

MRS. BARNETT OFFERS \$40,000 TO SAVE DANIEL'S LIFE

Frank Santaana, Member of Royal Hawaiian Band, Puts Period to Earthly Career—Kills Himself in Lodging-House.

Frank G. Santaana, who was a member of the Royal Hawaiian band during the Lewis and Clark days, and who was the place in the Hawaiian orchestra in the Tannhauser cafe in Seattle a few days ago, was found dead in his room in the Oak Lodge, at 1130 1/2 street, this morning. Twenty minutes later he was dead. Santaana arrived in the city the day after Christmas and met his brother, G. Santaana, who rooms at the same place. The latter is a member of the Hawaiian orchestra that plays at the Oregon grill. The brother says that after they had talked for a time, Frank asked him for a revolver. He had no revolver, and in return inquired why a revolver was wanted. Frank replied that he expected one to come after him from Seattle, but did not explain what he meant. Up to the time of his death he made no further reference to a revolver or this morning. His brother is at a loss to account for this action, as he never saw Frank with a revolver, and had just quit a good job in Seattle.

Yesterday Frank Santaana was out of his room most of the day. He had had a fight with his brother, and the first knowledge that anything was wrong came when the report of a revolver was heard and a chambermaid opened the door of the room to find Santaana lying on the bed. By his side was a brand-new revolver, and a hole through the right ear told the story of the deed. The suicide left no note or other word of explanation.

Santaana was a single man, 31 years of age, and of Portuguese nationality. His brother is his only relative in the northwest, another brother living in California. He was a native of the Hawaiian Islands, and remained with the Royal Hawaiian band, remaining with it for a long time after the fair, being still a member of the organization when it came to Portland last June. Coroner Finley has taken charge of the remains.

MILD SMALLPOX CASE AT LEBANON

Woman Declares She Is Willing to Sacrifice Her \$40,000 Home.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Dec. 23.—"I would willingly sacrifice my \$40,000 home on the island off Sausalito to aid the California Safe Deposit & Trust company. Yes, all my property," Mrs. Walter J. Barnett declared before the grand jury yesterday.

"I opposed many of J. Daniel Brown's ideas. Especially his plan to let his actions regarding the timber deals in which the bank was involved," Walter J. Barnett.

At their own request Barnett and his wife testified before the grand jury yesterday afternoon, each anxious to assist the investigators in clearing the atmosphere of doubt into which the affairs of the defunct institution have been plunged.

Although he did not directly charge Brown with wrecking the bank, Barnett, in his mild manner, threw strong implications against his former friend and present jail mate.

James Treadwell was not mentioned by Barnett in particular, but the witness declared that he was suspicious of the heavy losses and statements made by the bank with the Treadwell El Dorado Lumber company.

The case of the people is not altered in the least by the testimony of Barnett, said the prosecutor. That indicated that more indictments against Brown and Brown, and probably against Robertson and James Treadwell may be returned when the grand jury meets Monday.

With a bullet hole in his right breast which he claims is the result of an attempt to murder him on the part of Harvey Price, a wealthy liquor dealer of LaCamas, Michael McClin, a sealer for the LaCamas paper mills, is lying at the Good Samaritan hospital. His recovery is considered doubtful.

Friends of McClin's assert that the town officials at LaCamas have refused to take any action looking toward the arrest of McClin's assailant and arrested in turn the one man who tried to save Price's life.

The shooting took place a week ago Friday night in Price's saloon, the Office bar. There were a dozen or so men in the saloon at the time, but in the preliminary hearing it is said that no one would testify against Price or make any appearance.

Albert Wright, an employee of the paper mills and friend of McClin's, came to Portland this morning to look into the condition of the wounded man and seek legal advice on having the alleged assailant prosecuted. He returned to Vancouver at noon and will drive shortly to Seattle to see the mass and have him place Price in custody to await the outcome of the shooting.

Wright declared this morning that Price had bribed the other witnesses to the shooting and had offered to pay \$10,000 to each of them to give him a comfortable home all winter if he would not press the matter further.

"I was sitting in Price's saloon," said Wright, "and he was drinking pretty heavily. McClin stepped out for a minute; when he came back some of the daggers in the room called out to him to get out of the saloon. He started back into the bar again, and another dagger, another one of the crowd, came up and tried to get him to leave.

"While they were arguing Price walked to the end of the bar carrying a gun in his hand.

"I saw him and called out, 'Why don't you shoot if you're going to do it? That's a good gun!'

"Price then shot the first shot striking the piano in the room, the other coming near me, and the third hitting Price within a foot and a half of McClin's chest, struck him on the right side. We hurried him away and took him to Portland.

"When I returned to LaCamas and tried to have Price arrested they told me that I had better drop it; that my witnesses wouldn't appear and that constable, Wain, would take no action in the case. They said if I insisted at length with the doctor, a complaint and would force me to put up bonds for costs. I did this, the case came up for trial and they said there was no evidence, and that I would have to pay the costs."

BARNETT WILL TELL HIS STORY TO JURY

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Dec. 23.—When the grand jury convenes next Monday to resume its investigation of the California Safe Deposit & Trust company, J. Daniel Barnett, who yesterday testified, will again take the stand. Just what matters Barnett will testify to it was unable to ascertain today, but it is known that Barnett is extremely anxious to make another statement in regard to his connection with the bank.

He completed to make this statement yesterday afternoon, but was deferred from the district attorney's office who had charge of the matter refused to allow him to make any statement, but he had communicated with his superior.

Michael McClin Shot by Harvey Price, Wealthy Liquor Dealer, Lies at Death's Door at Good Samaritan—No Arrests.

Boise, Ida., Dec. 23.—Little interest was shown in today's proceedings in the Pettibone trial, as the time was devoted to the reading of the depositions of witnesses concerning the Bradley explosion at San Francisco in November, 1904. Numerous witnesses told, through depositions of the explosion, all saving the report was very loud and could have been heard for miles.

J. H. Riley, residing in the next block said he passed the Bradley flat a short time before the explosion and saw a Japanese boy cleaning the steps.

Mrs. Charles Pickard, who was employed in the Bradley house, said she noticed the odor of gas the day before the explosion. She denied Orchard's statement that he accompanied her to the theatre on one occasion. She admitted she saw Orchard every day up to the time of the explosion, but never saw him afterwards.

PENDLETON CHANGES MAYORS NEXT WEEK

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., Dec. 23.—At a special meeting of the city council last night Mayor-elect E. J. Murphy was elected to the office of mayor for the next year. The council also changed the city seal and the new council will assume control.

During the administration of Mayor Fox the conditions have improved by the suppression of gambling and the enforcement of the Sunday closing law; but the city has been hit by a heavy loss of over \$50,000 worth of street paving and macadamizing has been done; levee repairs to the amount of \$20,000 have been completed and other vital improvements have been made.

HOWARD RAY HUNTS FOR LOST PARENTS

Pittsburg, Pa., Dec. 23.—Fired of roaming about the country and satisfied that he has had more hair raising experiences than most boys of his age, Howard Ray, 15 years old, will now give all his attention to a search for his parents, who were in San Francisco at the time of the earthquake.

Howard has not seen any member of his family since the terrible catastrophe. He sailed from San Francisco before the quake on the steamer Chile. He went to Australia where he says he was shanghaied by the crew of a British coal steamer. He also complains of ill health at the hands of the present consul at Rio Janeiro. He fears that his parents may have been killed in the earthquake.

LOCKET GIVES CLUE TO WOMAN'S IDENTITY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Harrison, N. J., Dec. 23.—Through the discovery of a locket with the letter engraved upon it, the authorities investigating the death of the young woman found in the Passaic river Thursday believe they have advanced a step toward her identity.

Encouraged by this find, detectives started to work today confident that before night the name of the woman will be learned. All day long the remains have been under the eyes of the curious, although many viewed them in their search for missing friends and relatives.

ROOSEVELT CLEARS GOVERNOR HOGGATT

Malcomson defeated Sorter by two yards in 10 3/5 seconds on a wet clay track. Sorter led for 50 yards when the speedy white boy overhauled him and won handily. The time was regarded as exceptionally fast considering the condition of the track.

lottery game before, after and during a drawing. Bing Gee since the holidays has drawn about \$17,000 from the bank.

Bing Gee immediately sent for his attorney, F. P. Haggard, and a formal demand was at once made on the police for the return of the money seized. This demand was refused, but was repeated this morning when the money passed into the hands of Municipal Court Clerk Hennessy to be held in evidence against the accused Chinese.

What action, if any, will be taken to recover the coin is not known. The authorities are contemplating some action looking to the confiscation of the coin, it being claimed that this can be done under section 1961 of the state code.

The section reads as follows: "All sums of money and every other valuable thing drawn as a prize at any lottery or pretended lottery, by any person being within the state, contrary to the provisions of this chapter, are forfeited to the state and recovered by civil action."

Will End Gambling.

It is believed by those who are in touch with the gambling situation in Chinatown that last night's raid will have the effect of putting an end to the negotiations of the past few days looking to the payment by the gamblers of \$1,500 a month in fines in return for protection. Also that those who have been hitherto paying \$100 a month to the Chinese quarter will now be forced to abandon all attempts at protection and surrender the rich graft that has been paid to keep the place open and partially free from molestation.

Just how lax has been the prosecution of such Chinese as have been brought to book for violating the gambling laws was shown yesterday when five Chinese pleaded guilty in the municipal court and were punished by imposition of a fine of \$15 each. A great mass of gambling implements, including charts, tickets, marking tools, bowls and cash, used in the game, were seized and destroyed as provided by the city charter. With the articles returned to the self-confessed gamblers they could have opened up and conducted a gambling game within 10 minutes after leaving the police station.

It is upon the chief of police that the chief of the police department has placed the responsibility of enforcing these unlawful articles. Section 194 of the city charter reads: "Whenever the mayor or the executive board ascertain or receive satisfactory information that any house, room or premises within this city or within four miles of the corporate limits thereof is kept or used as a common gaming house or common gaming premises for playing therein for wager or money at a game of chance, or for the deposit or sale of lottery tickets or policies, it shall be lawful for the mayor or executive board to authorize or direct the chief of police or any officer of the police to enter such house, room or premises and forthwith arrest all persons therein found offending against the law, and to seize all instruments of gaming, lottery tickets and lottery policies, and bring the said articles into court."

The chief of police shall cause such arrested persons to be vigorously prosecuted, and all such seized articles to be destroyed, and the executive board shall cause the owner of such house, room or premises, his agent or representative to be notified in writing that such house, room or premises is being destroyed for the lawful purposes, and it shall be the duty of the owner, agent or representative to cause the use of the premises for such unlawful purposes to cease.

The chief of police has done none of the things commanded in the section quoted.
