT KLAMATH FALLS

Klamath Falls, Or., Dec. 22.—At a meeting held at the courthouse a "civic federation" was formed whose object is to see that the laws are obeyed in Klamath Falls.

The meeting was called without the knowledge of the mayor on the newspaper fraternity, but was made up of the representative business men of the town. The feeling was strong that the moral conditions warranted a "house cleaning," and an organization was formed with the enforcement of the law as its object. The movement was not started by the churches, but seems to be a general uprising of the citizens against conditions here.

INFANTRY TO GO ON SPECIAL TRAIN

Fourteenth on the Way to
Philippines Will Leave
Portland January 2.

Three special trains over the Southern Pacific railroad will carry the Fourteenth infantry from Portland to San Francisco, en route to the Philippines. They will leave Portland January 2, and the passenger department of the Oregon lines is making arrangements for equipment and preparing time schedule. The trains will be made up of 20 tourist cars, three standard sleeping cars and six box cars.

The regiment consists of 875 men and officers, and they will take a large amount of baggage and accoutrements. The box cars will carry the baggage.

The Harriman lines in Oregon have made low rates for accommodation of students and December 31. The holidays at home. About 300 students from Corvallis Agricultural college came to Portland today and disbursed to their homes. The prospect is favorable for a heavy Christmas travel.

Railroad ticket agents report that travel has been very large all through the month of December. The freight business has been "hot to pieces," it is said, but the financial stringency has not had the least unfavorable effect on passenger traffic.

PASTOR OF SAME CHURCH 40 YEARS

Rev. Thomas Eliot Preaches
Anniversary Sermon at
First Unitarian.

Rev. Thomas L. Eliot, pastor emeritus of the First Unitarian church of this city, preached the sermon yesterday morning celebrating the fortieth anniversary of his arrival in Portland and the beginning of his pastorate in that church.

Rev. Dr. Eliot is the son of William Greenleaf Eliot of St. Louis, and before coming to this city was associated with his father in the work of the First Unitarian church of that city. He is a brother of Charles Eliot, president of Harvard.

Since his arrival here Dr. Eliot's life has been a part of the history of the community and of the state. His broad charity, wide sympathies and enlightened culture have had a large part in shaping the destinies and the career of the youth of the city, and in all of his labors he has been ably seconded by his wife.

Dr. Eliot is president of the board of directors of the Children's home, one of the park commission, a member of the board of the city museum, a commissioner, president of the state board of charities and corrections, director of the Boys and Girls club, and he has been for 15 years past president of the Humane society.

His son, Rev. William Greenleaf Eliot, is pastor of the church which Dr. Eliot served for so many years.

FREAK SHOT MADE BY DYNAMITE BLAST

Rock Lake, Wash., Dec. 22.—While men on the construction work of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul were loosening up rock at the base of a cliff with dynamite there was a fearful explosion that nearly cost the lives of several workmen. Two men were badly cut about the face, eyes and hands.

A general merchandise store nearly a mile away was badly shaken and all the goods were tumbled in piles from the shelves, while the glass showcases were broken and the goods inside badly damaged. The men are at a loss to understand how they, at the scene, were so lucky in escaping death, considering the amount of damage done at this distant point.
